

STROUD WASSAIL - BOSS MORRIS **#22** | JAN 2017 #22 | JAN 2017 STROUD WASSAIL - BOSS MORRIS

MORRIS DANCING HAS LONG BEEN REGARDED AS THE PRESERVE OF ELDERLY BEARDED MEN LOUDLY BANGING STICKS OUTSIDE COUNTRY PUBS BUT THE IMAGE OF MORRIS DANCING IS UNDERGOING A RADICAL CHANGE, WITH AN INFLUX OF FEMALE SIDES TRANSFORMING ITS TRADITIONALLY MALE MEMBERSHIP. AMONG THEM IS BOSS MORRIS, AN ALL-FEMALE CONTEMPORARY MORRIS DANCING SIDE BASED IN STROUD.

Boss Morris sprung out of the five valleys of Stroud in September 2015. Its members all met through their day jobs as artists and crafters. Their feisty attitude and playful choreography sheds a new light on the wonderful world of Morris. The group dances Cotswold Morris, an age-old regional version of the Morris, but its repertoire also includes a local broom dance and a 16th century fighting dance.

"The possibilities of what we can do with Morris and where we can take it are endless." says Boss Morris member Rhia Davenport. "The thing we enjoy the most is the variation, adding our own twists and participating in different events."

The group's creativity shines through not only in its choreography but also in its costumes. Gold two pieces with embroidered logos, tennis ball cloth ponchos, bright blue socks, flower crowns (and the list goes on) - Boss Morris' dazzling attire compliments its members' vibrant personalities and adds vet another twist on the tradition. Rhia says the group's costumes are definitely a collaboration: "We have a very skilled seamstress who has been generous enough with her time to knock up our wonderful kit. Everyone else pitches in when they can to embellish and slap a bit of glitz about." With their signature gold costumes. Rhia reveals the group drew on Stroud's cloth making and dying history by using a simple printed symbol of the red sheets that were laid out to dry on the hills of the

Since the group's inception, it has continued to jingle up and down the country. Last year, they charmed audiences at Port Eliot Festival in Cornwall and Christie's Lates Festival of Folk in London. They also performed on stage at the Royal Albert Hall alongside the likes of critically acclaimed Glaswegian band Belle and Sebastian and psych folk phenomenon Trembling Bells. Working with Trembling Bells was especially fun for Boss Morris, adds Rhia:

"They supported us from really early on in the development of our side. Performing with them, particularly making up our own dance specifically designed to work with one of

their songs, was ace." Boss Morris has made a handful of appearances at local events over the last year-and-a-bit too, including the Stroud Summer Solstice and Stroud Goodwill Evening. "We really enjoy the local gigs in and around Stroud just as much as the higher profile gigs," says Rhia. In fact, in 2017, Stroudies could be seeing a lot more of the troupe as it wants to do more community based performances. They are also hoping to expand in the yearahead by recruiting new female members with a similarly feisty attitude, creative flare and passion for Morris, and to continue giving Morris men a run for their money! Rhia says the group have plans to start playing around with its music and to design some new hopping tracks. It would also like to start up some of its own modern traditions

If you'd like to watch Boss Morris in action, their next performance will be at Stroud Wassail Festival, which will return on Friday 13th and Saturday 14th of this month. "We're all really excited about the Wassail. It'll be the first dance out for some of our new girls and it's great to see so many other sides performing together," says Rhia. "It's also exciting due to our new kit ideas currently taking shape...."

Billed as a 'celebration of winter folk traditions', this year's festival boasts a funfilled line-up featuring games, plays and performances by local Morris dancers and mummers as well as two family-friendly workshops on the art of rag coats and wassail

The festivities will begin with mummers and wassailing at the Prince Albert on Friday 13th. On Saturday 14th, a great gathering of mummers and Morris dancers, including Boss Morris, Clocs Canton, Fox's Morris and the Chippenham Morris Men, will be singing and dancing in the streets of Stroud from 10am. There will also be a procession at 12pm, followed by traditional wassailing at Museum in the Park and 12th Night revels in

A medieval cabaret party of sorts, the Mid-Winter Revels will be presided over by The Chancellor and the Lord of Misrule. The evening will include the election of King Bean and Queen Pea. the Wassail Bowl. The Boars Head Carol and ceilidh dancing for all, among other entertainment. Guests are encouraged to come in costume, disguise and masks. There will be prizes for the best dressed so if you have a suitable party piece, bring it!

THE AWARD WINNING BRISTOL ENSEMBLE IS
THE CITY'S ONLY PROFESSIONAL ORCHESTRA
(RIGHTLY PROUD OF THAT THEY ARE TOO!)
AND EACH MONTH A SMALLER SECTION OF
THE ENSEMBLE TRAVELS TO CHRIST CHURCH
IN NAILSWORTH AS PART OF THEIR LONG
STANDING POPULAR SERIES OF INTIMATE TEA
TIME CONCERTS.

The larger orchestra's repertoire ranges from mediaeval Christmas music, through the classical canon, to new work such as the inspirational (and slightly surreal), TreeSong which took electronic recordings of the sounds a tree made and turned them into an instrumental work. Not to mention their impressive and diverse CV which includes working with the likes of Freddy Kempf, Dame Evelyn Glennie, Gabriel Prokofiev and performing the music for David Attenborough's BBC series Life In Cold Blood.

With this in mind, I toddled along to Nailsworth on a dreich Sunday in December eager to witness their performance. The atmosphere was relaxed and informal and the music was sublime as the four members of the Ensemble on duty on this particular day (plus Chris, the "volunteer" 6' 6" page turner!) took us through a programme of Debussy, Ravel and Faure.

Unable to stay for the tea and cakes in the church hall that are an integral part of these concerts, I later conversed electronically with Roger Huckle, founder and Artistic Director about the music, the audiences and the future for the ensemble...

I WAS HEARTENED TO HEAR YOU INTRODUCE THE MUSIC ON SUNDAY. IS THIS SOMETHING THAT THE MORE INFORMAL ATMOSPHERE OF THE NAILSWORTH GIG LENDS ITSELF TO OR IS IT STANDARD AT ALL BRISTOL ENSEMBLE CONCERTS?

We make a point of saying hello to the audience and introducing the music in an accessible way to help break down the barriers between the musicians, the music and the audience. This is something we take with us to all concerts, small or large. It creates a warmer atmosphere for music making.

LIKE SO MANY CONCERTS, THE DEMOGRAPHIC WAS PRETTY PREDICTABLE ("GREY HAIRS AND NAY HAIRS" AS WE SAY AT HOME!). HOW DOES YOUR EDUCATION WORK, E.G. THE PRELUDES PROJECT TO GET CLASSICAL MUSIC TO THE HEART OF EVERY CHILD'S EDUCATION, HELP WITH WIDENING THAT DEMOGRAPHIC?

Classical concert goers tend to be 50 -80yrs which has been the same for many years. Our education work is about introducing young people to music, teaching them to read music, listen to music, play instruments and perform. Hopefully this will one day transfer into an audience but it's not an easy thing to do. The Arts Council have been pouring money into school workshops and education projects for 30 years and it doesn't appear to have made any difference. There is a social element at play here and the UK isn't very good and getting people of all ages to mix socially...

GOOD POINT BUT YOU ALSO HAVE THE BE MORE MUSICAL EVENTS ENCOURAGING ADULTS TO RETHINK THEIR MUSICAL TALENT; GET THE OLD INSTRUMENT OUT OF THE CUPBOARD; OR START SOMETHING NEW AND EXCITING. HOW DID THEY START AND ARE THERE ANY PLANS FOR THEM OUTSIDE BRISTOL, E.G. IN STROUD PERHAPS!

We had an idea of providing music opportunities to the very young all the way to the very old when we took over the Extra Mural Music Department at Bristol University when it closed because of cut backs. We mainly put on courses for singers but also have workshops and lectures in the pipeline, along with our famous and very popular Scratch Orchestra days. We would certainly be happy to bring these sorts of events to Stroud if the demand is there.

TREESONG LOOKED LIKE AN AMAZING PROJECT AND THE FEEDBACK YOU GOT FROM THE PUBLIC WAS GREAT ("TURN NATURE UP MORE" AND "THIS IS EXACTLY HOW PUBLIC MONEY SHOULD BE SPENT" WERE JUST TWO OF THE MANY COMMENTS). HOW DID YOU GET INVOLVED WITH MUSICAL TREES AND, PERHAPS MORE IMPORTANTLY, WHY?

Ah yes, the TreeSong project! This was part of the Bristol Green Capital year. I have to say that this concept is not original but combining it with a full scale orchestral concert I think is. The job of interpreting the sound from the Tree fell to Jony Easterby. He set the Tree up like an Aeolian Harp

allowing it to react to any movement to produce different sounds. We wanted to turn the tree into a musical instrument, or busker if you like, then take this random music as an inspiration for a new composition to be performed in the concert hall

I NOTICE THAT YOUR NEXT NAILSWORTH OUTING INVOLVES TCHAIKOVSKY AND PHILIP GLASS. AN INTERESTING COMBINATION! DO YOU TRY TO MIX YOUR PROGRAMMES UP A BIT TO INTRODUCE PEOPLE TO MUSIC THEY MAY NOT ORDINARILY COME TO HEAR?

Yes. I think it's important to hear different composers and styles. Our programmes always have something well known in them, so a little bit of something unfamiliar can be quite refreshing to the ear.

WHAT'S THE NEXT BIG PROJECT FOR THE ENSEMBLE? MORE TREES OR ARE YOU STAYING INDOORS FOR NOW?

It's winter, so we're staying indoors for the moment! Next year sees the 300th anniversary of the first performance of Handel's Water Music, which took place on a barge on the Thames in July 1717. We're planning this for the Bristol Harbour Festival, with the whole orchestra performing from a boat sailing around the harbour.

So there we have it. Community projects, a floating concert and more great music from the Bristol Ensemble coming your way.

The Bristol Ensemble's next performance at the Christ Church in Nailsworth takes place on Saturday 15th at 3pm featuring Philip Glass' String Sextet and Tchaikovsky's Souvenir de Florence. Visit **bristolensemble.com** for further info and news of forthcoming local concerts.



THIS COMING JANUARY GOOD ON PAPER WILL BE HOSTING THE SECOND OF ITS PREEMINENT WINTER PARTIES AT THE PRINCE ALBERT PUB IN RODBOROUGH, STROUD. THE PREFECT TONIC FOR THE WINTER BLUES. THE IMAGE USED TO EPITOMISE THE GOOD ON PAPER PARTY VIBE WAS DESIGNED BY ONE OF STROUD'S BEST KEPT SECRETS; ILLUSTRATOR MARK LEVY.

Relishing all movie posters from a really early age, especially Indiana Jones. The great Drew Struzen was a big influence. "I had it all, comics, annuals, movie posters," Mark was completely inspired by it all and devoured each new science fiction film which graced the silver screens during his childhood. Mark also credits composer John Williams (Star Wars, Harry Potter, Indiana Jones to name a tiny selection), with inspiring his formative artistic years. "Designing movie posters full time is my dream job," he tells me. "I love it'

Brought up in Kent, Mark went to Falmouth Art College and ended up staying for twenty years. Wrenched from the sea air three years ago, Mark and his family moved to Gloucestershire where he was surprised not to miss the sea as much as he had feared. "Because we live near the common I think the expanse of air and sky has filled the space for me. I don't miss the sea as much as I thought I would. And I have developed a new found, and fondness for cows."

Mark's love for art led him to a college course where he learned to paint in the most conventional ways. "I was taught oil on canvas which was very traditional and great for a while, but my dad (who owns Harry Levy Amusements) said 'if you do three artworks for me, I'll give you a computer outright'. Twenty

vears later. I'm still working for him....." Mark laughs. The programmes Mark uses are a world away from the oil on canvas he was trained to do. Will you go full circle and go back to oil on canvas? I ask him. "I very much doubt it" he explains with a smile "I'm a little too messy as it is. I love the fact I can undo anything I don't like. Luse a Cintig® which is like a massive ipad which I draw onto directly. My whole process is the same as it used to be when I was painting in a traditional way, but it's completely digitised now

Mark has had a varied career so far. He has illustrated children's educational texts, designed some flash games, undertaken some animation for children's hospitals and created illustrations for the BBC and Cartoon Network. However, it was the commercial work which took over and Mark found himself overseeing contracts and licencing with big Hollywood Studios as part of his fulltime job, something which can take its toll creatively. "The call of your own work is always there. I always want to get back to creating again. When we moved here I wanted to work away from home. Now working in a creative studio environment (Cluster), it's given me more time, more confidence to concentrate again on my own creative pursuits. It's always an evolving

Using the online forum Tumblr and his own website to showcase all his work. Mark soon got noticed for the alternative movie posters he produced by behemoth gift website firebox.com. These 'inspired by' movie posters came from a trend born in the 60s and 70s predominantly in the Science Fiction genre. In recent years they have been somewhat legitimised by James Gunn, Director of the film Guardians of the Galaxy, as he began posting fan-art on social media accounts. This may be a clear indication

that fan-art will evolve into the main-stream in much the same way as fan-fiction has.

Mark's movies posters aren't just a re-hash of the original pieces however. He puts a different spin on things, usually through the use of subtle humour. Something which is clear in the poster he designed for Good On Paper which depicts Prince Albert calmly giving us a peace gesture which can also be used as the number two. The fact it's the second Good On Paper party rounds the whole thing off perfectly. A wry neatness which is appealing and effortlessly cool, with a nod to current world events as well as a wink to something a little bit punk.


Of course, no conversation with someone who designs movie inspired posters would be complete without a full and frank discussion on the best (and worst) movies of all time. It was Jaws that came in first due to the fact both of us had first seen it at impressionable young ages but also due to the composition of the shots, the dolly zoom technique used by director Steven Spielberg and of course the music. I could have chatted to Mark all day about movies and what makes them excellent or awful but time was against us. I am left with a sense that Mark's obsession with movies will steer him further towards his dream, with his clear, bold and decisive images floating around my mind.

I'VE ALWAYS THOUGHT OF THE LINE GALLERY AS the Line Gallery really is a one-woman project; ONE OF THOSE PLACES THAT TYPIFIES STROUD. NESTLED IN THE HEART OF THE TOWN, ITS WIDE WINDOW REVEALS A SPACE THAT BECKONS EVEN THE MOST ARTISTICALLY-TREPIDATIOUS VISITOR INSIDE, ITS EXHIBITIONS SURPRISINGLY CHALLENGING AND CUTTING EDGE TO THOSE UNFAMILIAR WITH STROUD'S UNIQUE ARTISTIC HERITAGE.

Having taken over the gallery from Robins and Roberts in the summer of 2015, curator Jessie James handpicks each exhibiting artist herself. searching amongst the hordes of aspiring artists online to find the ones most suitable to hold a group or solo exhibition: "I enjoy finding and selecting artists, then curating the shows. I place and hang all the work. I find it really satisfying once all the hard work of organising and hanging is done, just before the private view, seeing the exhibition come together."

Jessie doesn't just find and curate exhibitions. she's responsible for almost every aspect of the gallery's promotion including its Instagram, Facebook and Twitter feeds as well as keeping. the website up-to-date and marketing each of its shows. Back in 2015, when Jessie first took over the space with her friend and fellow artist Dave Evans, there was a regular turnover of new exhibitions; now that she runs the gallery on her own (following several months of curatorial help from illustrator and artist, Rosalie Darien-Jones) the duration of each show has been lengthened, giving prospective visitors more time to visit the gallery during its limited opening hours: "When we first started we crammed them all in - all of these people that we knew - and then we realised that it's really hard work running a gallery especially with such a high turnover, you're forever cleaning the walls and sanding. so we slowed them down a bit so that people could actually have a chance to go and see the exhibitions and, if it's on a bit longer, you can

properly promote it rather than already thinking what the next exhibition will be."

As the Line Gallery is part of Stroud Valley Artspace (a non-profit organisation), artists are not expected to pay to use the gallery, making it an invaluable resource for emerging and earlycareer artists. As well as showcasing the artwork of those working locally (including SVA's studio artists who take over the space for two months of the year). Jessie has invited artists from London, Bristol, Cardiff and even overseas to exhibit their work: "...one of my old friends from uni, she came and did a week's residency at the



very beginning and she was from Denmark...she ordered a bag of plaster and a bundle of foam and made work with it for just over a week and then exhibited what she'd made."

Promoting and nurturing good artists is really what the Line Gallery and the SVA are all about and as an artist herself (creating wool-based installations as well as video work and, more recently, print-making), Jessie understands how difficult it can be for those at the beginning of their careers to find a suitable outlet for their work: " when me and Dave first started it we were fairly new out of university and we knew so many people who had really great work, but probably wouldn't ever get the chance to show it in such a clean white space..."

In addition to the Line Gallery's regular schedule of exhibitions, Jessie also holds a variety of workshops at the gallery giving attendees the chance to learn new skills and meet new people (past events include a lesson in pompom-making and a mono-printing workshop with local artist Joe Magee). Despite organising fewer workshops in recent months. Jessie still hopes to continue using the space for this purpose in 2017 with a potential drawing workshop in the pipeline for late January/early February.

The New Year certainly looks to be an interesting one for the gallery. From January 6th-29th artist Dan Rawlings will be taking over the space for an exciting exhibition that's sure to brighten the post-Christmas gloom and encourage new visitors to the gallery: "Dan makes laser cut sculptures: because it's in January and it's so dark all the time, there's going to be an emphasis on light and shade..." Dan's work is well suited to a gallery willing to showcase art in all its forms. The space, though small, is an ideal canvas for sculpture, and many artists find unique and interesting ways of utilising its limited size: "It's perfect solo exhibition size and it's really hard not to be able to fill it...vou can have one piece on one wall and it highlights it. It doesn't necessarily need to be completely full..."

Jessie is clearly passionate about the gallery. Fitting in the extra hours around her day job and still finding, curating and promoting exhibitions that are visually challenging and artistically engaging is evidence of just how much she enjoys what she does. And yet, I wonder how often she's thanked for her efforts? With platforms like the Line Gallery offering artists the opportunity to showcase their work for free in a professional environment, we can feel confident of the longevity of Stroud's artistic heritage and for her hard work in supporting this worthy cause, Jessie certainly deserves our thanks.







"Born and raised in Stroud, I studied in Brighton, Bristol, Wolverhampton and Wimbledon, at a time when Higher Education was still affordable, and part-time jobs easy to come by. After an initial wrong turn studying Biology, I discovered my creative fire and haven't looked back since. My formal education was in Sculpture, and then Fine Art:Drawing but my practice has always involved an element of performance and participation.

My art career has been varied, with periods of struggle interspersed with, rarer, exhilarating profitable and critical highs. Definite creative high points have been: a Year of the Artist

Residency (The Magic Shoe Shop) with Dominic Thomas and Jo and Neil from the SVA: a residency in Sweden; curating the exhibition Strange Beasts: Lynn Chadwick and the New Generation, with Gallery Pangolin; exhibiting in the Jerwood Prize anniversary, award winners exhibition: and working with artist Soozy Roberts on the Perky and Pinky exhibition at the Hardwick Gallery in Cheltenham. I've also had the invaluable experience of running a gallery, Robbins and Roberts, with good friend and collaborator, Soozy Roberts, It was great to be able to help out other artists, working with them to produce their solo exhibitions in the lovely space at the SVA. Putting yourself out-there for public scrutiny (sometimes quite literally!) can make you feel quite vulnerable but also it means having new conversations and constantly meeting lots of engaging people.

I'm lucky that since leaving art school I have been able to keep learning and maintaining an experimental approach to art. My employment has been within practical, creative environments; teaching art and design at Stroud College, to young adults full of raw emotion and creative energy: and working in a busy foundry, Pangolin

Editions, realising the creative briefs of other (high profile!) artists. All the places, and the people I've worked with in Stroud have been incredibly supportive of my own individual practice. Rungwe, the director at Pangolin, has a great depth of experience and understanding of form, and is very generous with this knowledge. Having a reliable, regular income means that I can rent a studio and take on the projects that interest and engage me. Recently this has been art projects in Wales and London with Soozy Roberts, the incredibly fun Crazy Golf at the Goods Shed, a solo performance at the Line Gallery, and exhibiting with the new Donnelly Sisters Art Agency.

I'm really excited about new exhibitions and projects happening in 2017; starting this month with a group exhibition New Year, New Art at Gallery Pangolin, In/Expression at the Studio 1.1 gallery, Shoreditch in February; and an exhibition, with Soozy, at The Museum in the Park later in the year. It's great to be living and working in such a creative town!'


CHARLOTTE ABRAHAMS

CHARLOTTE ABRAHAMS' LATEST BOOK HYGGE: A CELEBRATION OF SIMPLE PLEASURES. LIVING THE DANISH WAY TAKES A LOOK AT A FASCINATING ASPECT OF SCANDINAVIAN CUITURE - ONE THAT WE HERE IN BRITAIN MIGHT LEARN A THING OR TWO FROM...

Hygge (pronounced 'hoo-ga') is an attitude as much as it is a concept. "Cosy is the most common English translation of hygge," Charlotte

explains, "and that's right if you think of being cosy both physically and mentally." The word itself is almost onomatopoeic in its link to the English 'hua', she tells me, but that risks making it sound a bit bijou. Hygge is a simple appreciation of the pleasantness of life. It is more like a



Charlotte, as well as being a versatile writer. has a keen eye for aesthetics - something she showcased expertly in her previous book Wallpaper: The Ultimate Guide (2013) - and she tells me that is was in an interiors magazine that she first spotted hygge a couple of years ago. "The caption said that hygge was a Danish word for 'turning your home into a cosy haven to nurture you through the winter' and the images were of slubby woollen blankets, enveloping cushions and perfectly formed mid-century Danish furniture. On a grey November day in Stroud it looked very appealing." Although hygge isn't a lifestyle philosophy, with no prescriptive list of things one must and must not do, those wishing to live a hygge lifestyle should be mindful that attitude has a large part

to play. "While there may not be any rules." Charlotte says, "one of the key tenets is total mental presence." I ask her if that was something she felt came naturally, "If you are having a hygge moment then you must give it your undivided attention - no checking your phone. no instagramming pictures of yourself doing it. no making mental lists of things to do. I am an inveterate multi-tasker so that bit did require some conscious effort."

With a focus on living in the moment and appreciating what one has, hygge comes across as a refreshing alternative to lifestyle trends that goad us into depriving ourselves of the things we enjoy, often only for the sake of a better headspace. Denmark regularly pips the rest of us to first place in the annual World Happiness Report, and it's not unlikely that hygge attitudes play an important role in that. In the 2016 report, Britain lagged sadly behind in 23rd place. I ask Charlotte if she thinks we have anything comparable to hygge here in Britain? Perhaps a concept like this could help perk us up as a nation. "We certainly do hygge things here - sitting in cafes eating cake with friends. snuggling up by the fire on a winter afternoon, cooking with our kids etc. - but we don't have a name for them. And that makes such a difference - giving these small moments of simple pleasure a name makes them important and means that we are likely to make more time

Obviously Charlotte's understanding of hygge has come a long way since she first encountered it in that interiors magazine. What sort of research did a book like this entail? "I went to Copenhagen, I spoke to lots of Danish people," she says, "Mostly design professionals, academics, social scientists." But hygge encourages us to find time to take pleasure in the modest and the everyday, and Charlotte tells me that she also spent a great deal of time

walking in the woods, collecting her thoughts. As well as having an excuse to eat cake in Copenhagen, she says her favourite thing about writing Hygge was being given the opportunity to really think about the impact this way of life can have. Allowing ourselves to slow down, and make real, regular time in our lives to cherish our loved ones and ourselves, could only have positive repercussions for society, not to mention us as individuals.

Appreciating the comfort and companionship of our family and friends seems all the more pertinent as the long nights and bleak cold of English winter settle in for this weary slog of a season. The arrival of the New Year is often accompanied by a feeling of being able to reset oneself, which inevitably ends in an abandoned list of half-executed New Year's resolutions. There's nothing wrong with trying, of course, but this year I propose we hold off on the resolutions until the warmth and friendliness of spring returns. Charlotte says that another key tenet of hygge is equal participation, so I propose we all try and kindle a bit of that Danish happiness: immerse ourselves in the mundaneness of our ordinary lives, and celebrate every mulled wine, every cosy blanket, every leftover-turkey sandwich. This winter, let us practise hygge, and live the Danish way.



FOR MY FIRST COLUMN OF 2017 I BRING NEWS OF A BRAND NEW COMEDY NIGHT AT THE PRINCE ALBERT FEATURING FOOD AND FESTIVAL SHOWS AND ALSO THE RETURN TO STROUD OF THE EXCELLENT CRAZY BIRD COMEDY NIGHT OH AND I'M ALSO RUNNING MY STAND-UP COURSE AGAIN. I'M ONLY VERY CASUALLY PLUGGING IT IN THE LISTINGS BELOW AS IT'S NEARLY FULL.*

Stroud being the small town that it is. I ran into the dynamic duo of editor and designer of this publication at Atelier. The esteemed editor encouraged me to launch a new local comedy night and not long afterwards Lotte from the Prince Albert got in touch about me running a night. Unable to ignore this synchronous prodding** I started to think: how to differentiate it?

You see, with Nick Bird's "Crazy Bird" local stand-up comedy nights going strong and attracting good numbers. I felt anvone wanting to launch a new comedy night locally will have to offer something different. Nick's night returns this month to the Lansdown Hall in

Stroud on Saturday 28th, His nights are the tried-and-tested format of an MC (the brilliant Geoff Whiting) introducing a series of acts. The night opens with a twenty-minute set from a pro act, this time very polite ex solicitor Andrew Watts with his tweedy mix of cricket. economic theory and very English social awkwardness.

Then there's a middle section with

one or two newer acts doing ten minutes. This is the space for brand new open-spot acts (including any locals who want to give it a go). This time the middle section features an excellent newer act in the shape of "degree educated but remarkably foolish Mark Hurman from Weston Super Mare".*** Then the night ends with an experienced top pro ending the show on a bang. In January it's the fantastic Aussie comedian Colin Cole who has been described as the "best thing to come out of Australia since Skippy the Kangaroo" by the New York Times. Classic format. It works. And it also happens to be the format of the original and now defunct Prince Albert comedy nights.****

So...how to do things differently? Among my many roles in comedy (for example coach (see below)

and comedy guy for GOP). I am a director of live shows. And one of the main things I direct are fulllength comedy shows for festivals. Festival shows are a full hour and they are themed, crafted and shaped to take the audience on a iourney. Meanwhile Lotte has a local contact who is ready and willing to offer delicious home cooked curries at the pub. The two ideas came together: its curry and comedy, dinner and a show.

Our first show on Sunday 29th January is "Barry Loves You" from the wonderful stand-up Barry Ferns: Spirit of the Fringe (2014, Edinburgh Festival Fringe) and Malcolm Hardee Award winner. "A marvellous, personal, beautifully constructed and laughter-packed hour" (Kate Copstick, Scotsman). And there will be curry. It will be early evening in deference to those with iobs and school kids. I will be hosting the whole shebang*****. Each show, I'll interview the comic, then it's the show. And the night will end with an audience Q&A.

In summary: You'll eat your dinner. Watch an hour long show without the hassle of going to a festival. Then you'll go home (or maybe more realistically stay for a cheeky

pint.) Look for posters and flyers at the Albert, around town and of course for details online and in the press. Thereafter we'll do shows bi-monthly until we run out of acts. interest or coriander.
