

STROUD HAS BEEN MENTIONED IN THE MEDIA RECENTLY AS ONE OF THE MOST MUSICALLY EXCITING TOWNS IN THE WEST OF ENGLAND, PRODUCING A PLETHORA OF YOUNG AND SONICALLY DIVERSE BANDS, A NUMBER OF WHOM ARE BEGINNING TO REACH OUT BEYOND THE COMFORT ZONES OF THE FIVE VALLEYS TO MAKE A NAME FOR THEMSELVES. AT THE FOREFRONT OF THIS EXPLOSION OF TALENT IS HOT FEET,

WHO DIPPED THEIR TOES INTO THE FOLK ROCK SCENE AND PROMPTLY SET ITS
WATERS SIZZLING WITH THEIR FINELY WROUGHT DEBUT EP 'WOOD HOUSE',
PRODUCED BY LAURA MARLING COLLABORATOR PETE ROE, TWO YEARS AGO.

Since that EP's release, the band have been hot footing it around the country supporting other bands, landing festival gigs, appearing in session for Whispering Bob Harris, being played on Radio 6 by Guy Garvey and going from strength to strength in a laid back but relentless fashion. Their second EP, 'Mist is Dust', was released last October and is a thrilling aural experience and a marked progression in sound and confidence; it's a potent stew of folk rock, souped up with smatterings of soul, jazz and prog influences and Marianne's soaring voice, which comes across as a glorious fusion of Grace Slick and Sandy Denny. It's a record that grows inexorably in the ear the more one listens to it, with hypnotic, exquisite songs such as Divine Silence and Weaving Water.

I met three quarters of the band for an interview in their spiritual home, The Prince Albert in Rodborough, which, if you don't know this already, is one of the best small live music venues in the county. The Albert has been a testing ground, support network and safe space for Hot Feet as they have developed their sound and it's clear that the band feel comfortable there as they stroll in for this interview.

Main songwriter and lead singer Marianne
Parrish is away in the Lake District writing new
material, so I spoke to (the impossibly tall) lead
guitarist Jack Page, bassist Lachlan McLellan
and drummer Rob Pemberton. The band are
on record as saying that Wood House, though
it was written in Sweden and recorded in
Scotland, is very much about Stroud and the
pastoral existence they lead here (the band
members' CVs include shepherding and dry
stone walling) so I started by asking where Mist
is Dust is set.

"We'd need Marianne here to answer that fully," says Rob, "but certainly the feel of the EP stems from Stroud. We recorded it in Soup Studios in London for a contrast from the isolation of the recording process of 'Wood House'."

"For 'Wood House'," adds Lachlan, "a lot of the sound came together a week before, as it was the first time we'd worked with the producer and he had a big influence on amping up our sound. 'Mist is Dust' came together more fully formed as we'd learned from that experience and applied what we'd learned to the recording process."

"It was more of a rigid band process," says Jack, who is about to move to London. "We'd toured the songs for a year."

The band state on their website that they are intent on world domination ("our two favourite words" says Jack, with a wry laugh, when I bring this up) but the heart of their music will always be anchored in Stroud: "We're four people with roots here" says Jack.

"We can't really avoid the dynamic of relationships built in Stroud over a long period," says Rob



"It's that community support thing," adds Jack.
"The Albert has been key - but wherever you
go you bring it with you. Wherever we go, we'll
always be involving the Albert in some way!"

"And if we meet other bands we inevitably send them back here," adds Lachlan with a laugh.

The Albert is the cheerful and willing host to part of their fundraising venture for the recording of their debut album, which they're working on slowly and steadily ("we've got half the album demoed up," said Rob, "but we want to get it right!"), by getting the band to sell pizzas there every Friday night; an excellent opportunity, they say, to compare notes on what new music they've heard and to keep the band focus together, listening to the music that's influencing them and keep the momentum public, rather than holed up in a studio. It's an excellent symbiotic relationship, and Lotte Lyster, Prince Albert landlady, is as enthused about it as the band.

"I first saw Jack and Marianne play as a duo in the Woolpack in Slad," she says, "before Rob and Lachlan joined. They always had something, but with Lachy's bass lines and Rob's tight drumming the band became sensational. As they have developed over the last few years their live shows have become a roaring mass of energy. I went with them on a mini tour last year - we started at Broadcasting House, where their live recording of Sedation was a shiver-inducing experience. I was so proud to see them playing national radio."

Hot Feet will once again be touring the Festival circuit this summer, in between bouts of preparing their new album ("on our own, which is new") and putting out a new live video, which should hit YouTube in the next couple of weeks. They'll be performing on the same bill as Tinariwen in a wood in Kent, at Fire in the Mountain Festival near Aberystwyth and more besides, but if you don't want to travel too far,

the band will be curating a stage at the Stroud Fringe Festival over the August bank holiday, in cahoots with Smugglers Records, at which they'll be presenting "band's we've met on tour and like" with a world music vibe.

"We can't tell you more - yet - other than that we'll be playing as well, and that we're excited about the bands we're hoping to get," says Jack with a smile. It should be a thrilling end to the summer for Hot Feet. Don't miss it.

THE STROUD AMERICANA FESTIVAL HAS ANNOUNCED THE FULL LINE-UP OF ACTS
SET TO JOIN THEM OVER THE WEEKEND OF THE 5TH 6TH AND 7TH OF JUNE THIS YEAR.
THE LINE UP INCLUDES A HUGE RANGE OF INTERNATIONAL ACTS WITH MANY COMING,
AS YOU MIGHT EXPECT, FROM THE USA.

The Americana music genre puts Blues, Folk, Country and Acoustic playing styles into one big melting pot to provide one of the best loved flavours of music today, even if you don't know the term "Americana". California, Georgia, Detroit, and North Carolina are just some of the states represented by the musicians from the USA when Lewis & Leigh, Brooks Williams, Brandt & VerLin and Dana & Susan Robinson take the stage at the Stroud Subscription Rooms during the festival.

Joining them are bands of equal calibre based in the UK including The Nelson Brothers, who perform as Sadie and the Hotheads and are the band of Elizabeth McGovern - Cora, Countess of Grantham in Downton Abbey; Michael Messer, a renowned slide guitarist and tutor who now regularly performs abroad, playing with Stroud based The Earl Trio; and many more.

Other highlights include the return to the UK of Brandt & VerLin. The duo were formally based in Detroit USA but, with Sarana VerLin now based much of the time in Stroud (not least so she can oversee the Stroud Americana Festival!), Billy Brandt is flying into the UK so the pair can tour, including their festival appearance in Stroud.

Billy recently won Best Americana
Recording at the Detroit Music Awards,
adding to the many accolades the pair
have collected both individually and as
a duo. Among her many other awards,
perhaps the most notable for Sarana was
being voted into the Detroit Metro X Music
Hall of Fame in 2000. Together they were
voted Best Duo in 2010, also at the Detroit
Music Awards and Sarana VerLin has been
Best Instrumentalist in both 2009 and 2011
for her mastery of the violin.


Of the many other bands on the schedule, perhaps one of the most eagerly awaited acts is Hurricane Road who make the journey to Stroud from Scotland. Stevie Agnew, who fronts the band, had his musical career inspired by his father Pete Agnew, of rock legends Nazareth. Steve's Lyricist, Percussionist and Producer, Chris Smith, has played with bands from Big Country to Dougie Maclean, and the rest of the band glitters with musical talent and experience.

The Vagaband round off Saturday.
They have amassed a respectful following across the UK festival scene and beyond.
Appearances include Glastonbury, Secret Garden Party, Bestival, Camp Bestival,
Croissant Neuf & Maverick Festival - the headline spot two years running.

The festival begins on Friday the 5th of June on the Twitchett's Coffee House stage in Stroud Subscription Rooms. Invited guests will play feature spots displaying some of the best Americana talent in the area and there will be some opportunities to play "open mic" style for those wishing to join in so be sure to get there early to sign early!

On Saturday the line up moves to the main ballroom of the Subscription Rooms. With the music starting at 12noon, you are invited to come early to enjoy the bars and cafés in the building and get in the mood.

Sunday's starts program begins in the early afternoon in the Black Book Cafe, perhaps over a coffee and lunch? The evening program is then hosted at The Prince Albert when the Toy Hearts, now known as Hannah Johnson and the Broken Hearts, round off the weekend.







Born in Burton-On-Trent and raised in Derbyshire, Dennis Gould is not just a man defined by his letterpress printing, although for this he has become renowned in the local area and beyond. His background is marked by his pacifism, by a stint in the army and a spell in prison, and finally, by his poetry. "DH Lawrence was a major


influence on my writing, on writing poetry, because he's well known as a novelist, but he's also a brilliant poet...I began writing after reading his essays and letters and poems because they seemed very simple, but of course simplicity is the hardest thing in any field."

In printmaking, Dennis has found a way to present his poetry that perfectly echoes the beauty of his prose and in combining these two passions he has created a career that spans almost twenty-five years. But life wasn't always so straightforward and the circuitous route Dennis took to get to this point has had a dramatic impact on the man and his art.

After leaving school at sixteen, Dennis spent two years as a trainee hotel manager before joining the army: "I saw these wonderful adverts – 'join the army, see the world' - and I was very naïve, but I did

ask if I could make maps." Dennis was enrolled at the School of Military Survey near Newbury and spent eighteen months there before being posted to Cyprus. (Interestingly, he frequently utilises maps in his artwork, contrasting their fine detail against the heavy print of his letterpress.) On leaving the army, Dennis spent a year with the International Voluntary Service and then became involved with the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament and the Committee of 100. It was during this time that Dennis and thousands of others were imprisoned, yet he speaks passionately about the peace movement of the sixties and it is clear in his work that this is a subject close to his heart.

In a roundabout way it was Dennis's pacifism that brought him to Stroud in 1989, when he came to visit his old friend and fellow peace activist, John Marjoram. But it was printmaking and the beautiful



countryside that forced him to return; when asked what he loves most about the area, Dennis said, "I like the diversity of the people, the fact that it's a working town and it's got lots of craftsmen and artists, poets and writers. And I love the countryside, I write a lot of poems about my cycle rides and the landscape."

Dennis's smooth transition into life as a 'Stroudie' is evident in the vast quantities of his work that is sold both on his stall in the Shambles market every Saturday

morning and at Made In Stroud on Kendrick Street, yet despite the popularity of his prints (which are replicates of both his own poems and the works of people he respects such as Bob Dylan and Lawrence Ferlinghetti), Dennis admits that for the first ten years of letterpress printing his lack of technical knowledge meant he still considered himself an apprentice. Now, he passes his skills on to those wishing to experiment in the trade themselves, opening up his shared workshop for free and demonstrating the process of setting a poem or a business card: "The essential thing is for people to feel relaxed when they come in here..."

It is this generosity of time and knowledge that perfectly characterises Dennis. As I leave his workshop, keen to explore my armful of goodies, I find myself inspired by his unique adaptability and as I search through the pamphlets and poems, newspaper and barely-dry prints, I soon find myself reaching for my notebook eager to pen a verse of my own.

LITERATURE - JONNY FLUFFYPUNK



JONNY **FLUFFY-**PUNK

BY JAMIE BALDWIN

JONNY FLUFFYPUNK IS A MAN OF QUICK WIT, TOUCHING METAPHORS AND A SIMPLY QUITE WONDERFUL MOUSTACHE. I CAUGHT UP WITH STROUD'S SILVER TONGUED COMIC POET AND HIS YOUNG SON, PERCY, AT THE UPPER LOCK CAFE.

What inspired you to do stand-up poetry?

I've always written poetry, but in the past it's mainly been boring political stuff pointing the finger at other people. Then I realized it was far more interesting pointing the finger at yourself. I started working with Tony Allen - the godfather of alternative comedy - when I lived in London and loved it. To be honest I found it tedious watching poetry, pretty lifeless. I enjoy the performance.

Your stand-up poetry is still quite political though perhaps in a more selfdeprecating way?

Some of it is still political but delivered through my stage persona. I'd like to think I'm making the political personal and the personal political. I'm not sure you can turn the lens on yourself without being self-deprecating.

We're all idiots trying to make sense of it all as we spin round and round. You have to laugh at the ridiculousness of it all.

What tips would you give to wannabe comic poets?

Avoid rhyme. In fact declare war on rhyme. Why restrict yourself? And also do stuff that is true to yourself, because you won't fool anyone if you don't. My poetry is just as much about form as it is content. A well-timed awkward pause or good use of attitude can have great comic effect. Finally, speak about things people identify with like your relationship with your mum or dad.

How have you found Stroud since moving here and previously living London and Brighton?

I really, really like it. It's taken a while to find my feet, partly because with a little baby I didn't go out for about a year! But as a small town it's unparalleled. It has all the pleasant things of living in the countryside, but without sacrificing the culture you get with big cities. Although that's in no small part down to the SVA. So many small towns are a hell of watercolour landscapes and tribute bands. Stroud is so much more than that. The only thing missing is the sea.

Tell me more about the Penny Gaff events you run at the SVA. How are they going?

Yeah, they're going great. We usually hold them every two months with occasional extras. We've been getting between 60-100 people each time which is

And where does the name Penny Gaff come from?

In the Victorian era, music halls provided genteel entertainment for the affluent middle-classes, whilst rough house popular entertainment was the staple of the great unwashed masses. These were known as penny gaffs and would include clowning, dancing, variety shows and story telling. Today's Stroud equivalent is really a sort of alternative cabaret with a spoken word spine. It hasn't always got to be funny but it must be interesting. I'm, always looking out for new local talent, the more bizarre the better.

What are your plans for the summer?

I'm performing at several festivals over the summer including WOMAD, Shambala, Glastonbury and Port Elliot. Oh, and Edinburgh Festival in August. That'll be my one man performance 'Man up,

Jonny Fluffypunk' which I describe as a one hour low-fi stand-up theatre show about big dreams, small victories and the hero within, however unpromising the exterior.




