

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
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

This landmark publication will be the subject of a special celebration at this year's Stroud Book Festival on Sunday 12th November, 6.30 – 7.30pm at the Sub Rooms. A fitting finale to the entire Festival, the event will feature readings of Laurie Lee's poetry both from Jessy, and from Stroud poet Adam Horovitz; as well as an in-conversation interview with Jessy and long-time custodian of the Laurie Lee estate, Norah Perkins about the creative process behind the anthology's creation.

It's no exaggeration to call that process a labour of love. Over a decade in the planning and curating, much of the impetus behind the book came from Jessy herself. "Laurie's work has been in and out of print for years, and during that time I've had so many people enquiring where they can get hold of his poems", she tells me when we speak on the phone. "I was in the lane in Slad one day some years ago and a tourist came up to me: and said 'are you Laurie Lee's daughter?", and I said 'yes'. And she said to me: 'well why on earth can't I get his poems anywhere?' And I felt rather ticked off. So that really spurred me on".

Understandably, it took some years after her father died in 1997 before Jessy felt ready to delve into his archive. But when she did so it was a revelation. "There were about 700 files of his poetry and it was almost impossible to know where to start: I didn't know which poems were in print and which weren't". As she worked her way through the files, Jessy gleaned a great deal about her father's creative process. "Laurie did extraordinary things. If he changed one word, he'd re-write the whole poem. So often I'd find 10 pages of the same poem; with just a different word, or a comma in a different place on each". While most were typed - "he'd tap away with his two fingers - he never learned to type properly", remembers Jessy who still has one of his typewriters - others were handwritten in copperplate that was sometimes difficult to read. "I could see where he was getting tired or when it was late at night. But it was clear he thought and felt about his poetry so deeply - it's pretty staggering. His focus was extraordinary".

Jessy's discoveries were galvanising. "I thought: all of these poems need to be collected....they need to be in one beautiful edition. So Norah Perkins and I badgered Penguin and they were wonderful and agreed". The subsequent process of curating the collection took several years, due partly to the pandemic, and to the fact that Jessy was also caring for her mother Kathy who died last year. "There were

so many files, and Laurie reworked so much. So sometimes Norah and I had to make a decision as to which version we should present". Jessy pays tribute in the book's Acknowledgements to Norah's central role in collating and ordering the material.

The result is a book that feels essential for any lover of poetry - particularly a Five Valleys-dwelling one – to own. In shades of green and cream, the glorious cover design by Stroud artist Andy Lovell appropriately depicts Swifts Hill, a location both Jessy and her father have such an intimate connection with.

As did Jessy's mother, Kathy Lee to whom the new "Collected Poems" is dedicated. Is the book also a tribute to her? "Yes. It grew upon me that it would be. I often talked to her about putting together the collection, and she'd say, 'yes, darling, you must do it'. But sadly because of her Alzheimer's I don't think she realised it was actually going to happen. It does rather break my heart that she can't see it". Jessy tells me she wanted to dedicate the book to her mother because while many of her father's poems are dedicated to other people, including Jessy herself, none are directly dedicated to Kathy.

To commemorate both her parents, Jessy has chosen an utterly beautiful, previously unseen poem to serve as the epigraph for the Collected Poems. It concludes: "Heart of my married hearth, You make a river poetry". Says Jessy, "It's so clever. I found it out of the blue in Mum's papers. It's clearly a very private poem and I thought deeply about whether we should publish it. But I wanted the love and appreciation that Laurie had for her to be more public".

Thinking ahead to the Stroud Book Festival event which will also feature the announcement of the winners of the 2023 Laurie Lee Prize, I ask Jessy how it feels to read her father's work out loud. "I haven't overtly thought about how I feel. It depends on the poem although I do sometimes have difficulty hearing other people reading Laurie's work because Dad's voice was so incredible. Adam (Horovitz) does a wonderful job. I sort of feel I want to channel Laurie and even though I can't particularly, I think I've got a sense of his timing. And I always feel very honoured to read out any of his poems".

# **LOUISE TICKLE**

AWARD-WINNING JOURNALIST **LOUISE TICKLE HAS MADE** A CAREER OF REPORTING THE FACTS ABOUT OFTEN **DISTRESSING EVENTS IN FAMILY COURT, COVERING SUCH THORNY SUBJECTS AS** DOMESTIC ABUSE AND CHILD **PROTECTION. AS A REGULAR** CORRESPONDENT FOR THE **GUARDIAN, AND A CELEBRATED DOCUMENTARY MAKER, SHE** IS WHAT'S KNOWN IN THE **BUSINESS AS A 'SERIOUS'** JOURNALIST. LOUISE TICKLE DOES NOT DO FLUFF.

When it came to penning her first novel, Between the Lies, it's no real surprise that the subject matter is anything but 'light'. In following the endeavours of the central character, Cherry Magraw, readers encounter murder, domestic abuse, emotional control, an unfair justice system and the complexities of self-harm. But there's also excitement (and a darned good chase), plus many of the elements that define a psychological thriller. Heavy? No, because Cherry is a likeable advocate, impassioned but flawed, battling her own demons while desperate to help others. She likes climbing, cycling and birds, she has an enduring connection to the Pembrokeshire coast, and she's fueled by good coffee. In other words, she's human, "Casting Cherry as a journalist did seem a bit of a cliché at first," Louise reflects. "I thought long and hard about what else my character could do in life. But, in fact, being a reporter was pivotal to the plot, as it's the only way for her - and the reader - to have access to the family courts, since the public doesn't. Largely because it involves the welfare of children, this subject is ludicrously difficult to report on.

Within the pages of Between the Lies, the description of the tight protocols surrounding the courts are all too genuine, including the intense cross examinations that Stroud-based Louise has witnessed for years as an observer in Bristol Family Justice Centre and elsewhere. "I had to make that plausible," she says. "And because I spend so much time in court, I see first-hand how the abused can be overwhelmed and intimidated by the system, with so much at stake – precious access to their children. But with Cherry, I also had the freedom not to obey the protocols that bind me as a reporter."

It was these frustrations that initially sparked the idea for a novel, although it's been nine years from first conception to publication, along with a wealth of journalism work along the way, and being a mother to her two boys, now aged twelve and fifteen. "I found myself so indignant that I couldn't write freely about what was going on in the family courts," Louise says. "I am forced to sit there in silence, while inside I'm often raging. There are very good reasons for privacy over identities, but what the public don't get to see is the enormous power being wielded by the court. in situations where the abused have to face their abusers, unable to afford lawyers in some scenarios. The direction of parents' lives are being determined, sometimes by how convincing they can appear on the stand. And where there is domestic abuse, they can be terrified. I hope that writing through Cherry gives people some insight into this very closed world."

In keeping with the realism of that domain, the situations Cherry Magraw faces are based on past events that Louise has encountered in her professional life, not least the central character's own harrowing past - her mother and brother murdered by an abusive father It was inspired by a real-life case some years ago, where a mother and small child were killed just the day before the case was due to be heard in the family court, the older daughter of the family narrowly escaping with her life. "The tragic facts were reported in the newspapers of the time," Louise explains, "but I wanted to know what happened to children like that girl, when their father murders their mother. What is the trajectory of someone's life after that? What do children discover about their father as a killer and how do they live with that knowledge? In Cherry, I was able to map out something of one child's future."


So, having spent years battling the court constraints, endlessly fact-checking and writing with precision, was it liberating to finally throw off those shackles and write more freely? "I actually found it very tough," Louise confesses. "I'd not written any fiction before, and making stuff up is really hard work! Suddenly, I had to tackle getting a character from one side of the room to the other, and those are judgements that I've never had to make before in journalism. On some days, I was literally having to pull words from my brain, one at a time. It wasn't always joyful, and I'm so pleased to finally have the book in my hand."

Despite her mining for words, Louise isn't deterred from the world of fiction. Between the Lies is the first in a trilogy that will feature Cherry Magraw battling even more of those personal demons, the second instalment of which Louise is now writing, in between a busy schedule of reporting. In time, we are also due to see Cherry on our screens, the book having been optioned for television by the same company that recently produced 'The Sixth Commandment', a dramatised version of real events.

"We live in a society where an average of a hundred women each year are murdered by their current or ex-partners," Louise explains. "It often goes unreported, and so, sadly, I have no shortage of material within which to develop Cherry and her world."

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# INTELLIGENT HANDS— WHYMAKING ISASKILL FORLIFE

"The idea of Quickthorn as a whole is that they are books that are quick to read and that, without dumbing down, are accessible." Quickthorn also aims to be practical, ethical and sustainable. "All my books are uncoated paper, which is why you get the matt feel. It's quite fragile, it makes the book more vulnerable but that's part of the look and they are printed locally." Most books, Katy says, are printed in the Far East or elsewhere abroad, and that shiny cover, or velvet touch, is a laminate that does not biodegrade, so Quickthorn's books aim for sustainability, including the use of local talent, such as the cover design by Chris J Bailey, with photo by Carmel King and the hands of Cleo Mussi

Katy Bevan's career covers crafts, creation and publishing, plus a bit of plastering. She studied Expressive Arts at what was then Brighton Polytechnic but wanted to do more hands-on creative work, hence the plastering. "I got really into plastering and I went on to be an apprentice plasterer in London, doing the decorative, fibrous stuff." Which means the plaster features rather than a smooth wall "I still can't plaster a wall." Katy went on to found her own company in the eighties which offered the interior decorating of the time, including fake marbling, rag rolling and stencilling. Later on, she worked for the



great eighties knitting designer, Patricia Roberts (her of the bright colours and the bauble cardigans) but with the advent of children, Katy found she could not earn enough money from making, so she moved into writing and publishing. "I went to loads of different magazines and I ended up being the Managing Editor of the Erotic Review." That's etchings, Stroud! "It was part of the Erotic Print Society, so it was very literary, we didn't have photographs." After that, she moved on to the Ceramic Review and then books, before working at the Crafts Council for several years.

Katy is the mother of a learning disabled daughter and Camphill communities, local to Stroud, offer the provision their daughter needs, plus they wanted to grow trees. In Stroud, Katy was able to work from home, continue to write for magazines and work with Hawthorn Press until she set up her own publishing company, Quickthorn, in August 2022. Quickthorn already has a strong list of local, ethical and practical books. Intelligent Hands follows in that tradition. "Crafts such as knitting are meditative, they give you agency. We can make decisions, we can get into a certain amount of risk-taking choices about colour and texture and so on, which is really good for people and their development. But what is less well known is that it is really good for your brain - your brain tells your hands what to do but also what you do with your hands is fed straight back to your brain and so you can develop new neural pathways.


In line with the idea that Quickthorn should offer information that is both well-researched and easy to access, Intelligent Hands divides up the way it offers the academic information and the stories of the individuals who craft. For example, if you want to know about Cartesian dualism or Bauhaus, you can find out by looking at the sections devoted to the more academic explanations. Her co-writer Charlotte Abrahams has written many of the personal stories "She did a series of interviews with people who all make their living with their hands and are involved with education." There are features on the power of stitching including an interview with Betsan Corkhill, there is papermaking apprentice Zoe Collis, there's the graduate of PPE (George Siddons) moving from academia to carpentry, while organisations like Intoart and ActionSpace use the visual arts to work with those with learning disabilities, and there is a look at how neuroscience explores the benefits of crafting.

"There is a section on the Luddites and Al." The Luddites of history did not have to deal with Al as we know it. "But," Katy points out "everybody knows that they were protesting against machinery, they put a spanner in the works and all those cliches. But what they were really protesting about was how much they were going to be paid. They were not anti-progressive, they wanted progress, but they wanted their work to be valued. This is something that Heritage Crafts are doing." Katy is a Trustee of Heritage Crafts, and they want to raise the profile of the value of crafts and crafters in this country, its history and its place in education. "We're proposing national honours for craftspeople and we've had 30 to date."

The book is a battle cry for craft education in schools. "Even if you are going to be an engineer or a surgeon or a politician, you need to learn those things with your hands, because it gives you the dexterity that builds up the connections in your brain, it's good for your cognitive development. Doing stuff with our hands is what makes us humans unique."

# HERE WEARE

HERE HE TALKS TO **ROBIN LAYFIELD ABOUT** THE PROJECT.

# RL: First off, can you tell me a little bit about vourself...

**TP:** Well, I'm a children's author and an illustrator by trade, but I'm interested in lots of different things; music, songwriting, photography, video design and motion graphics but at heart, I guess I'd say I am a storyteller, and always have been.

When I was very young we lived in a caravan with gas lamps so we didn't have a television or anything like that and reading and drawing were hugely important to me. We had very little money, but as I was growing up, in the late 80s and early 90s there were all these youth groups I could go to—all these opportunities for me to learn new things. At one evening youth group I remember being taught how to start making music on a computer which was – and still is – hugely important to me. Basically, I was given opportunities to try out things that I couldn't have done on my own. My family couldn't afford to have piano lessons or guitar lessons, or buy me an Atari ST to make music on, but I was able to develop my creative skills helped along by these activities that were provided for free.

This is at the heart of what HERE WE ARE is about. The exhibition is one aspect of it—a celebration of Stroud, by a wide range of talented photographers—but what I'm really aiming to do is to set up a charity-based arts community that provides opportunities to showcase work, helps develop people's skills crs opportunities to anyone who's interested in being more creative, whether that's going to be someone's future career, or just something that gives them an outlet to express themselves.

#### Tell me about the Exhibition...

The exhibition runs from November 14th to the 18th at the Subscription Rooms and features Nikoletta Monyok, James Kriszyk, Emilie Sandy, Rupert Russell, Kate Watson, Tom Percival, Deborah Roberts, C W Dyer, Dom Thompson, Carmel King, Tammy Lynn Kwan, Robin Layfield, Pete Blythe, Kel Portman, Fred Chance, Jonny Barratt as well as some photographers from local youth groups, who have all taken photos inspired by Stroud.

Fundamentally, it's a fundraising exhibition. All of the proceeds will go to Stroud District Foodbank and we've been lucky enough to receive some funding from Stroud Town Council, which has covered the workshops, the venue costs and most of the framing and printing.

For the launch night (14th November 7:30pm) I wanted to create a kind of gala event feeling, so I've also been working with local musicians - Mara

Simpson, Matt Lacey (Delifinger) and Jake Shaw on creating some bespoke music for the event that all fits in with the theme of an artist's reaction to their location. I filmed and recorded the musicians playing at their chosen site and then captured footage of the incidental sounds in the locations and warped and looped that footage to create a rhythmic backing for the tracks. Essentially, it's an audio-visual portrait of a location: the musicians are playing songs inspired by the setting with sounds taken from the area used as rhythmic elements.

We'll be running some workshops alongside the exhibition too. Working with Creative Sustainability / Third Space, we're going to give young people the chance to develop their photographic ideas a bit and hopefully contribute to the exhibition where we'll also have a projector running. Alongside the main pieces which are all framed and mounted,



we're also going to have work from contributors at Third Space and members of the public who want to submit photographs to be a part of the exhibition, so that everyone can have the chance to feel a sense of ownership and say, "I've had my work shown in an exhibition." That kind of thing can be really empowering.

When I started at high school, I used to send my drawings to computer magazines. I'd draw pictures of Sonic the Hedgehog, Mario, Street Fighter II, all the classics and quite often they'd get printed, which was such a buzz. You know, if they liked my picture enough to print it, I felt like it must be good. It gave me a real sense of validation and that's the kind of feeling I want to engender here. You know, if you can feel part of a community, then you respect it and you respond to it more positively.

# Did you have any difficulty finding people to contribute?

Hah! For all my chat about the community, I don't actually know that many people, because I don't go out very often—I'm pretty antisocial! But I was able to ask the people that I do know who they would recommend, and had a lot of great suggestions. Once I had a few people on board then it just snowballed. Some of the photographers have done huge amounts of very, high profile work in advertising, magazine editorial or fine art, while there are other people involved who've done no professional photography work at all to date, but their images are fantastic! So yeah, I am really happy with the collection.

# What's next for the project?

Well, the exhibition is all sorted now, which is good, I just need to hang it! I'm not entirely sure what to do next though-it's a case of hopefully doing something

We would run the launch events on the same night and have an online shop that sold prints from all the locations, all raising money for their local food banks, but managed from one central, Here We

I'd also like to work with lots of different practitioners and put on more workshop projects to help engage people of all ages with all aspects of creativity—writing, illustration, music, film-making, pottery, dance—whatever they're interested in.

Essentially, I'd love to see Here We Are become an organization that provides free workshops to help facilitate people's creative visions alongside showcasing inspiring art and helping to raise money for anyone who's struggling.

IN THE CASE OF MAKING CONTACT/TA KONTAKT, THE STARTING POINT WAS A CHANCE ENCOUNTER **BETWEEN JENNY PALMER AND** WENDY RHODES. HAVING KNOWN **EACH OTHER BRIEFLY WHILE** LIVING ON THE SHETLAND ISLANDS MANY YEARS PREVIOUSLY, AND **BOTH HAVING SUBSEQUENTLY** TAKEN UP PRINTMAKING, THEY FOUND THEMSELVES EXHIBITING TOGETHER AS PART OF A GROUP SHOW AT THE RWA. WENDY WAS **NOW LIVING IN GLOUCESTERSHIRE** AND JENNY IN STOCKHOLM. BOTH WERE ACTIVE MEMBERS OF ARTIST-LED PRINT-MAKING GROUPS.

So a friendship rekindled, following the challenges of Covid, facilitated and fed by a shared interest, led with a kind of natural logic to them inviting members from their respective printmaking groups to join an ambitious collaboration between Swedish and British printmakers. The first manifestation of this collaboration was a 4-week exhibition in Stockholm in late May 2023. The exhibition featured the work of 39 printmakers drawn from the Swedish Printmakers Association, Grafiska Sällskapet (GS), and the Stroud based Gloucestershire Printmaking Cooperative (GPC). The second, reciprocal, iteration for the show will be happening at the Sixteen Gallery in Cheltenham in November.

In initiating the project, photographs of recent works and accompanying descriptors of interests and sources of inspiration bounced back and forth between Sweden and Gloucestershire until a set of natural pairings between printmakers was established. The pairing process proved to be a surprisingly swift and instinctive one where many of the words and images found their natural partners.

Some drew upon this dialogue as inspiration for initial prints. Whilst no prescriptive theme was set, many printmaking pairs chose to explore a common interest in nature and ecology, ranging from nature's ancient mythology to the current crisis of global warming and the ecosystems surrounding trees and their interconnectedness.

The love of the outdoors also inspired images of us as observers in the landscape, including humorous depictions of a cross-over between English and Swedish countryside. Others explored decaying industrial vistas













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and, in more ancient times, ruins that tell and hold our human stories. Several printmakers explored other ways of expression such as Swedish and English poetry, artist's books and animations.

During the project, many spoke about where they felt most at home, in the countryside or in the city, and about the different attitudes in Sweden and the UK to our freedoms within these. Some printmakers responded sensually to colour within landscape, arrived at by experimenting with many forms of printmaking. Other printmakers have been intrigued by what we cannot see, in an immediate sense, but which is revealed only after closer scrutiny.

Wendy observed that "the 18-month time span of the project has allowed lives to go on and for printmakers to take a break for other work, health or family reasons. It also allowed projects to develop and change direction, and for printmaking partnerships to find their feet. It was a huge bonus that so many GPC members travelled to Stockholm for the first exhibition, this enabled friendships to flourish with the intention to revise projects for the Cheltenham exhibition."


The project has been very well received, leading the co-organisers to reflect on the mechanisms that have enabled Making Contact/Ta Kontakt to work successfully. One of these being the launch via a live meeting at GPC and video link to Jenny in Sweden with invitations to participate, this led to a strong and inclusive start. They also designed a logo and kept up a professional visual identity in everything circulated, which gave participants confidence in their sincerity and determination. Jenny and Wendy found that momentum was maintained by keeping everyone informed at regular intervals with guidelines and key dates, primarily through group newsletters. In this way, they shared reassurances, reminders and details such as: print size and edition requirements, gallery needs, and the practicalities of exchanging prints with partners in different countries; all of which helped build a group ethos of printmaking with purpose. They asked for a trial run of initial 'getting to know you prints' that were featured in an interim exhibition that helped the printmakers to explore practical solutions for their collaborative work, an important learning process that aided in capturing and sustaining participants' focus. This was followed by a UK/Swedish Zoom meeting that enabled participants to meet and feel that they really knew each other. Examples of their works in progress, working environments, videos and comments, and even final images, can be seen in the group's Instagram page (@ making.contact ta.kontakt). This proved an effective tool for maintaining group motivation and cohesion.

The process of reflection on, and development of, methodology described here seems to be part of what has made the project so successful. Putting together an enterprise like this throws up all kinds of challenges. Seizing an opportunity and developing a vision, with limited resources; managing people and logistics. Artists can be adept problem solvers, but they can also be committed problem makers – seeking out challenges that drive their creative practice. Talking to Wendy, it is clear that this is an initiative characterised by a spirit of warm fellowship and artistic connection that has been driven by the impetus to extend creative practice, and curiosity, about another culture that sits alongside a desire to communicate through a shared language of materials and processes.

This statement from Wendy's co-conspirator, Jenny Palmer, sums up these driving forces behind the project perfectly: "No matter the challenges, the outcome would always be a success because printmaking was the uniting passion and that, once engaged in conversations aimed at generating meaningful art, it is human nature to listen, respond and seek common ground".


































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# CHRISTINE FELCE

# AT A TIME WHEN VERY FEW WOMEN WERE WORKING AS TECHNICIANS IN THE FILM AND TV INDUSTRY, CHRISTINE FELCE WAS GETTING STEADY WORK AS A PROFESSIONAL SOUND RECORDIST. DECADES LATER, SHE CONTINUES TO BLAZE A TRAIL.

Felce is the originator of something she calls the Activist Alphabet, a series of intricate and appealing screen prints that incorporate collagraph, letterpress and drawing. In amongst the large capital letters that dominate each print, the eye is drawn to small determined beetles, cheerful multi-coloured skulls, satisfyingly varied uses of typography and colour – each piece is beautiful to look at.

Felce's aims are serious -- the Activist Alphabet reflects, she says, "my passionate concern for the environment". The letter A, for instance, washed in the dark grey clouds of industrial pollution, bears the legend 'Air is sacred – stop using it as a dump site'. W, for Water, shows flower-heads and green growth blowing around inside a storm-tossed bucket – catching every precious drop in what looks like an unsettled and destabilised environment. O uses red and dark grey for its stark message: 'Stop funding the oil industry'.

Felce says her Alphabet began in the heady days of the Corbyn surge – that far-off moment when the Glastonbury crowd sang 'Oh, Jeremy Corbyn' to a man in white trousers who appeared to offer hope. Felce had the idea of asking people around the town of Stroud, where she lives, what Revolution meant to them. She approached venues like Stroud Library, the colleges, and a number of cafes, to host a small book in which people could write their thoughts. "Revolution can feel a bit scary for people", says Felce, "but it was amazing how every venue that offered to have one of the 'R for Revolution' books embraced the idea enthusiastically. Stroud Library even built a shelf for us, so people would have space to write their comments!"

Some coffee drinkers at the SVA John Street cafe bar and students at Stroud College said revolution meant 'doing the never done before', 'daring to be different', 'creativity'; others described it as a 'cataclysm', 'cardiac arrest'. When she'd gathered in the small books, Felce collaborated with artist Rachel Oram to work up printing plates for an 'R for Revolution' installation, which was exhibited at Stroud's Museum in the Park in September 2019, at the invitation of administrator Abigail Large.

At this stage the prints weren't embellished and coloured the way they are now. Instead, streamers with quotes from the notebooks hung from letters washed in shades of grey. In the spirit of the participatory character of Felce's project, people were able to add comments to the streamers.

The Museum built out from the installation: during the week it was up, art theorist Shelly Campbell organised talks on revolution in art; Adam Horovitz ran poetry readings; DJs from Sound Records and Klang Tone Records held sessions with local artists; lots of people came. The opening event was a reading of The Mask of Anarchy, the poem Shelley wrote after the Peterloo Massacre in Manchester in 1819; its famous invocation to revolution meant

the work wasn't published during his lifetime, but the poem reemerges in Britain in times of crisis, hope and struggle (advocated particularly often, for instance, by the late writer and activist Paul Foot: 'Rise, like lions after slumber/In unvanquishable number!/ Shake your chains to earth like dew...').

Covid blocked further public participation in Felce's project for many months – but the lockdowns gave her time to develop the artwork around each letter. The results were transformative, in a way that partly reflects the reading Felce was doing during the long days of isolation: Braiding Sweetgrass by Robin Wall Kimmerer, Islands of Abandonment by Cal Flynn, and later, Entangled Lives by Merlin Sheldrake.

Now, woven everywhere, in and around each letter, are drawings of some of the 144,000 varieties of fungi with which planet Earth is blessed. Felce says she is "inspired by fungi connections between plants, which provide food, water and information in a reciprocal way". In her print of J for Justice, for instance ('Our silence will not protect us'), buoyant red fungi leap from the side of the letter, bearing Climate Justice and Social Justice out into the world. In L for Love, tree fungi cluster together in support of the legend 'Let's find solutions that bring us together'. Felce's intention is, she says, to create what she calls "a mycelium thread" (the root-like structure of a fungus) between every letter of her albhabet.

And although she is describing a climate crisis – with the Extinction Rebellion symbol visible in some of the pieces – her dynamic fungi and her appealing use of colour and typography create a joyful effect overall. I think this is her intention – to remind us of what's going wrong, but also fill us with the energy that comes from looking at work that celebrates harmony and a healthy planet. This hope is explicit in her print for H – a blue skies piece in which H stands for Having a Home, Hope, Happiness, and Human Rights. The fungi are active in what looks like good earth; a wind turbine is turning; Extinction Rebellion is reminding us of what's at stake; but the overall effect is to remind us of what's within our reach to create hope and happiness.

Felce is planning a book of the Activist Alphabet, and has developed poems that will sit on the page facing each print. The H for Home poem is particularly touching: 'My home is by the river/ My home is a bit damp/My home needs a coat of paint/Or maybe a complete refit/My home holds onto me and keeps me safe/ Me and my home are holding hands together/Like an oyster in its shell'

Activist Alphabet, an exhibition of prints and poems by Christine Felce motivated by the climate crisis will take place at the Museum in the Park from the 11th November until the 3rd December. A private view will take place on the 10th November from 5 - 7pm. Running at the same time as the exhibition is a series of free talks, discussions, poetry and workshops with TV director and presenter Robert Llewellyn [Red Dwarf, Scrapheap Challenge and the Fully Charged Show] opening a series of talks around Climate, community microbes and more on the 16th Nov. The 17th Nov features a poetry evening with Adam Horovitz, JLM Morton and Dominic James, the 23rd Nov welcomes the knowledgeable and enthusiastic permaculture gardener Osh Gates and on the 30th Nov experienced educator Adrienne Robertson will share her experiences in making the natural world a classroom for teaching success and confidence to children.
