



Meet Joe Acheson.

To say that Joe's career is varied is a significant understatement. His musical life started in church choirs before taking detours through heavy metal and funk bands before discovering instrumental hip hop and drum n bass then creating the Hidden Orchestra with which he has made his name.

A key musical turning point was a day at the age of 15 when he bought 4 CDs that would change his musical outlook. Endtroducing by DJ Shadow, Richard D James by Aphex Twin, Insides by Orbital and Tally Ho by Wagon Christ. Overnight his taste and musical ambitions shifted

Listening to hip hop he became fascinated by sampling. Initially not realising that these were taken from old soul and funk tracks he soon began experimenting with recording pieces of music with which he could create two bar clips to loop and rearrange. He then went back to the source via jazz, unpicking drum solos from Buddy Rich and Joe Morello.

Creating the Hidden Orchestra with a manifesto to create electronic music with acoustic means Joe soon gained momentum. Signed to Tru Thoughts Records he has toured Europe numerous times as well as playing Glastonbury and supporting Bonobo along the way. The music of the Orchestra really is the culmination of his whole musical journey encompassing field recordings, classical instrumentation and dance grooves to create something really unique. As Joe says "Everyone is the sum of their influences but originality is about how you bring them together."

The next Hidden Orchestra record is imminent. To Dream Is To Forget sees a more stripped back approach from previous releases and will be the first release on his newly-minted label Lone Figures. He had an aspiration to make each track under 4 minutes and, while this hasn't quite been achieved, there is no doubt that the record is more immediate than previous work. There will be a full UK and European tour to support the record including a Bristol date in October. I ask about a potential Stroud show and the response is "watch this space..."

The tour will feature long term collaborators and drummers Jamie Graham and Tim Lane as well as Tom Newell who will provide visuals. A notable absentee is Poppy Ackroyd, Joe's partner. Since the birth of their second child they have collectively juggled their careers to ensure childcare is as much a priority as supporting each other's music. Joe went on Poppy's European Tour last year but didn't get to see a single show as he was looking after his son.

Talking to Joe it is clear that environments are central to his work and he frequently uses field recordings. Indeed,

his first album Night Walks was generated as a result of walking through his village and local forest late at night, listening to the different noises that exist once the traffic has faded away. Another key environment for him in recent years has been hospitals. He was commissioned to make non repetitive, infinite soundscapes to support coma victims in their recovery for a hospital in Paris. While initially covid brought the project to a standstill some of the project has now been used with those recovering from the virus. As he says himself "Hospitals can be an alien and hostile environment sound wise with all of those bleeps and noises" so creating something to improve mortality has been very cathartic.

Another opportunity arose through working with Kew Gardens to create installations in two forests in Sussex and Scotland while another saw him developing a soundtrack for a puzzle computer game called Creaks. Recognising that the music for such a medium could become repetitive he used artificial intelligence to randomly regenerate each musical part he had created enabling the player to hear something new each time they played the game. Using software to create arrangements and structures rather than in creating full compositions is where the real benefit lies as far as he is concerned. Al, while a threat for some in the music industry can also create some great opportunities to achieve the previously impossible.

It's all a departure from the Hidden Orchestra itself but Joe loves the variety that his career encompasses. Able to dial up or down particular aspects he doesn't know where he will end up. In the meantime he's very busy – pulling together mixtapes for Huey Morgan, preparing for the tour and, of course, looking after his children in his new home of Stroud.

What is clear is that his passion for sound remains. He talks enthusiastically about African music, Khruangbin and Four Tet but is mindful in his own music to leave the emotional canvas blank so that 'the listener can interpret it for themselves.' Having heard To Dream Is To Forget I can assure you that there is plenty to enjoy and an emotional connection to be made-search it out...

KLANG TONE RECORDS

RECORD SHOPS ARE EXTRAORDINARY PLACES. DURING MY TIME WORKING BEHIND THE COUNTER IN HMV IN OXFORD IN THE LATE 1990S, I SOLD MILES, MINGUS AND COLTRANE ALBUMS TO RADIOHEAD'S THOM YORKE (COINCIDENTALLY WHILE THE BAND WERE RECORDING KID A AND AMNESIAC, ALBUMS KNOWN FOR THEIR JAZZ FLOURISHES), WHILE A YOUNG SAX VIRTUOSO AND THEN HISTORY STUDENT, SOWETO KINCH, BECAME A FRIEND OF MINE (YEARS BEFORE HE WAS NOMINATED FOR THE MERCURY PRIZE). ADD TO THIS AN ARMY OF PASSIONATE REGULARS WHO WOULD RECOMMEND CLASSIC ALBUMS BY KING CURTIS, KEITH JARRETT, ALBERT AYLER AND CARLA BLEY, IT'S FAIR TO SAY THIS PERIOD OF MY MUSICAL LIFE WAS INDEED, LIFE CHANGING.

Stroud now boasts three vinyl record shops – a fact that draws expressions of disbelief from musicians and music fans who've yet to visit the town – and all three are vital community hubs for the Five Valleys' vinyl hungry residents. Yet the one that's been hitting the local headlines of late is Klang Tone Records.

It's been a whirlwind year since its marvellously maverick owner, Sean Roe, first opened on the London Road, in its hip but cramped 'recordshop-art-gallery-performance-space'. The store won Stroud News & Journal's New Business of the Year Award in June, and has gained an army of passionate supporters who love its underground, rebellious, flying-by-theseat-of-its-pants ethos. Such success has meant bigger premises were needed and Sean has thankfully found what promises to be the ideal space, at 7a Lansdown Road. It's already looking fabulous, adorned with Klang Tone's now famous bell-bashing moggy, beautifully painted by sign writer Eleanor Harper, just in time for the shop's unofficial opening as part of the Hidden Notes festival.

Sean's innate enthusiasm for music began in his childhood home in South Africa, where his mother played accordion and piano, and his father's love of Broadway Musicals and the Great American Songbook, were the bedrock of his musical education, yet "Probably caused my loathing of vibrato and a complete right angle turn in my musical tastes!"

The DIY ethos of Klang Tone was also shaped by his vouthful adventures in Johannesburg where. in the pre-internet age of the late-1970s, early-1980s information about gigs was disseminated through flyers and cheaply Xeroxed posters on record shop walls or outside night clubs. "My friends and I hitched across the city most weekends, going to gigs at The Box Theatre in Wits University and clubs like Metal Beat and all the dives and small venues in Hillbrow like The Chelsea and L'Chiam where I first saw bands like Sakhile, Malopoets and Malombo," explains Roe. "It was these encounters with black jazz musicians that had the biggest impact on me, getting me to dive deeper into the world of South African jazz and Township music. I clearly remember going down to Kohinoor Record Shop where I bought a copy of Dollar Brand's Mannenberg Is Where it's Happening, I'd say that's one of the most pivotal moments along with the discovery of the jazz section there, which exposed me to the music of Charles Mingus, Ornette Coleman and Thelonious Monk."

Yet Klang Tone has always been more than just a record shop, with its parallel series of weekly performances and Sean's especially fertile Weird Sh!t gigs. While jazz features strongly, there's a fascination and passion for pure sound - which comes, in part, from the spirit of London's leading avant garde music venue, Café OTO in Dalston. As Sean explains: "OTO' means 'sound' in Japanese and fundamentally I think their ethos is focused on artists and musicians who think seriously about the production of 'sounds' more than making 'music'. They also have a great selection of records (they have their own label too) and an interesting selection of books. 'Klang' also means sound (in German) and I think I have adopted a similar attitude in the way I have programmed events at my shop on London Road and I have every intention of continuing with this programme in the new place on Lansdown."

Indeed, the new location for Klang Tone will be considerably bigger and offer new opportunities for performances and in-store events. Sean is already gathering ideas: "My partner Ritsuko Hidaka (as Paganhill Vintage) will continue playing a part in the overall design and layout of the space and will be selling her selection of 20th Century Modern ceramics textiles and furniture." Sean's son Akira, who designed the company logo, will play a more prominent role, creating more designs for T-shirts and tote bags, while Roe himself will continue to curate Klang's predilection for unusual and exceptional music, while also stocking new releases from distributors he likes. "I want my shop to be a place of discovery -I hope visitors can find something they've been looking for ages for, or to hear something in the shop for the first time and fall in love with it."



Klang Tone will continue to hold exhibitions too, with the next starting at the end of October with works displayed by Romi Mori (who played bass for garage rock psychobilly punk legends, The Gun Club,). "She's a remarkable photographer and we'll be showing a selection of her live documentation work and portraits of musicians in her circle," elaborates Sean. These include photos of Jeffery Lee Pierce, Nick Cave and Kid Congo Power among others. And on the official opening night on the 7th October at 5pm, there will be an "unusual" three-way live poetry jam with Jo Casling, James Dick and Eley Furrell with Sean accompanying them on modular synth, "playing incidental music oscillations".

Klang Tone feels like a focal point for musical rebelliousness in Stroud - what are Sean's thoughts on providing an outlet for wanton creativity and weirdness? "I want the shop to feel like a home for creative risk takers and outsiders and like Cafe OTO I'm prepared to give someone a chance to do something in the shop, to perform or exhibit - particularly if I believe in their work and think it deserves an audience. In October the shop will also be launching a record label with Radiolarians, a new Stroud based music project that... sounds like Aphex Twin jamming with Hans-Joachim Roedelius (German electronic musician and composer) - a form of 'Cots-otherwoldian' wonky bedsit electronica! This has spent a long time gestating so we're very excited about this eventually coming out in late October. It's been mastered by local legend ED DMX, with cover art collage by DETRITUS PLATES



(who's part of the Chalford underground), with liner notes by the legendary Matt Ingram (aka Woebot), who also has roots in Stroud. We'll be having a listening party in the shop before it's official release date at the end of October."

And to cap this cavalcade of creativity, Sean is presenting a big night at the Goods Shed on 19th October, informally celebrating one year of Klang Tone Records with an exciting Weird Shlt gig: "KIKI Band from Japan are an incredible four-piece unit who fuse prog rock and free jazz. They're led by fiery altoist Kazutoki Umezu (aka Dr Umezu) a Japanese jazz giant who has performed with so many legendary players in the USA, Europe and Japan. This gig will be an absolute must see event! I have to say a massive thank you to Atsuko Kamura who has facilitated their performances in Stroud."



It feels like this is just the start of a new creative renaissance in Stroud – with Klang Tone ringing the changes – albeit, in a wonky, weird kind of way.

LILY CHEETHAM

WHAT DO YOU LOOK FOR IN ART? FOR LILY CHEETHAM, FOLK ARTIST, PROFESSIONAL FRAMER AND PAPER CONSERVATOR, HER ART COMPRISES THREE F'S - FOLK, FABRIC AND FEMINISM - ALL OF WHICH WILL BE ON DISPLAY IN HER NEW EXHIBITION 'PIECEWORK' AT WEVEN THIS MONTH.

Cheetham was raised by her Nan and identifies as a "nankid": a child brought up by grandparents and who consequently can sometimes seem old before their time. It was Cheetham's Nan who taught her how to sew the kind of patchwork you'll see at Weven and one of the pieces for the exhibition brings this concept full circle as a fitting tribute: NANKID is a paper patchwork sewn together to form an intricate backing, on which the word NANKID is painted in signwriting. I was lucky enough to see this piece up close when I interviewed Cheetham and the intricacy of the design is stunning. The family connection is deepened by the paper used for the patchwork backing, which is text and images that didn't make the final cut of a limited-edition, handcrafted letterpress book by Elizabeth Grice about Cheetham's great-grandparents, Norman Janes and Barbara Greg, both of whom were artists. In this way, Cheetham demonstrates how her art's always deeper than just decorative but, at the same time, she's careful to ensure the context and backstory of her work never tip over into abstraction or esotericism. As she says, "I don't like art which is over-intellectualised. It should stand alone as a clear visual message."

After gaining a degree in photography from Bournemouth University, Cheetham worked as a photographer on a cruise ship for eight months but ultimately turned away from photography ("too sterile") and returned to her lifelong and familial relationship with textiles. For Cheetham, art made from fabric is tactile and multilayered: "It's never just' a quilt: there's always a story behind it." Her art is also sustainable, given that nearly all her pieces are made from second-hand fabric, including lace from her Nan's wedding dress and offcuts donated by friends in Stroud who work in the textile business. She's self-taught in making stained glass too, a medium which also features in some of her pieces for the new exhibition.

Born in Hertfordshire, Cheetham came to Stroud in 2010 and worked as one of Damien Hirst's full-time painting assistants for two years. She then began working part-time for Tate Britain as a specialist in paper conservation; in 2015, she and her partner Matt Curtis started Archetype Fine Art Services, a bespoke framing and specialist fabrication business, which is based in Thrupp and counts the Tate Gallery as one of their long-term clients.

She's held one exhibition before, at Lansdown Hall in Stroud in 2012, which mostly featured patchwork pieces displayed on canvas stretchers and printed with reproduced family photos. The inspiration for Piecework began during the pandemic in the first lockdown, when experimenting with art helped her make sense of a strange time. Lockdown gave her a new freedom and confidence to create whatever art she liked, just for herself and without worrying if other people would like it, the latter being an artistic mindset she describes as "crippling". In this way, Cheetham categorises Piecework as a celebration of what's sometimes termed "outsider art": work from artists and writers who are self-taught and who create art which "comes from a real place, born of everyday people.. people who make art because they need to make art, almost as a form of survival." Textile folk art is often anonymous and Cheetham explains that this is because the stories behind fabric and patchwork often originate from women, who were historically less visible. Happily not in this case: feminism will be at the forefront of the exhibition in patchwork pieces displaying phrases such as For the Problem of Being Female (taken from a 1960s Valium advert), The Menopausal Shrew and The Joyless Career Woman. Moreover, the history of fabric is interwoven (excuse the pun) with a much wider social and political history, including the British slave trade and cotton mills and, in a neat circle, she tells me that her forbears were mill owners in Manchester.


The exhibition at Weven in Stroud town centre runs for one week, starting with a private viewing on Friday 27th October and ending on Sunday 5th November. Weven is an initiative conceived by Rhia Davenport,











a crafts and folk enthusiast from Devon who's devoted to all things handmade. Cheetham met Davenport when they were both working for Damien Hirst, and they're also both members of Boss Morris, Stroud's famously funky Morris dancing group. Cheetham was one of the original members back in 2015, as she already knew founder Alex Merry and Morris dancing was a natural fit to her interest in "folksy art stuff". Furthermore, her sewing skills come in handy to Boss Morris as the dancers design and make all their own costumes. Morris dancing as a subject hasn't yet featured in her art but she's certain it will at some point.

The Piecework exhibition includes a ticketed event on the Saturday evening (28th October), where Cheetham will host a panel discussion on Folk, Craft and the Feminist Voice with special guests Laura Moseley and Nell Leyshon. Laura Moseley is a craft researcher and creative producer based in Cambridge who runs Common Threads Press, which recognises a world of art history open to people from all research areas, backgrounds and financial situations, rather than a select few. Nell Leyshon is a dramatist and novelist and also – another family folk connection – a cousin of Cheetham's. Leyshon's play with songs, titled 'Folk', was inspired by the true story of folklorist and song collector Cecil Sharp and ran for two months at the Hampstead Theatre in London.

Before our interview ends, Cheetham shows me a few more pieces destined for the exhibition. In addition to NANKID, I get to handle some clear 'stained' glass frames that sandwich fragments of fabric between them, rather than the usual stained glass, to bring colour and detail into each tiny window. They're beautiful and it's clear from the work involved that this is a labour of love, not commerce. One of the last things she tells me is that her Nan still sews patchwork to this day and I'm sure she must be proud of her granddaughter keeping the family tradition of folk, fabric and feminism alive in such an inspired and inventive way. Don't miss the chance to see Piecework and this original outsider art exhibition for yourself at Weven this October – you won't be disappointed!

JAKE POND

"THE IDEA CAME TO MICHAEL EAVIS IN A DREAM. WELL, THAT'S WHAT HE SAID, ANYWAY!"

Jake Pond was instrumental in creating the upgraded Temple venue at Glastonbury. It's a 3,500-capacity rave arena that he helped redesign in 2017. Made out of wood and polystyrene, you'll no doubt be familiar with it if you've ever been to the festival, as I'm sure many people reading this article have. The official Glastonbury website describes the Temple as being 'born from the free-party scene, inspired by ancient civilisations and tribal ceremony, and reimagined as the spiritual heart of Glastonbury. Where music, mysticism and unity collide, and the spirit of the rave takes hold'.

"It used to be much smaller," Jake explains, "around 1000 capacity. The original venue was Michael Eavis' dream. I led on the redesign and helped renovate the look of the stage and DJ booth. Essentially, I ruined Michael's dream or at least made a version of it on steroids! The rebuild was a huge team effort as well, with many talented people involved in its upgrade." Jake has also been heavily involved with the Boomtown festival near Winchester since 2014, building installations and designing sets, including the Metropolis stage which caters for House, Funk and Disco music. On top of this, he's spent many years designing t-shirts, posters and flyers for festivals and art projects, and his body of work is extensive enough to put on display, which is something we'll touch on shortly.

Jake lived in Nailsworth when he was younger, but later spent ten years travelling around Europe with a company called Total Resistance Sound System, making artwork for rave and techno parties. "It was all hand drawn back then," he says. "Rudimentary and all that. There was certainly no photoshop in the 90s!" On his return to England, Jake gravitated towards higher education and in 2007 he graduated in fine art at Brighton Met, before finding a studio and settling in the town, where he made his living painting portraits. But in 2014 the valleys called him back and he took up a technician role at Stroud School of Art. Nine years on from that long-awaited homecoming and he has now taken the plunge and become a full-time freelance artist. In some ways it's a leap of faith, and yet his track record is such that opportunities will surely be knocking on his door at regular intervals. "I've been used to working long hours in my day job and then working till midnight with my own stuff," he says. "So having all those available hours dedicated to my own ideas might take some getting used to. In fact, I still do most of my work from 6-9am and then 10pm-1am. My body clock hasn't reset yet!'


To showcase his lifetime of work, Jake will be having a retrospective exhibition at Studio 18. The exhibition will run from 30th September until 15th October and as well as all of his old graphic design works, it will include many of his old record labels, posters and flyers going back as far as 1995. "There will be about 300 pieces in total," he says, "including some pages from the graphic novel I am currently working on. I haven't had the chance to do a solo show for over ten years. It's exciting, cathartic, and I also really want to support Zac Walsh, who is doing such a great job managing Studio 18."

The graphic novel is Jake's current creative venture, something he is collaborating on with his good friend Simon Mitchell. "Simon is an amazing screenwriter. He's been collecting stories from the people he has met at festivals and gatherings over the years, many of which are rich, odd, absurd, even. When he showed me what he'd written, I knew that I had to get involved. He's since turned these stories









into a graphic novel script, which I'm now illustrating. It's called Jitterbug, and we're five chapters in. Hove working on it, not just because it's great but because it also offers me a tight brief to work on. Hike that, it's novel." (No pun intended). The story of Jitterbug centres on Fly, a teenage boy from the wrong side of town, whose adventures take him from a botched drug deal and into battles with, among other foes, Nazis and aristocrats, all under the guidance of a 6th century Chinese warrior-philosopher called Sun Tzu! Bonkers, it may sound, but I've seen some sample pages, and it's just the sort of fantastic-realism story that I like to get lost in. If it appeals to you, check out Jake's website and then visit his exhibition at Studio 18.

ALEX COLES

WHAT DO KENDRICK LAMAR,
JONI MITCHELL AND THE VELVET
UNDERGROUND ALL HAVE IN
COMMON? ACCORDING TO
PAINSWICK-BASED ACADEMIC
ALEX COLES, THEY HAVE ALL
RECORDED 'TAINTED' LOVE SONGS
- SONGS WHICH, RATHER THAN
SAYING 'ILOVE YOU', SAY - AS
COLES PUTS IT, -"ILOVE YOU, BUT
IN AN UNUSUAL WAY."

A few years ago, art and design professor, Coles shifted his critical gaze towards popular music and after his first book 'Crooner' (Reaktion 2023) which forges links between Sinatra, Grace Jones and Nas. has now published 'Tainted Love: From Nina Simone to Kendrick Lamar'. Each of its eleven short chapters takes a pop song and dissects it through the lens of inspired research and lucid prose, explaining what makes them tainted. What is fascinating is that Coles has chosen songs from often well-known artists but which do not - with the necessary exception of Soft Cell's titular hit - represent the artist's typical style. "I'm always drawn to the borders between disciplines and genres,"says Coles, in his Merseyside baritone, "I did a book a decade ago that had a really pretentious title 'The Transdisciplinary Studio' - all about there being no borders between art, design and architecture. I also did one for the Tate called 'Design Art' which was all about the interface between design and art." So. the songs in Tainted Love are straddling or moving between those borders too? "Yes. Tainted love songs always seem to happen when something quite extreme has happened to the songwriter.'

Without giving you the full plot spoiler of Coles's track choices, some of the key ones are Roxy Music's 'In Every Dream Home a Heartache', a tune from their 1972 debut album about a man's love for his inflatable doll; Paul McCartney's 'Here Today' a love song from his 1982 'Tug of War' imagining what Lennon would have to say about their relationship, PJ Harvey and Nick Cave's mid 90s murder ballad 'Henry Lee', which kickstarted the duo's doomed romance, and Charlotte and Serge Gainsbourg's notorious 'Lemon Incest'.

"Whether it's Ferry falling out with Eno on the Roxy Music track, or the Nick Cave and PJ Harvey relationship on 'Henry Lee', tainted love songs seem to come after something tumultuous has happened to the artists," says Coles, "it pushes them to an extreme of one sort or another. The Macca track is a good example of that. For him to be that reflective and to not be saccharine and to be able to say he loves someone once they're dead. The tainted love song almost finds each of the performers at their optimum moment. Also, a lot of them, their peak has already happened - Macca, Nina Simone, Sinatra in the late 60s, Gainsbourg in the 80s..." So, is knowing the backstory necessary for the listener to appreciate or identify a tainted love song? "Yeah, I think so. Except for the really literal ones - although it enrichens them." It certainly prompted this listener to dust down his unloved copy of McCartney's 'Tug of War' for the first time in many years.

Interestingly, Coles did not always select the songs based on his own personal taste, "I'm not a massive Soft Cell fan," he says, 'Tainted Love' was one he "felt compelled to put in." Regardless, his enthusiasm for describing sound and words is palpable, "Writing about music was like a fresh page! Like, how would I do this? I've got a feel for these things but no training in how to analyse them." I suggest he might have felt freer and less restrained writing about pop instead of art and design, "That is exactly how it feels; you feel more direct and more passionate somehow, whereas when you write about art you are constantly second guessing yourself and the reader, because you have the depth of 40 years of that particular field and the writing on it."

In his Painswick study, Coles nonetheless embarked on some serious research for the book. It is supported by in-depth biographical references as well as cultural discourses around each artist and period. One joy is the way he feels free enough to lean away from his main subjects and write tangentially – for example, in the Kendrick Lamar chapter, he sweeps through

analyses of Donny Hathaway, Marvin Gaye and John Lennon; in his Roxy Music chapter he calls on his art expertise to explain the influence of Patrick Hamilton and the 1950s art collective The Independent Group.

So now he has defined his term and given us some examples, surely there's a parlour game to be played in spotting the tainted love song. I suggest to him he uses his patent Coles Taintometer and play we play three rounds of 'Tainted or Untainted':

The Supremes - 'Stoned Love'

"Definitely tainted! What's amazing is that some of those songwriters were feeding artists like Gloria Jones, the Supremes and the Shirelles, stuff that the singers infused with as much emotion to carry them off but I think for the most part, the singers didn't fully get them. Like Gloria Jones said about the 'Tainted Love' lyrics, when she thought about it later on, 'for a Catholic girl it was really odd"."


Buzzcocks 'What Do I Get?'

"Oh definitely, I love that song! You could have all these subcategories of the Tainted Love genre and this is the Passive Aggressive one."

Bon Jovi 'You Give Love a Bad Name'

"Ohhhhh yes! I wouldn't have thought about that. Class! I was going to include Michael Jackson's 'Dirty Diana' in the sequel ideas at the back of the book. And there would be any one of a number by my favourite Robert Palmer too, like 'I Didn't Mean to Turn You On."

So, what's next for Tainted Love? "Well, we've had book launches in Birkenhead, Huddersfield and Bath, and there's going to be one at The Whitechapel Art Gallery at the end of November. I'm also teaching a Tainted Love song series in New York at (legendary culture and community centre) 92nd Street Y." Readers not planning a trip to the Big Apple next month can rest easy though, "We're planning to do a book launch at Sound Records in Stroud." Taintometers at the ready!
