

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
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DAN STIRLING

Dan Stirling's series of still-life works, Aurora, Mutatio and Shrine are anachronistic. Hyperreal, astonishing in their detail and their precise draftsmanship, they evoke Northern Renaissance art of the 17th Century, when there was an interest in creating realistic studies of everyday things. But Dan's paintings are not merely exercises in technical mastery or simulacra; they are in a tradition of vanitas paintings favoured by Dutch masters. Like memento mori these paintings are intended to remind us that life is fleeting, but they also show the trapping of a hedonistic lifestyle to refer explicitly to the vanity of worldly pleasures. Aurora depicts a dense mass of flowers, palpably fresh and colourful, vividly and exquisitely rendered in Caran D'Ache coloured pencil. In Mutatio, the flowers tired, in a state of decomposition, heaped up with the detritus of a debauched weekend. Shrine, painted in oils on canvas, most clearly references it's source. Against a dark background, an assembly of objects is tightly arranged on a table covered by a fine cloth. Topping the group is a sunflower, beneath which nestles a gourd and a human skull, symbolic allusions to mortality that are typical of memento mori. Everything else in the painting is suggestive of dissolute and corrupted modernity: money; a lucky eight ball sitting on a lottery card; more roses, wrapped this time in cellophane; a bounty bar; condoms, and a bowling ball with the lustrous surface and the deep colour of a fat ripe aubergine. Beauty and decay sit side by side in uneasy balance.

All of these works are closely observed and realised with an unsettling, concrete exactness. The literalness of their execution has not rendered them lifeless. They are unsettling in their content, but most particularly because they seem to have been brought so absolutely to life - they hum with a kind of energy. The compelling dynamism and meticulous exactness of Dan's art are it's most striking characteristics, beyond his subject matter, and it speaks to two ideas that are significant in his work: firstly, quite early on he became fascinated by the experience of reproducing something tangible, of bringing something into being, which he describes as being almost like magic, and this is still something that excites him; secondly, he has found that in committing himself to the slowly acquired and daily practiced discipline of skilful making he is rewarded by



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both pleasure and solace - the pleasures of feeling competent and of being absorbed in his work, and the solace of alleviating and rising above the stresses and difficulties that he has faced in other areas of his life. He describes a kind of compulsive state of mind, whereby the more time that he spends immersed in the work, the harder it becomes to pull himself away from it. However, this is not to say that he is overly introverted. He says that art has taught him both how to be alone with himself and how to engage more fully with the world. Through practice, he has learned to switch in and out of work mode. He talks easily and eloquently about his work and is reflective and curious by nature. Although he has highly developed and distinctive technical skills and has established a rich visual language, he wants to grow through his practice and is interested in making looser, more expressive work.

Dan's talents and creative habits were nurtured in an artistic household. His father had been to art school and was a painter, although he had been reluctantly forced to find other employment to sustain his family, but it was his mother, a mosaic artist who he describes as 'strong and competent' who most encouraged him to be an artist. He went

to Brighton to do an art foundation course, with the intention of going on to university. However, he was picked up by a printed fabric design company and offered work drawing plant studies that would be made into repeat patterns, which meant that he could earn a living through his art. It was repetitive work, but it was technically challenging, sufficiently interesting and organised in such a way that he could manage his own time. Alongside this he was becoming involved in a graffiti scene in Brighton and had developed a parallel career as a professional roller-blader, touring the country's skate-parks doing demonstrations and promotions.

In this way he gainfully spent his early adulthood until a series of family crises prompted him to return to his family home in Gloucestershire. His father was suffering from a rare brain condition called Pick's Disease that resulted in early onset dementia when his mother became seriously ill with breast cancer. Dan came back to Cirencester to support her through her illness and to help manage the care of his father. Thankfully, his mother has made a good recovery, but his father passed away at the beginning of last year.

He has subsequently came to Stroud and to be near his partner – just as lockdown was declared. So, an early test for their relationship and the normally vibrant town reduced to the four walls of his flat. Happily, the relationship has thrived and as things start to open up Dan is eager to enjoy being part of a cultural community again.

Dan met his partner whilst working for Damien Hirst at Science – where she still works. He found making art for someone else too much of a distraction from his own art. Nevertheless, whilst his father had been unhappy about having to find alternative work, Dan is extremely pragmatic and has happily done a variety of jobs to earn an income that supports his practice and leaves him with the time and headspace to carry on drawing and painting for himself.

He also sells fine prints of his work in signed limited editions, which can be seen on his Instagram page @danstirling and via his website dan-stirling.com – both of which offer insights into his working processes, and, incidentally, where they are for sale.

THREE STOREYS

THREE STOREYS IS A MULTI-FUNCTIONAL CREATIVE VENUE IN THE HEART OF NAILSWORTH. OPENING ONLY IN SPRING THIS YEAR, IT IS QUICKLY ESTABLISHING ITSELF AS A SHARED COMMUNITY AND PROFESSIONAL SPACE, FACILITATING CREATIVE COLLABORATIONS AND EXCHANGES. I SPOKE WITH CREATIVE DIRECTOR SUSIE HETHERINGTON TO LEARN ALL ABOUT IT...

THREE STOREYS - IS IT IN THE NAME: THREE STOREYS, EACH WITH ITS OWN 'STORY' TO TELL?

Yes, and more. It is a play on words really: three different activities on each storey of the building and three different stories - 100 years as Nailsworth Brewery and then another 100 as the ex-servicemen Comrades Club, and now, we are the third story. We are a team of three too - Nicki our Director, Deb our Business Manager, and myself working as Creative Director. And we've really run with it - the three storeys are the 'Storey Makers' private artist studios on the top floor, 'Multi Storey' is where you'll find 'The Plot' café and 'The Setting' gallery, and our co-working space and meeting room 'Storey Book' is on the lowerground floor.

WHAT WAS THE DRIVE BEHIND CREATING THREE STOREYS?


Stroud has a number of excellent studios and workspaces now, including Victoria Works in Chalford, SVA in Stroud, and Inchbrook Mills on the outskirts of Nailsworth. But with such a dense collection of artists and creatively-minded people in the area, Nicki felt there was still demand, and when the Comrades Club came up for sale, the location felt right. The recent Select Arts Trail really highlighted the loop around the valleys that Three Storeys has helped to complete. We're very excited to join the other creative hubs, and also start a new chapter in such a historic and culturally important building for Nailsworth.

THE BUILDING DOES HAVE QUITE A STORY TO TELL. HAVE THESE STORIES BEEN WOVEN INTO THE RENOVATION AT ALL?

It is incredibly important to us to keep the history of the building alive. We've accentuated some of the original features, like the cast-iron columns that run throughout the building; these support a massive hidden tank in the roof that is a relic from the brewery days. And in the café, we've used the original bar from the Comrades Club, we've just updated it. When we were stripping back the building to its foundations - removing floating ceilings, uncovering old windows, removing the 80's decor - we revealed so much history. We recorded it as we went and now have a history display upstairs to document and share what we learned. We also spent time at the Nailsworth Archives to bring context to what we were revealing, but we want to learn more. In fact, on the 11th of September, we are opening the whole building for Heritage Open Days 2021 and one of the things we are really keen to hear are personal memories of the place. We don't want to lose that, we want to make sure it is recorded because it is an important building in the community and we want to keep its heritage alive.

THREE STOREYS IS DESCRIBED AS A MULTI-FUNCTIONAL CREATIVE VENUE WITH A UNIQUE COMMUNITY WORKING TOGETHER, WHAT EXACTLY DO YOU MEAN BY THAT?

We wanted to create a shared professional space where connections, collaborations, and skill-sharing can take place. When people work together across disciplines and industries, opportunities arise that might not have otherwise. So our resident artists might end up collaborating, or an artist from the studios might connect with a marketing professional from the coworking space, and who knows where that might lead? Whether artistic collaboration or skillshare, that really was the vision for Three Storeys - to create a space for collaboration. With more of us working from home, Three Storevs also provides a local space to allow for some home/work separation. For those travelling by bike, we have indoor and outdoor bike storage and a shower room too. And we are just a two-minute walk from the town centre. With COVID restrictions easing, we are planning regular social events for our tenants to build that sense of community.



YOU OPENED IN SPRING 2021 AFTER A COVID-RELATED DELAY, HOW DOES IT FEEL TO FINALLY START THE NEXT CHAPTER OF THE BUILDING?

It is amazing and rewarding to see momentum picking up and see the connections being made. We quickly filled the Storey Makers studios and have started a waiting list. The mix of disciplines throughout the building is just what we hoped for - from landscape architects and accountants in the co-working space to painters, and basket weavers in the studios. And it is lovely to feel the energy of the café and gallery - the space in the middle of it all.



THE PLOT CAFÉ AND THE SETTING GALLERY ARE OPEN TO THE PUBLIC, WHAT CAN PEOPLE EXPECT?

Three Storeys is a community space, so the ground floor - Multi Storey - is fully accessible and open to all. The Setting gallery has a broad range of really interesting exhibitions to visit in the coming months. You can find out about these on our website. The gallery space can also be hired for workshops, talks, even pop-up shops, so there's an exciting future ahead! But if you just fancy a good coffee with locally sourced beans and a locally sourced pastry, you can just pop into the café.

TELL US ABOUT THE NEXT EXHIBITION AT THREE STOREYS...

The next major exhibition is a really special one. Artists Alice Shepard Fidler and Rebecca Stapleford are here for three weeks in September, with the first weekend coinciding with the Heritage Open Day on the 11th. Their exhibition 'Leave / Stay / Arrive' is a response to uncovering the history of the Three Storeys building through the chaos of deconstruction, as Alice was a resident throughout the renovation. It will be really interesting to experience the exhibit alongside the Heritage Open Day - to explore the deconstruction and reconstruction simultaneously and experience how it has changed throughout its chapters.

HOW CAN WE GET INVOLVED AND BE PART OF THREE STOREYS?



I've only been collaging properly for a couple of years, before that I'd make one or two a year for fun and give them to friends or my wife. 
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
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

of London, with stunning views. "On a clear day," he says, "the postman used to say, 'I can see them having breakfast in Slad today'." The first decade of living there, he says, was "Frances' happiest, but more or less her last decade."

When it came to poetry, he says Frances was "kind of a purist," whereas he was "very much a jazz poet and performance poet. We were creative counterweights to each other." She died of cancer in 1983. "We had so much joy and then so much misery and despair, missing her," he says.

Phase two, in the cottage, saw Horovitz, "trying to be a good dad and make up for Fran's absence and get Adam through GSCEs and A levels." In spite of their loss, they managed to have quite a good time, he recalls, discussing books, going for walks and "playing hand tennis across the dry stone wall."

Horovitz lives in London now, but he will return to perform in November at the Stroud Book Festival. "There were always a lot of artists and poets around Stroud, as there still are," he says. "We did a lot of gigs that drew big audiences around here, so I'm hoping this book festival will do the same." He and Frances, he says, "pioneered literary festivals and particularly sundry overlaps between different art media." However, he is distressed that most "so-called art and literature festivals" these days, seem mainly to be concerned with booking best-selling stars, and making money, rendering them "pretty predictable and often downright boring."

That's not to say that some of the stars aren't authentic, but the scene has become too commercial. "My whole stance on society and art is very much with William Blake," says Horovitz. "Ignore commerce and hype and corruption, and instead stick to what we know matters, which is doing the best work we can and moving society away from greed, bad behaviour, intolerance and violence. As Blake put it, 'where any view of money exists, art cannot be carried on.""

2007 saw the publication of a 500-page book by Horovitz, called A New Wasteland: Timeship Earth at Nillennium (the title, a reference to T S Eliot's The Waste Land), bemoaning, he says, "ruthless megamarketing, the degradation of arms manufacture, trading and wielding on the part of political bleeders such as Bush, Clinton, Blair, Putin and Trump, sucking up to corporations and plutocrats, and telling everyone they've got to compete like mad to get to the top of the pile - which ignores everybody except those at the top of the pyramid, which of course crushes the majority. A sad state of affairs, but on the other hand, he says, "it seems to me that Jeremy Corbyn, Diane Abbott and Caroline Lucas and other such idealists keep the faith, and many poets and artists worldwide are concerned with continuing the resistance movement against these monstrous extremes of homo rapiens."

At his upcoming Stroud performance, Horovitz will read from his 1986 poem, Midsummer Morning Jog Log. "It's ostensibly a memoir of jogging round the valley," he says. All 679 lines of it were published in a hand-printed booklet, with delicate nature drawings by Peter Blake and a posthumous dedication at the front

Horovitz will perform, as he often does now, with his partner of the last four years, the singer-songwriter-guitarist Vanessa Vie. "She grew up in Northern Spain," he says, "but she's been in England the last 15 years. We are doing a lot together as a duo." A CD is in the works. "We'll be performing our settings of some Blake songs, including ones where we get audiences to join in. Blake's Laughing Song, for instance, which has refrains where everyone chants Ha Ha Hee, to lighten things up..."

NOT FAR FROM STROUD, A FEW MILES BEYOND SLAD, IS A RELATIVELY REMOTE NOOK, KNOWN AS THE SCRUBS. ONE GUY FAWKES' NIGHT IN THE LATE 1970S, THE GROUND THICK WITH SODDEN LEAVES, FIVE BARDS STOOD HERE IN THE DARK, HUDDLED AROUND THE BACK END OF THEIR HIRED VAN.

Tom Pickard, Allen Ginsberg and Peter Orlovsky were due at a poetry reading in town, but had got stuck in the steep valley where their hosts - fellow poets Frances and Michael Horovitz - lived. Orlovsky was Ginsberg's long-term partner, often referred to as "Ginsberg's wife, or husband," recalls Michael Horovitz. "A solid, heavyweight chap," he continues, "which came in handy when we had trouble getting the van to go up the hill again".

Horovitz had started publishing works by Beat poets, also including Jack Kerouac, William Boroughs and Lawrence Ferlinghetti, after launching the periodical New Departures in 1959 - his final year as a literature student at Oxford. During the 1970s, he toured the US often, where he and Ginsberg used to sing William Blake poems together. Horovitz has also been a driving force behind performance poetry for over 50 years, from his role in helping to gather an audience of 8000 to the Royal Albert Hall for the International Poetry Incarnation in 1965 (Ginsberg headlined), to over 35 years of Poetry Olympics events, up and down the country. Notable Olympians include John Hegley, John Cooper Clarke, Benjamin Zephaniah and Damon Albarn.

Musical collaborations have been many, including a recording in 2013 of his poem Ballade of the Nocturnal Commune, accompanied by Albarn, Graham Coxon and Paul Weller, which sold out on Record Store Day that year. The ballade was a rural rhapsody he had written many years before, at the family cottage in The Scrubs.

The Horovitzes moved to, what Michael describes as their "wild offshoot of the Slad valley," when their son Adam (who still lives and writes in Stroud) was a baby. The cottage was an idyllic antidote to the congestion

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MANDY ROBOTHAM

"I HAD A BABY AND THAT KIND OF BLEW ME OUT OF THE WATER IN EVERY SENSE OF THE WORD. I DECIDED THEN THAT I HAD TO BE A MIDWIFE...IT WAS DEFINITELY AN EPIPHANY OF THE TRUEST KIND."

That is not a common decision made at childbirth, but Mandy Robotham moved to Stroud, had a baby and changed career. She was a midwife in Stroud for nearly twenty years, but now Mandy is known to the rest of the world as a bestselling author; her first book A Woman of War was published in 2018 via HarperCollins and was an immediate success.

Mandy didn't start her career as a midwife, she started out as a writer. She studied Sociology and the University of Kent in Canterbury "I found it very interesting, but I did not want to be a sociologist or a social worker or anything like that. I discovered that I could actually work on the university paper so I just used to write to celebrities and ask 'can I interview you for our college paper?". From those interviews she built a portfolio which got her a job for a local paper in Finchley, and then promptly went on strike. "We were called the Finchley Fourteen..We were very much a David and Goliath, a little group." The strike lasted six months and they challenged the system that sought to come in and "annihilate the little people". It was a pyrrhic victory though "we all lost our jobs" and Mandy did get "a bit blacklisted" so it took her a while to get another. Undaunted, she worked as a local journalist in North London and covered the Broadwater Farm Three and worked for the Evening Standard contributing to City Limits and Time Out.

She was still a freelance writer when she moved to Stroud, but by the time her first baby was 21 months old she had started her training to be a midwife. "I kept on writing for nursing magazines and midwifery, mainly to finance my training." Soon she had two children and was kept busy on call, so writing had to take a back seat. "But it was always in the back of my mind and as the children got older, I started to think I'm going to write this book! I know there is a book in me somewhere. I know that's what a lot of people say, but if I don't get on with it it's never going to happen."

Mandy joined two local groups, one at Prema in Uley and the Gloucestershire Writing Group. She completed a Guardian Masterclass and decided to do an MA at Oxford Brookes University - part time (she was


still a midwife). "I would recommend that to anybody. or a similar course, because it just keeps you writing, you have got to do it, you have to meet the deadlines. it was invaluable." She did not go straight to publishing success but she did have a few ideas and it was a conversation with Katie Fforde that encouraged her to write. She explained an idea to Katie, which she thought would be a short story "That's not a short story!" she was told "That's a novel, that's your first novel." Challenge accepted!

And then came the rejections.

Still a midwife, still on call but it was the rejections that she found exhausting. Working with an agent didn't really work out either and so she decided to take a break...almost. Then someone mentioned that Avon (an imprint of HarperCollins) was taking submissions from unagented authors. She almost didn't send it off, fearing another rejection but... "I got this email and I remember opening it thinking oh it's another 'Thank you for ... but...' and I think the first line of it was 'We love this and we would like to offer...' I must have read it about 15 times before leaping around the room, doing all those cliches that you do - yeah you do them!"

That was A Woman of War "It landed on the right desk at the right time." Not only that, it sold well on publication, not always a given for first time authors... and Mandy was still a midwife.

Since A Woman at War, she has completed a book a year and her process takes about eight months. "I spend about two months researching - that's reading a lot of textbooks, watching films and reading in the British Library." She devours contemporary newspapers looking at the minutiae of the lives of the characters, what was advertised to them, what was in the news. After the research stage she writes for about five months which leaves a month to re-edit before sending it to her publisher. "I don't have the luxury of eight years like Hilary Mantel, but then again if I had a deadline of eight years I'd never get anything done, in eight months I can get it done! I'm a journalist through and through!"





MANDY ROBOTHAM The Girl Behind the Wall Paperback

Mandy is drawn to the history of WW2 and pre-war Germany and her depictions of that period have brought her many readers. The books also do well in America and Canada because, Mandy says, "They love WW2 fiction there - so it's a bit of a leap to go to the early sixties and take my readers with me."

The Girl Behind the Wall covers the impact of the Berlin Wall on two main characters and their sisters. Mandy is fascinated by the history surrounding that Wall "It took the western world by utter surprise, it literally went up overnight and people in Berlin woke up to their city carved in half." When she researched this novel, she managed (in between lockdowns) to get to Berlin to pound the pavements, find the right cafes and do a cycling tour of the Wall itself. The novel's publication is to coincide with the 60th anniversary of the building of that wall and will be available everywhere, including supermarkets (but get it from your local bookshop if you can!).

And is she still a midwife? "I absolutely love the life of a writer..." says Mandy. She stopped being a midwife ten days before the first lockdown.

ART WITHOUT CLASS

THOM DEANE AND STELLA HOWE CONSIDER THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN OPPORTUNITY AND CREATIVITY... Let's start with a big statement: art is everywhere. As young artists, we consider that art is an umbrella term for creativity and the desire to create is innate to everything we do. Our lives are constantly centred around the development of ourselves and the reimagining of the world around us. Through that practice, art forms a framework for our lives. So why is it that many view it as such a niche? Something for the privileged few rather than the public at large? The question of inclusivity in the arts is currently a hotly debated topic amongst artists and writers for this very reason. We think that without any effort to equalise the space art inhabits, to challenge the control exercised by an art world elite, we cannot change century-long tropes and truly revolutionise art practises.

We believe collaboration is key to making this happen. By this spirit, this article is reflective of the change we hope to enact. Thom is a member of the Working Class Creatives Database, a collective founded to highlight and share the works of underserved practitioners. Originally hailing from Stonehouse and currently studying BA Fine Art: Painting at Camberwell, their practice commonly amplifies the plights of the working class as well as challenging the ethics of their middle class counterparts in a provocative and edifying manner. Stella Howe is a Stroud based artist and aspiring writer, going on to study Fine Art at Falmouth University. She is currently considering ideas of the 'unknown'- exploring the facets of human behaviour through social struggles.

Our paths have both led to further education and study of art at a 'higher' level, but our journeys to this point have been wholly different. So in an effort to assess differing levels of accessibility to the arts, especially when experienced on a class-bound axis, we feel it's important to showcase the contrasting ways in which we have developed as artists up to this point.

Stella's exposure to the arts has been a constant throughout her life. Having two parents involved in the creative industries she has been provided with a wider lens than many can dream of or afford. Art was already the foundation she grew from, making her entry into the art world all the more inevitable. To dream is a privilege often overlooked, because in order to dream you must first be reassured that there is limitless potential. This limitless potential however can only truly flourish when supported by a like minded environment.

In order to contrast, now we turn to Thom's experience

Although instilled with a similar sense that they could achieve anything, we feel a contrast arises when observing the points our authors felt they could consider pursuing the arts. For Thom, the point where art felt like a valuable pursuit, one they could chase confidently, came at the age of 18. Spurred by the gentle encouragement of their college art tutor, suddenly a world of opportunity was opened. This exposure to art was like the cleaning of a lens that opened a new view on the future. As gratifying as this narrative may appear, it is important to assess however, the likelihood of this outcome coming to fruition. So was it simply chance that led Thom

to consider art? What if the teacher had been uninspiring? Or their method of encouragement had been different? Then we start to see an infinity of possibilities - and in many of them Thom is today not an artist.

During the mid 18th century there arose a separation of 'fine art' from the everyday. The emergence of art as a commodity had set it apart from the reach of anyone other than the moneyed classes, even if the artists themselves continued to come from backgrounds nowhere near the status of their new patrons.

Autonomous art became something in and of itself, a rare 'aesthetic' experience, compared to the earlier focus on religion. But this distinction began to build an intensely classist divide within art, it picked apart the un-cultured from the cultured solely on the basis of their societal status. The exponential knock - on effect of this commodification can be traced into the commercial art world we see today.

A 2018 article by Christy Romer in Arts Professional cites a report which claims that even though "a third of the UK workforce comes from working class origins, just 18.2% of the music, performing and visual arts workforce is working class." This leaves us questioning why it is that art excludes the working class. Despite the working class making up less than 1/15th of the population, we feel there is an overwhelming void where their presence should so rightfully be.

From our own experience we find it integral to our practice as artists that we engage in activities that uplift our fellow creatives, most importantly those suffering most from austerity and hardship. Actions like these, as far as an individual's efforts are concerned. are important elements in working towards equalising the space art inhabits. Today, unpaid work within the arts sector - one of the most profound barriers to poorer people's access to the art world - is still highly prevalent. It could be viewed as classist that unpaid work - e.g. as interns / studio hands - is trumpeted as anything other than inhumane. To put it plainly unpaid work is not an option for many working class people. When your main concern is economic survival, unpaid work is never going to be a viable option. Work in the arts is already grossly undervalued and with the added setback of class hierarchy, as a career it can become wholly unsustainable.


As aspiring young artists, we choose to believe in the possibility of an art world that is wholly accessible to as many people as possible. Growing up and working in Stroud, we have tried to realise this ethos through engagement with collectives like 'Mould' that focus on community outreach and engaging young people. Moving forward, we want to continue our promotion of these ideals as we aim to liberate all fellow artists. So let us all strive to change. To change art as a medium that enriches the lives of the many, rather than the few.


