

# KIM FRANCIS

The physical aspect of creating art has long been something that pulled Kim towards sculpture, even when she was studying to become a jeweller at Central St Martins. "I always wanted to do sculpture," she says, "but my tutors urged me to do jewellery instead!"

Kim was intrigued by the relationship between art and the body—something

For me, Kim's ability to develop such an intuitive relationship with her materials is one of the standout points of her work. I ask her if creating in such a hands-on way means the subject matter influences the material, or if it's the other way around. "It depends. Sometimes a shape in my head or a clay model will lend itself to a certain

that she has explored through her jewellery as well as her work as a tattoo artist-but with sculpture it became clear that the body could be a tool as well as a canvas. "When I finished my jewellery degree, I found myself whittling wood. I'd always loved the process of carving. Later, under the encouragement of an amazing Welsh woodcarver, I found myself a chainsaw and started exploring bigger ideas. It kind of evolved from there. I found work in various bronzecasting foundries to learn more about sculpture, and eventually discovered my love of stone in Italy."

Just looking at her work, Kim's affinity for stone as a medium feels incredibly visceral. "I love [stone's] stability," she says. "The fact that it doesn't crack or move as wood does I find very reassuring. I love the density and weight of stone (even if that can be problematic when moving it from A to B!) And despite the sweat. I love the physicality of carving it. I'm also impressed by the incredibly long evolutionary process in the earth that gives each stone its particular property. I love the nobility of stone, how a totally unprocessed, raw material can be turned into something beautiful."

stone because of its colour, hardness or texture, and sometimes a piece of stone might invite a certain form for the same reasons. Sometimes I don't have a plan at all and just let the stone lead the way. That kind of free carving is very exciting."

One of Kim's most notable techniques is combining materials with opposite qualities. "I like the experimental pieces best," she says. "I think my favourite ones are some pieces where I've mixed other materials with the stone, like inlaid gold or feathers." Encasing feathers in stone emphasises the respective qualities of both–fragility and solidity–in a way that is both oxymoronic and tenderly beautiful.

When it comes to sourcing her materials, she tells me that she begs, borrows and steals. "I sometimes pick up small pieces when I travel, but I mostly buy offcuts from fellow carvers. There is a great solidarity among stone carvers." I really like the way that even just gathering her supplies feels very genuine. There's something of the hunter-gatherer about it, collecting pebbles and feathers from the wilderness, and it compliments the primeval nature of her work.

With her devotion to the natural form evident in every piece, it's hardly surprising that Kim has been chosen to feature alongside a variety of other nature-inspired artists in the Art Unbound exhibition at Painswick Rococo Gardens this summer. "Dominic Hamilton, the director of the gardens, approached the curator Anna Greenacre at OnForm-the renowned stone sculpture show that she curates at Astal Manor in Oxford-and they dreamed up the idea together. Both very creative and enterprising minds!" The Gardens says that the exhibition aims to "embrace the natural and creative energy of the rococo period and connect people to both art and the environment", and in that sense it is the perfect venue for Kim's sensorial work.

Exhibition aside, what's next for Kim Francis in 2019? "I'm not sure. I think I'm interested in where sculpture crosses over with the work I do in tattooing. I think at some point I might lean back into some kind of worn sculpture—body adornment/jewellery type of thing—or just smaller precious objects.... Who knows! I'm always inspired by something."

When I ask her if she has any advice for our readers out there who fancy dipping their toes into sculpting, she says: "The best way to learn anything is by doing it. Model some clay, carve a piece of wood–or a carrot! Sculpture can be made out of anything, I think it's a question of finding a material and visual language that speaks to you."

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# **GALLERY PANGOLIN:**

# **JON BUCK**

The sculptor Jon Buck will be exhibiting a new body of work at two locations this spring: Pangolin London and Gallery Pangolin, in Chalford. An ardent advocate of conservation, this exhibition celebrates the beauty of biodiversity with an exciting combination of timeless forms and intricate surface motifs.

A regular exhibitor with Pangolin, Buck's work has been characterized by playful interpretations of natural, animal forms, rendered graphically as glyphs – graffiti-like shapes – and an experimental approach to colour and patination. He has often used high-gloss finishes and bright, lively colours that emphasize humorous and energetic qualities.

His work has recently seen a shift in focus, from his familiar subjects – what the artist refers to as his 'animals of the mind' – to developing a wider perspective, one which looks at the incredible variation of the life that has evolved and exists alongside us.

Buck has always felt compelled by concerns for the environment, in particular the human relationship to the natural world. His experience working as a bird-keeper at Bristol Zoo in his youth was an important creative inspiration, and through his knowledge of nature and science he began to investigate the ways in which sculpture could stimulate a deeper primal physical response. In earlier works Buck explored surface textures and markings imprinted into the surface of the bronze, which led to an interest in pushing the boundaries of colour. Recently, his colour palette has evolved to radiate softer hues, as with 'The Whole Caboodle' and 'In Ferment', and more earthy, organic patinations. Both the colour and texture of these new works are imbued with a mineral quality, reinforcing their connection to

The forms of these new pieces evoke ritual objects: reliquaries, totems, funerary vessels and bells. Whilst retaining their characteristic humour in the raised graphic imagery, they have taken on a more sombre feel than the earlier works. They are like petroglyphs, densely incised with portentous messages from another, earlier, civilization.



One of the largest works in the exhibition is a maquette for 'Ark' which was first exhibited at Chester Cathedral and marked an important development in Buck's work in using raised animal glyphs on the surface of a simple form to communicate the cultural imagery that is immediately conjured by the title. Another major new work in the exhibition is one of three bell forms, 'Taking the Toll'. Buck writes that: "I have chosen to use the bell motif for a number of reasons. There is of course a long-standing tradition of making bells in bronze casting but in addition bells are redolent with cultural meaning and there is an inherent ambiguity in how they are used. In many societies bells are rung joyously in celebration but at the same time they can also be tolled as dire warnings of imminent danger. I would like my current work to embrace both these aspects. The surfaces of the bronzes have an

intricate network of relief motifs celebrating the biodiversity of the natural world. At the same time these bells can also be seen as a visual lament for the pressures we are imposing on our natural environments and the creatures that inhabit them."

'Time of Our Lives' is an important solo exhibition, which not only celebrates life and its incredible diversity but also warns us of the future. It comes at a poignant time and will resonate with us all.

For anyone who hasn't visited Gallery Pangolin, it is one of the (partially) hidden gems of the Stroud Valleys. Initially set up to showcase the excellent work that was being made at Pangolin Editions, it has subsequently expanded to become a major exhibition venue with a unique connection to a site of art production.

To visit the Gallery, you must make your way through the precinct of the Pangolin foundry. Everywhere you

will see evidence of work in progress, finished objects and the detritus of casting and fabricating sculpture. If you visit during the week, you will see the foundry workers going about their business, engaged in heavy, dirty, manual work. At the rear of the foundry, you will alimpse the River Frome, running clear through the ribbon of industrial development along the Golden Valley. By the time that you enter the incongruously pristine white gallery, you will recognise that the sculpture on display is not the product of some kind of magical process, but that it has been made of material, shaped and patinated, in collaboration with Pangolin's highly skilled makers. This may seem like an obvious observation, but art galleries, the modernist trope of the white cube, separated and distanced from the flow of everyday life, can be problematic spaces... and art can seem similarly detached. Buck's work is anything but.

It is the product of a tangible reality. The link between foundry and gallery seems vital, making us more attentive to material, finish and process, and, drawn in by its sensual and playful surface, it invites us to contemplate man's place in nature.

### DAVID TEAGER-PORTMAN

A sculptor and graduate from the Royal College of Art David has exhibited at the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition, Turner Contemporary Margate and the Saatchi Gallery. In 2014 he was the only sculptor finalist at the Threadneedle Prize, Figurative Art Today and in 2018 he was selected as a fellow at Chelsea College of Art. His sculptures are illustrative and quasiallegorical, the figures in his work become characters in a story of direct as well as ambiguous and duplicitous meanings. His work is concerned with humanity; its hopes and fears, triumphs and failures, its inevitabilities and its desire for permanence.

### SAMMY ADAMS

Sammy has lived and worked in Rodborough for the last 30 years having gained a BA in design from UWE Bristol. She has worked in community-based art projects, with the environmental centre and with local schools to help children create and develop their skills. In her work, she uses mixed media using found and natural elements to create pieces that are inspired by her love of natural forms and our coastal landscapes.







# TRACY SPIERS

Tracy is an illustrator and writer with a passion for telling stories in a playful, engaging and colourful way. Small, with a big imagination, Tracy enjoys turning ordinary objects or everyday scenes into something fun. As well as over 30 years working in the media, including many years with the BBC, Tracy has a Master's Degree and first class BA Honours degree in illustration. She enjoys working with simple tools such as pencils, pens, collage, colourful inks and digital forms of mark making.



### HELEN LOMBERG

Helen's most recent project is sheep and lambs for the City Farm in Gloucester and also a Gloucester Old Spot and piglets done at the Malvern Spring Fair (currently on display on the Walls roundabout in Gloucester). She set up the Gloucestershire Arts and Crafts Center in the City nine years ago in which 30 local people sell their work and run courses. Helen teaches at Nature in Art, Prema, Highgrove and Waterperry Gardens and experiments with growing willows at her home in Butterow.



### DEBS PAPROSKA COLE

Debs work is figurative, based on the human form. For her, sculpting is a mindful, meditative process of capturing the emotions and feelings and the subtle interplay between them, as well as the bone structure, muscle tone, proportion and position of the person in front of her. She's currently experimenting with more representational figures, exploring emotional and aesthetic concepts in terms of the subject matter and how individual works of art are interpreted and evaluated. Debs is a founder member of the Cotswold Sculptors Association.



### TOM HARVEY

Tom has been working as a wood sculptor for over fifteen years, often on large-scale commissioned work. His work can be found in private collections and public places including the Open University headquarters in Milton Keynes, Regents Park, Highbury Fields and numerous other public locations around the UK. He likes to explore particular themes in his work such as the relationship between humans and the natural world and of how we are so similar yet set apart from the creatures that we share this planet with.

### MARION MITCHELL

Marion makes unusual decorative planters, bowls and vessels suitable for anywhere in the garden that needs colour and texture. Her amazing depth of palette and intricate floral designs are inspired by early English countryware and medieval ceramics and textiles. Each piece is hand made using traditional methods such as coiling or press moulding and once fired is a blank canvas for the free and bold embellishment she enjoys creating. All her work is high-fired so that every piece can remain outdoors all winter.





### YVETTE GREEN

Yvette is a stained glass mosaic artist based in Cirencester. She produces vibrant and lively mosaics for the home and garden inspired by the intense colours of nature and her love of flowers and birds. Yvette has exhibited widely around Gloucestershire, and mosaiced one of the large hares for the Cirencester March Hare Festival, 2014 and for the Cotswold Hare Trail in 2017. She is a member of the Cotswold Craftsmen and the British Association of Modern Mosaics.

# SHANE WHITE

Shane is a traditional blacksmith and engineer specialising in all aspects of ironwork from restoring or conserving historical ironwork to hand forging and designing new bespoke unique ironwork to engineering and fabrication. He works with any form of metal, from ironwork and steel to a variety of alloys. Based in his own workshop/forge in the Cotswolds, Shane also teaches at the rural Agricultural University, Cirencester.





### DAVE KING

David is a stone carver, sculptor and dry stone waller. His work is mainly inspired by the natural forms seen around his studio on the edge of the Cotswold Water Park. With the exception of lettering, David carves intuitively, allowing the form to reveal itself as he works. Highlights include competing in Bristol's Festival of Stone, demonstrating at the Bradworthy Arts Festival and featuring in BBC 2's 'Paul Martin's Handmade Revolution'. As well as the UK, David has exported to France, Germany and Canada.

### CHRIS BECKETT

The forms, structures and patterns found in nature and ancient cultures, are where Chris draws her inspiration to create installation garden art, in the medium of fused glass. She works experimentally and intuitively with the qualities, colours and textures of glass, adding detailed drawing and natural light to enhance and magnify details. This makes her pieces uniquely individual. Chris also facilitates collaborative community works of art, to raise money for charity.





# **GABIREL BENNETT**

Gabriel trained at Bath College and has been working as a stonemason for over ten years. He is drawn to the process of carving sculptural forms which gives a good counterpoint to the strict geometrical discipline of masonry. The necessary time and effort it takes to draw the form from the block makes carving an evolving process. The end result is often a distant relative to the initial sketches. More recently he has enjoyed letter carving which combines discipline with a certain amount of creative freedom within the design.

### ADRIAN BATES

Adrian's work seeks to explore the relationship between inner space and outer form: where they meet and merge one into the other. He also looks to capture a sense of movement and timeless elegance, which requires each piece to be refined and pared back to emphasize its essential qualities. This allows the form to shine through, unencumbered by additional pattern or colour, although texture is retained or added to subtly contrast different surfaces. Although following a series of original forms, every piece is unique and each responds slightly differently to the making, drying and firing process. All are frost and water resistant stoneware and suitable for display outside all year round.





### FRAN LAW

After a long career in Nursing Fran started working with glass about six years ago. She combines her glass work with her love of gardening.
Fran works with Cliff Mills, a farrier/blacksmith from Cam. Cliff is also a gardener and much of his metal work is for outside display. Fran's glass is fused, which means it has been in a kiln and heated to a high temperature. It is double thickness so quite robust and tough. She has a preference for rusty ironwork but the metal can be painted.


### Invisible College Stroud Presents: The Art, Ecology and Science Fiction Talks with Agnès Villette – Introduced by Dr John Cussans

Angès Villette is an artist photographer and film-maker working between London, Normandy and Paris. Her work explores environmental, technological and social issues with a specific focus on nuclear environments and the Anthropocene. Agnes will be speaking about her current project: 'Alien of the Species' a photographic series about 12 invasive insects that have recently arrived in Europe. 

# **GIFFORD**

"I geek out all the time in circuses," says Nell Gifford, her turquoise eyes glittering under a crown of red roses as she pulls a little jar of sand from the pocket of her fluffy coat. "This is from another circus in Paris. That's the kind of thing I just find in my pockets. I had to bring this back because I wanted to find out what it was but, you know - walking around with a sample from a French circus in your pocket that's sort of the epitome of geekiness."

It is the interval of Gifford's Circus 2019 show 'Xanadu' and Nell and I share a bench in the bustling tea tent, which is alive with excited chatter and sparkly bunting. In the middle of the tent stands a display table decked out with crisp new copies of Nell's recently published children's book 'Nell and the Circus of Dreams'.

Although it speaks of dreams, the book draws its characters very much from real life. When I ask Nell how much of herself is in the lead character of the book, she responds with a disarmingly straightforward "Pretty much all. The dream of running away to the circus has been my life story. I wanted to tell that story for children." Even the chicken who leads young Nell to the circus comes directly from Nell's own childhood: "When we were little we actually had a really sweet pet

chicken called Rosebud, who did sleep on our bed and all of that. She's a reallife character."

The story also speaks directly to the very real experience of being a child with an ill parent – something Nell experienced with her own mother and is experiencing now as a mother herself, who was very ill at the time of beginning to write this book: "The central character's mother is ill. I wanted to write about the boredom – how boring it is for a child to have an ill parent."

The illustrations for the book are also drawn closely from real life. Nell's publishers at Oxford University Press brought her together with illustrator Briony May Smith, and together they translated the art and the heart of circus life into vibrant images which tell the story of little Nell's visit to the world behind the velvet curtain. Nell tells me it was tricky trying to fit all of the circus into one book, and so she has more books planned for the future!

I ask Nell what is the gift that she had received from writing this book: "It made me more aware that the circus is quite a simple story," she tells me. "I'm always trying to overcomplicate things, but now I'm starting to understand that magnifying a simple idea is better than complicated ideas that are hard to follow." The idea for Gifford's Circus this year comes straight from a sixties summer of love. The performers present a love-drenched, technicolour spectacle of song, dance, acrobatics, horsemanship, juggling and clowning all decked out in long hippy wigs, glitter galore and even doves!

At the end of the show, I am lucky to catch the weekly Q&A session with performers. The line-up features famous faces like Tweedy the clown, returning favourites such as Emmanuel the Italian acrobat and new stars like Lil Smith, who grew up watching Gifford's Circus. Following the theme of the book, I ask the performers about their earliest memory of feeling inspired to join the circus. "When I was young I really loved monkeys," begins Nell, "I wanted to be a monkey trainer in the circus, but it wasn't really to do with the circus so it's strange in a way how it's worked out." For Lil, her earliest memory was watching her Aunt Nell ride an elephant in a circus in Germany: "I was really young and I remember thinking that must be the coolest job ever." she tells us. Emmanuel shares the story of his childhood as part of a family of acrobats who ran a circus.

Not everyone who performs in the circus is born to it, and for children who dream of joining Nell has the following piece of advice: "If you want to join the circus the best thing to do is learn dance, gymnastics and languages.

Everything else will follow." Nell explains that, in her experience, people tend to bring to the circus whatever skill they have naturally and then to train and exaggerate that skill until it becomes a performance.

Nell's skill growing up was riding horses. She began riding at the age of 6 and has since ridden horses – and elephants! – in several circus rings around the world. In the first half of this year's show, Nell appears in the ring on a showy grey stallion alongside her daughter Red riding a beautifully dappled rare Eriskay pony. Mother and daughter float around the ring in a dreamlike harmony to the dulcet tones of the house band performing Kirsty

MacColl's 'Days'. It was in this moment that Gifford's Circus truly touched my heart and I confess I cried real, salty tears into my popcorn as it did. "I love doing the act with my daughter," Nell tells me as I gush at her about the beauty of it, "and I hope she loves it too, I think she does. It's a really special thina."

Nell and her circus of dreams have now taken to the open road for the summer season. Tickets are available from the Gifford's box office or through the website giffordscircus.com. Copies of 'Nell and the Circus of Dreams' can now also be purchased online at giffordscircus.com/shop and local bookshops including Stroud Bookshop and the Yellow Lighted Bookshop in Nailsworth.

Many skilled arts professionals live in the Stroud Valleys. Their jobs regularly take them away from home, whether it be directing a film in London, Paris and LA, or conducting an orchestra in Sydney or Rome. These hills and valleys are a joy and solace to return to, from high-profile work in the public

eye. But what happens when the skilled professional decides to permanently come home? What will happen to the wealth of knowledge s/he has amassed and shared? Will they write their life story? Or will they, as they dig their garden or bake a cake, remember the work they did and the places they inhabited as if it was a dream?

Bill Alexander is a British Theatre
Director, with a particular interest in
Shakespeare. He has lived with his wife
Juliet Harmer in a rural cottage 5 miles
from Stroud for 40 years or so, and
spent the best part of his life working
away from home. Now 71, he has
decided he doesn't want to retire from
work but to "retire from going away
from home."

"I don't want to go away anymore. Directing plays is the only thing I've ever been able to do, but there isn't a theatre here in the woods where we live. I want to do interesting work, the kind I've done all my life (which has a lot to do with exploring Shakespeare and the way Shakespeare works) here where I live, so that I can get up in the morning, hope that Juliet will give me a lift into Stroud (I don't drive) do this

thing I love, and come home again."

Bill is setting up what he initially will call 'The Shakespeare Club'. He is putting out a call to professional actors living in Stroud. Actors who are between jobs or who have currently stopped working. Actors who'd be interested in meeting on and off for a couple of hours in the day to discuss Shakespeare, work on texts, experiment with staging of scenes, talk about different styles and approaches, the meaning of the plays and the relevance of Shakespeare as a writer. "Professional actors who are interested in joining a Shakespeare workshop - actors who haven't got much experience of Shakespeare, or do have and want to have more - to meet together with me in a room and explore the paradoxes that exist

within a group of actors and director attempting to make sense of these plays. Why is Shakespeare the greatest dramatist that ever lived? This is easily said, but not so easily explained."

He wants to run enjoyable sessions with a group of actors who happen to live here in Stroud who want to get a better understanding of Shakespeare. Bill has been directing Shakespeare productions for 40 years, but he says; "Every time I open a Shakespeare text and start thinking about it, I become more and more aware of the things I don't know. The thing is working out how to do it. No one is the ultimate expert, no one knows 'all about' how to do Shakespeare."

At 12 years old Bill was first introduced to the Bard at school by an inspiring English teacher who directed an annual Shakespeare. Bill played Perdita in The Winter's Tale. He gave a self-conscious performance because he didn't like his frock; "I looked like a mediaeval Barbie Doll - the boy playing Autolycus was a horrible bully and made my life a misery but I got my own back and in my last year I played Prospero and through that I realised that I loved Theatre, there was nothing else I wanted to do."

At Keele University studying
English and Politics in the early 70's
Bill formed an experimental theatre
group called Guerrilla Theatre. Lots of
companies at that time were breaking
the boundaries of theatre convention,
doing away with the proscenium
arch, and creating drama in nontheatre settings. After graduating Bill

performed on Ed Berman's 'Fun Art Bus' – a double decker red London bus. Actors entered from a hatch above the driver's seat and performed to the audience on the top deck while driving through the streets of London. He soon became a Trainee Director at the Bristol Old Vic, then assistant director at the Royal Court, then 14 years with the Royal Shakespeare Company and 7 years as Artistic Director of Birmingham Repertory Theatre, followed by free-lance work, directing plays at the National, various regional theatres and the USA.

Now he has decided to settle down at home, to the potential benefit of lucky actors living locally who'd like to explore Bill Shakespeare's work with Bill Alexander.



Tobias Jacob and Lukas Drinkwater have been described as "stand out new folk" by the BBC - but they are much more than that. Following the release of their debut full length album in March I caught up with one of half of the duo Lukas Drinkwater on a Friday evening in Nailsworth to talk about writing, the recording process, touring and their penchant for wild swimming...

Congratulations on the first full studio album, This Old River - you decided to crowdfund this album, how did that idea come about and what was the response like?

We've always had a lot of support from our fans and we haven't been particularly pro-active in recording and releasing new music. We have been working as a duo for five years and only recorded an E.P and a live album. People were asking us at gigs about material coming out, and there is no reason why we haven't put anything out, we have just been very busy! We crowdfunded enough to initially make a E.P. but there was so much interest the crowdfunding got up to enough to record a full album, our first studio album. We were so happy people supported us and helped us out.

You are rightly lauded as a very accomplished act, how does the writing and recording process work between you and Tobias?

Tobias is the writer and he is a prolific writer, he's already got 10 albums worth of songs that he's written in different guises, either solo or in bands such as Roots Union, and lots of other bands he has fronted over the years. He just writes and writes and writes. more than anything it is trying to pick the best of his material, it's all great. He just doesn't write a bad song. Then we work out the arrangements, often playing out live and seeing where they go - we don't rehearse loads as we like that spontaneity in the set. We mostly recorded new songs on this album, this was all fresh, there's quite a lot of improvisation on it. Tobias would bring the song to me, and play it through once, then I would join in through the second play through writing parts and arrangements as we went along, making a few adjustments here and

Is there a theme running through 'This Old River' and can you tell us about the song There's a Shadow on the Sun.

So the title track 'This Old River' – is all about Tobias' grandfather Eric, and his memories. He was so fond of Lancashire, he believed that everything good came from, and was invented in Lancashire. The song has a lot of quotes from Eric, and lots of reminisces from childhood. That sort of sets the

tone, it's a nostalgic album, a lot of delving into the past. The song, There's a Shadow on the Sun – stands out in subject matter on the album, it's taken from firsthand accounts of life in Syria during the war, Tobias constructed the story from someone who is caught right in the middle of the bombing – someone who loses his wife in the war. We decided it would be a really poignant song to add to the album.

This album also coincided with your largest tour to date, and did you get to do more wild swimming like you did on your last tour?

The last tour we did was our 'Waters Of England' tour in September 2018, where we made a point of discovering wild swimming places every day - by going out to our fans and asking for recommendations. We would wild swim before or even after the shows, occasionally taking a late night dip. This Old River tour was in February and March - and the appeal for outdoor swimming was considerably lower. We had a few dips and we even wore wetsuits and one particular dip in the Lake District was far too cold measuring between 0-2 degrees - we do consider ourselves pretty hardy, but not that hardy...

I was delighted to hear you got to play your song 'There's a Shadow on the Sun' on BBC Radio 4's Loose Ends – what was that experience like?

That was an amazing stroke of luck, I happened to vaguely know one of the producers on the show who's a great supporter of new and original music.

That programme is a huge platform, it has millions of listeners, and they have some really big names on the show. We gave them a few options of songs to play, and they selected There's a Shadow on the Sun - as mentioned earlier it has a great story and talking point that fitted in well. It was a terrifying experience to be on there, as it was recorded live alongside the likes of Alexei Sayle and Paul Whitehouse, plus Tana French, who's an amazing author. We actually traded a copy of our album for her latest novel called The Witch Elm - which is totally brilliant by the way. We got through that nerveracking experience, delighted that the guests loved the performance and we got lots of great feedback and gained a few new fans from it.

When not out touring (or wild swimming) Lukas can be found in his studio Polyphonic Recording (facebook.com/PolyphonicRecording) on Lower Street in Stroud.

# OUT 14th JUNE: BORDER LAND BY SIMON MCCORRY

Border Land is the new album by Stroud based cellist and composer Simon McCorry. Originally born in London to mixed Indian/British heritage, McCorry trained in cello at The Centre for Young Musicians and Morley College then studied philosophy at Durham University. Border Land will be released on the 14th June, and follows the albums Blue in 2017 and Song Lines in 2018.

The album is a rich combination of field recordings, adept loop-based cello compositions and atmospheric improvisations that explore the rich sonic possibilities of the cello through a host of treatments and effects chains. The results of these experimentations are diverse to say the least, from the droning stillness and devastating harmonic simplicity of Spheric to the abstract microtonal atmospheres of Not One Thing, Border Land recalls post classical work from greats such as A Silver Mt Zion at their most plaintive, and Stars of The Lid at their most majestic....
