## SPINDLE ENSEMBLE

THE SECOND HIDDEN NOTES FESTIVAL OF CONTEMPORARY CLASSICAL AND AVANT GARDE MUSIC, WHICH WAS DUE TO TAKE PLACE IN SEPTEMBER 2020, WILL BE TAKING PLACE LATER THIS YEAR. THE FESTIVAL WILL FEATURE PERFORMANCES BY JONNY GREENWOOD AND PENQUIN CAFE, AND IT PROMISES TO BE A GREAT COMING TOGETHER AND A CELEBRATION OF THE SHARED EXPERIENCE OF LIVE MUSIC AFTER THE DROUGHT OF THE LAST YEAR. IN THE MEANTIME, THE RIPPLES CREATED BY THE FIRST FESTIVAL CONTINUE TO RESONATE THROUGH COLLABORATIVE PROJECTS WITH SOUND RECORDS, DEEPBED RADIO AND NOW WITH THE LAUNCH OF A NEW RECORD LABEL, HIDDEN NOTES RECORDS. THE LABEL, WHICH SEEMS LIKE A NATURAL EXTENSION OF THE FESTIVAL, BUILDS ON THE CONNECTIONS THAT FOUNDERS ALEX HOBBIS AND ADAM HINKS HAVE MADE THROUGH THE FESTIVAL AND WILL BE A PLATFORM FOR PROMOTING NEW MUSIC.

The first release will be Inkling by Spindle Ensemble, one of the standout performances from the 2019 festival. Spindle Ensemble are an instrumental quartet, formed in 2016, that are part of Bristol's music collective, Bloom. They perform original compositions by Daniel Inzani that sidestep the boundaries of classification, ranging easily and coherently between serialism, musique concrete and lush romanticism whilst drawing on influences from Steve Reich's counterpoints, through the lyrical sound poems and compositions of Erik Satie and Debussy, to Frank Zappa's free experimentation.
Daniel emphasises the collaborative nature of the band and describes his role of bandleader as being about curating the circumstances in which something can happen rather than being directive. The group, which features percussionist Harriet Riley, cellist Jo Silverston and violinist Caelia Lunniss, share a musical curiosity, an ability to listen closely to each other and to improvise, as well as a high degree of technical competence. Daniel is a multiinstrumentalist, although he principally plays piano. His compositional method involves sketching out an idea that the band will develop collectively. He describes this as a process of surrendering something in order to enrich the original idea, to be surprised by unexpected elaborations on an idea.
The combination of instruments is
unusual but strikingly balanced and harmonious in the mix. The music is warm and melodic but there are moments of dynamic tension and discordance, and of jaunty exuberance. There is a spontaneity and energy that is perhaps a trace of the group's improvisational process. No one instrument dominates, with different players coming to the fore at different times. This latter characteristic is something that can be associated with jazz, and may be related to Daniel's experience of playing with jazz musicians, notably with the Ethiopian Jazz band Tezeta. Friendship and trust are essential elements of their working methods.
He has had little formal musical training and has developed his technical and compositional sensibility through experience of playing a wide variety of music in a wide variety of settings. In 2013, for instance, he collaborated with Gus Fairbairn, AKA Alabaster de Plume, on an album titled The Jester - Alabaster de Plume's own performances in Stroud have become legendary - near spiritual experiences. He has also worked as a producer, recording Mandel in Holy Trinity Church for their recent EP release.
When Daniel tells me that he studied maths at university, I am only slightly surprised. The music has a kind of freedom and lightness in the way that it steps outside of the formal confines
of genre, but there is an underlying mathematical precision, a satisfying internal logic and discipline, that sits happily alongside its melodic and expressive qualities. The openness of Daniel's approach is matched by the other members of the Ensemble, who, although classically trained, all have experience of playing with a diverse range of musicians.
Being hard to pigeonhole has meant that Spindle Ensemble are not limited to a particular kind of venue or audience. The music has a broad appeal and they are equally at home in concert halls such as the Southbank Centre or St George's Hall, independent venues such as the Goods Shed or festivals like Shambala.
Inkling was largely recorded before lockdown at various venues in Bristol (including St George's Hall), capturing the spontaneity of their performances using recording techniques that enable the listener to hear each instrument's position mimicking the audible experience as a live audience member. The recordings have been overdubbed with an orchestra, deepening the sound and augmenting the quartet with brass and percussion instruments.
Over the last year Daniel has moved to Stroud with his partner, who is a visual artist. When I first moved here, 16 years ago, I was told that everyone that I met in Stroud would either be an artist or an alternative therapist. Certainly there is
a critical mass of visual artists, which is part of the history and fabric of the town, but it seems to me that over the last couple of years it is musicians that I keep meeting and that there has been a steadily growing community of really interesting music makers that is gathering momentum and drawing others in its wake. Could we be seeing a Hidden Notes effect?
During lockdown Daniel has been playing the piano daily in Rodborough Parish Church, relishing the unique acoustic properties of the space. Once things are opened up again he is planning to programme public performances in the church. This could be a welcome addition to Stroud's widening range of music venues. Alongside events such as Hidden Notes and Jazz Stroud, scheduled for the autumn, and the longed for reopening of venues such as The Prince Albert, it augurs well for the coming year.

Inkling will be released on the 27th May, on vinyl, CD and digital download. The vinyl version will be accompanied by a special 12 page booklet which includes liner notes written by Nick Luscombe, host of BBC3's Late Junction. ## SITUATIONISM

## SITUATIONISM - THE THEORY THAT CHANGES

IN HUMAN BEHAVIOUR ARE FACTORS OF
THE SITUATION RATHER THAN THE TRAITS
A PERSON POSSESSES. BEHAVIOUR IS
BELIEVED TO BE INFLUENCED BY EXTERNAL,
SITUATIONAL FACTORS RATHER THAN INTERNAL TRAITS OR MOTIVATIONS.

Never has situationism felt so relevant than this last year, a perfect time then to check in with local purveyors of quality dance music Situation Sounds...

At the core of the collective are ex DiY DJ Mr Mulatto and long-established Stroud DJ Frank Situation. Frank booked Mr Mulatto for one of his Phat Nutz gigs at the Thekla in Bristol and the pair soon started writing music together at the Get It Together Studio in Stroud, running the Friends \& Families record label alongside Rob Evans at the time.
It is a partnership that has endured many years and this year Situationism marks its 50th release, a considerable achievement for any label in this day and age. For those that aren't familiar with the Situation or BRS sound it is fundamentally a house-based groove but one seeped in a love of soul, funk, disco and jazz. Whether re-editing other producers, producing their own tracks or lighting up the dancefloor, Situation is a good time guaranteed but one that respects the heritage of disco and house music in doing so.

Situation (Edits) which was first formed along with Paul Walker, first came to prominence on the national scene with their edits being championed by DJ's including Greg Wilson who included their Situation Edit of Machine Gun in his BBC Radio 1 'Essential Mix' widely regarded as one of the greatest DJ mixes ever made. Another key edit was Alice Russell and Quantic Soul Orchestra's Pushin' On which went on to become an official remix on the Tru Thoughts label as they liked it so much when they heard it.

Over time, it morphed into more of a collective with musicians and vocalists joining, leading to creating original tracks as Situation - Mr Mulatto and Frank Situation at the helm. I asked the guys how it feels to reach 50 releases and there is clearly a real sense of satisfaction that they have created and grown together into what is now considered an established label that people feel they can trust. They still have their finger on the musical pulse, their tracks have been played multiple times on BBC Radio 6 Music in the last year alone, justifying the investment of time they have put into the label over the years. The particular releases they are most proud of? Andre Espeut and Julian Sanza - Perfect System (Opolopo remix) and Situation feat. Andre Espeut - Beyond Compare (Laroye and Espeut vocal remix) are just two that spring to mind.

Moving forward they recognise the need for both keeping their sound and experimentation "We think it's a bit of both - we are always looking to find something interesting and new musically, however we definitely have a consolidated sound that we are being recognised for which at the same time is always evolving."
"We love to work with lots of different artists and musicians and usually see what projects come out of that. Local musicians and vocalists that we have worked with include Dom Thompson, James Payne, Phil Campbell, Jon Gray, Lauren Rimmel, Katie and Libby Vacara and Emma Ordonez." They have also
collaborated a lot with London based singer songwriter Andre Espeut and more recently South African based vocalist Venessa Jackson not to mention Ashley Beedle, Yam Who, Greg Wilson, and Tom Findlay to name but a few from the A list DJ world.

So what are the plans for the label going forwards? "We will continue as we have always done, to try and keep a simple philosophy with the label which is - if we like it, if it moves and grooves us, and we click with the artists - we will release it." They also intend to keep growing their new house series 2Up2Down with it's first three volumes already having been a big success. As if that wasn't enough they have a compilation album of deep house In The Bag forthcoming.

In what seems to be a particularly productive period, even by their standards, the lads have just finished a couple of BRS remixes for Groove Armada from their new album and Mr Mulatto has also found time during lockdown to support the Stroud Valley Artspace's Deepbed Radio. "It was perfect as a substitute for not being able to do club nights and DJing out I suppose. I was doing a weekly show for about 6 months so it really focused me, as well as helping out with some of the Listen Again parts of the station, however as time has gone on I haven't been able to commit so much but still have a regular show every month."

Finally, we have to ask, are there any live DJ nights planned? "We're keeping everything crossed! We are hoping to get the first Friday club night available at the SVA in Stroud after June 21st ...all being well of course..."

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## ZARA BALFOUR

> IMAGINE LIVING IN THE REMOTE DOLPO REGION OF NEPAL. YOUR VILLAGE IS NESTLED IN A BEAUTIFUL CLEFT IN THE HIMALAYAN MOUNTAINS. YOUR COMMUNITY IS PEACEFUL AND COLLEGIATE, AND YOU FARM COLLECTIVELY. SOUNDS IDYLLIC.

You live at least three days trek from any passable road. The rough path to your village is fraught with peril insecure mountain paths, landslides, and threadbare rope bridges over raging rivers. No national grid, no phone signal, no doctors, no teachers, hardly any sanitation. Sounds challenging.

Imagine having a daughter in your remote village. She will receive no formal education, she will start work on the land as soon as she is physically able, and she will probably be married before she is 16 . Your only opportunity to educate her is to send her, aged 4, to a residential school in Kathmandu. She will receive excellent education, good care and moral guidance, and the precious gift of opportunity. But you won't see her, or talk to her, for at least 10 years. And she may well spend much of that time wondering why you sent her away, in the belief that you do not love her. Sounds unbearable.
This heart-breaking dilemma sits at the heart of the multi-award-winning feature documentary Children of the Snow Land by Zara Balfour and Marcus Stephenson, in which they followed three 16 -year-old students from their school in Kathmandu to the far reaches of the High Himalayas to meet their parents for the first time in 12 years.

It is an honest and thoughtful film that
packs a sizable emotional punch. And far from being a niche tale of indigenous peoples, it is a truly universal story; about belonging, the meaning of parental love, and the resilience of youth.
I spoke to the film's producer/director Zara Balfour on the eve of the Stroud Film Festival screening last month. Her journey on the film began in 2012, whilst filming with an education charity in Nepal. They received a request from the founder of Snowland School in Kathmandu seeking help in reconnecting his students to their families. Buddhist monk, Guru Rinpoche, had set up Snowland School many years before to offer education to the youth of the remote villages of the High Himalayas, a place where 70\% illiteracy and minimal infrastructure leave its youth ill-equipped to prosper outside the region. Guru Rinpoche brought opportunity through education. But not without a heavy price. Snowland School does not have the resources to maintain contact with the families, or to send its student home.
"I had been looking for a story for a feature documentary for some time, and this seemed really interesting," says Balfour. So, she self-funded a trip to Kathmandu, met Guru Rinpoche and his students, and realised the physical and
emotional magnitude of what a 'journey home' would be.
Back in the UK, initial attempts to raise financing for the film fell on deaf ears, as film executives made the classic - and incorrect - assumption that the film would be too niche, or too worthy. So, Balfour and her co-producer Stephenson continued to self-fund.
They returned to Kathmandu to cast the documentary, selecting three students to follow on their journeys home; Nima Gurung, Tsering Deki and Jeewan Mahatara. "Nepalis are quite reserved, so we were looking for people with charisma, but who also had a sense of narrative, because we would need them to make video diaries for some of the journey," says Balfour.
Herein lay one of the biggest challenges for the filmmakers. How would they convey the enormity of the emotional journey of these innately shy and respectful people, via video diaries? "We trained the children in film-making, and we coached them, to help them feel more comfortable talking to camera. But we didn't know if it would work," says Balfour.
Although it would have made the film easier to edit, Balfour elected not to use a 'voice-of-God' voice-over to propel her narrative and load it with western interpretation. Instead she relied on the students, teachers and families
to tell their own stories, in their own voices. Consequently, the film has a calm timbre which convinces through the understated commentary of the students.
Balfour and Stephenson made seven trips to Nepal, to film school life, the journeys home and two of the family reunions. The reunions were not what they expected. No tears of joy or telegenic primetime TV gushing; these were quiet and muted meetings. Balfour recalls her surprise: "I was quite shocked at first, and so were the students. I had to re-think, it wasn't what we'd planned for." But the film is more honest for these pared-back and un-staged scenes, and the slow and gentle re-acquaintance of Tsering Deki and her mother is deeply touching.
During filming Balfour secured the financial support of independent documentary specialists Dartmouth Films, and Dartmouth's founder and respected documentary film-maker Christopher Hird came on board as Executive Producer. Dartmouth also secured international distribution for the film, and it has enjoyed both cinema and video-on-demand release internationally. The film is currently available to view on-demand on Curzon Home Cinema in the UK.
But the Snowland story does not end here. All three students have now left

Snowland School, and they are studying and training in Kathmandu. Crucially, they are also still engaged with their families and communities, forming the vital cultural bridge that Guru Rinpoche had hoped for.

Since making the film, Balfour has started a non-profit organisation, Snowland Journeys, alongside Director of Operations Phil Briggs, to fund the journeys home each year for the students of Snowland School. They also provide social workers and development experts to assist with reintegration and prepare both parents and students for their reunions. At the recent Stroud Film Festival screening, Briggs said: "If we work with children from a really young age, we can get them ready for this massive journey home. It's a longitudinal journey.
"But it's small steps," continued Briggs,
"There is no infrastructure, and until there is, progress will be slow." Briggs hopes Snowland Journeys will soon provide portable solar panels for the students to take on their journeys home so more villagers can contact their children at Snowland School, at least once a year.
And if you still need convincing about the relevance of this story to the western experience, then look no further than Snowland Journeys' Lockdown Lessons; classes for lockdown-addled

UK teenagers, using the experience and testimony of the Nepali students to inspire and build resilience. This 'return path', using the Nepali experience to provide life lessons to UK teenagers, is a particularly pleasing development in Balfours' own Snowland journey.
Zara Balfour is an accomplished film-maker and campaigner who has connected the dots to show us that even in the least 'connected' parts of this world, our sense of belonging, the loss and renewal of familial bonds, and the hope we hold for our children, are truly universal.

# A tiny but mighty little bird is bringing business, arts and local communities in the Cotswolds together to create an amazing arts trail, while raising much needed funds for children and young people. 




#### Abstract

The Kingfisher Trail is a brand new accessible public art trail, with 21 large scale models decorated by local artists.


There are two routes - in the west, the Severn Trail will follow the tributaries of the River Severn and the Cotswold Way along the dramatic escarpment. In the east, the Thames Trail will link Cotswold villages and the waterways and tributaries of the River Thames. Each trail will have 10 magnificent kingfisher sculptures.
The trail is the brainchild of Cotswolds National Landscape, and Partnerships and Fundraising lead James Webb says it was a challenge to find which animal to feature. "We had a lot of discussion about it for a couple of weeks," James, who lives in Rodborough, tells me over Zoom. "We had a few ideas - there was the hare trail a few years ago, but we wanted to go one better. We started thinking about the Cotswolds - why it's special - hills, woollen industry, all powered by mills and water. We've got the River Thames and the River Severn; our two biggest rivers on our doorstep. So there was a really powerful water theme, then once someone said kingfisher we thought yeah that's it."
The kingfisher, a small but unmistakable bright blue and orange bird, also has a few other connections that offer comfort and hope in this strange time. According to the RSPB, Kingfishers are amber listed because of their unfavourable conservation status in Europe. They are also listed as a Schedule 1 species under the Wildlife and Countryside Act offering them additional protection. "We also work with lots of conservation projects," James explains. "Kingfishers took a real hammering for a long time from the industrial revolution onwards, their habitats either destroyed or heavily polluted, they also suffered from hunting, and from predation by the non-native American mink. Over the course of the summer, they can nest about three or four times. Sometimes they lose their brood when the river
floods. Despite all that, at any given opportunity, they bounce back. They are really tough little birds. So that connection with Covid, that resilience, brings a subtle message of hope. This is a bird that survives and bounces back, this is what we think about the communities we're trying to support. And they're beautiful!"
As well as the 20 decorated birds, there is the 21st kingfisher - the Flying Kingfisher - which will move to a new location each fortnight and could be found anywhere in the Cotswolds. The trail will end in an auction in October, where James hopes some additional funds will be made to reinvest into young people and rural skills in the area.

Most of the artists are local - with many from Stroud and Cheltenham. Names many will recognize include PJ Crook, Imogen Harvey-Lewis, Andy 'Dice' Davies, Ed Swarez, Kerry Phippen and Guy Warner. "We also invited students from [National] Star College to get involved and also beneficiaries from a charity called Art Shape - we wanted some community involvement there as well," James adds. Art Shape runs a countywide programme of arts courses and projects with a specific focus on disability issues and social inclusion, while National Star is a provider of specialist further education, training, personal development and residential services for people with physical and learning disabilities.
There are quite a mix of mediums and styles in the artists, something James and his team hope will attract a diverse group of visitors to the area. "One of the things we wanted was to be able to go out on a Saturday morning and try and see three or four kngfishers, and each one will be a surprise and different from the last because you've got these different styles," he says. "Andy Davies said [the street art style] will bring an element of cool to the trail, and I agree with him. The idea that you could get a group of young people from Gloucester who
come and decide to spend a morning or afternoon in the countryside - that's brilliant, that ticks the boxes for us." You might have seen street artist Andy 'Dice' Davies' work on the Honeybourne Line in Cheltenham, the beautiful image is inspired by his daughter.

PJ Crook is also a well-known artist who usually works on a monumental scale. She says she hasn't planned much for her kingfisher. "As I work quite intuitively I don't usually make preparatory drawings but like the whole thing to evolve on the canvas; often the accidental or seeming mistake can suggest a completely new way of thinking. So it won't be until I have my kingfisher that I will begin that creative journey. Sometimes I will dictate to it and at other times it to me."
Also involved is Selsley-based illustrator Imogen Harvey-Lewis: "I kind of beaver away doing my own artwork in a bit of a bubble so it's always surprising and nice when something interjects from the side," she says. "I've never been involved in a trail before, but l've always felt l'd love to do one." You'll have seen her graphic, eye-catching work on the side of the Stroud Brewery.
Another Stroud-based artist who likes to work large scale is Ed Swarez, who promises "to go completely off-piste" and "stir things up a little bit and be controversial in a good way, a talking point that gets people outdoors" with his kingfisher - we can't wait.

#### Abstract

A STROUD BASED COLLABORATIVE PHOTOGRAPHY AND TEXTILE PROJECT FROM ICELANDIC PHOTOGRAPHER EMILIE SANDY AND DUTCH WEAVER ERNA JANINE, RED THREAD EXPLORES DIFFERENT STORIES, EXPRESSIONS AND EXPERIENCES OF MOTHERHOOD THROUGH INTIMATE CONCEPTUAL PORTRAITS OF ELEVEN WOMEN. IN ICELANDIC, 'RAUĐUR PRÁĐUR' - RED THREAD, IS A COMMON EXPRESSION, MEANING "THE MAIN THEME OF A STORY". TIES AND CONNECTIONS OF MOTHERHOOD ARE EXPLORED THROUGH THIS BODY OF WORK.


The exhibition features anonymous photographs, co-created by Emilie and the participants - where the women creatively utilise unique red, hand-woven pieces of cloth created by Janine in order to freely express their experiences of motherhood.

Weaving is an ancient technique typically performed by women, to create and provide cloth to dress their families with. Weaving was often a group activity, which would be accompanied by sharing stories and songs. It is also connected to various mythologies: The Tapestry of Life and The Threads of Destiny. The symbolic presence of the cloth in the photographs was used to inspire the sharing of stories. Cloth can both hide and reveal, protect and constrain, wrap wounds or carry loads.

The photographic sessions enabled both the subjects and Emilie, to share their experiences, within a safe creative space. By excluding their faces, the participants were inspired to become completely open and honest in front of the camera. Many women are self-conscious of their bodies, which are an ever-changing landscape, shaped by pregnancy, motherhood and the passage of time. Bodies that can create life and carry the legacy of our mothers and grandmothers. The creative sessions of this project encouraged a sharing of motherhood stories, creating an open platform to explore the role of a mother, of all our mothers and of motherless mothers.

The images represent women and motherhood; the cloth (almost tribal) symbolising a tribe of women surrounded by ancient wisdom and reclaiming the power to be free. Expressing their unique and personal journeys, through a collaborative and performative photographic process.

Red Thread (Rauður Práður) takes place at Lansdown Hall and Gallery from the 12th -17 th May with a private view on the 13th. The exhibition will be open from 10am till 4 pm on weekdays and 10am till 6 pm on the weekend. For further information visit lansdownhall.org

Emilie Sandy - Emilie's childhood in Iceland, was an environment rich in eccentrics and artists.
