As I write this piece I'm listening to the playlist that Good On Paper have created on Spotify in order to whet our appetite for their latest project. I would thoroughly recommend the playlist as an introduction to this new addition to the Stroud festival calendar. The more that I listen, the more excited I am about Hidden Notes Vol. 1, which will be taking place at St Laurence Church on Saturday 28th and Sunday 29th September...

HIDDEN NOTES VOL




Having already established a track record for bringing new music to the town, with a tendency towards the experimental, Alex and Adam felt that there was a gap in the market waiting for a festival of contemporary classical/avant-garde music. Typically ambitious, they have put together a fantastic programme that is reflective of the rich and generous scope of the genre. The eclectic line-up includes artists from Austria, Iceland, Germany, Ukraine, Japan, as well as the UK and Stroud.

One high point will be the UK premier of a new composition by 'continuous music' pioneer Lubomyr Melnyk, titled the Dreamers. Melnyk's music is rooted in the classical piano tradition as well as contemporary minimalism. In his playing he uses densely layered, cascading notes to build a mood of exhilarating, ecstatic abandon. Japanese singer, Hatis Noit creates transcendental songworlds that at once deconstruct and recombine Western classical music with Japanese folk. Bulgarian and Gregorian chanting and avant-garde pop. She was recently invited by David Lynch to perform at his Manchester International Festival takeover. Ground-breaking violinist Daniel Pioro will be heading to Stroud shortly after performing with Radiohead's Jonny Greenwood at this year's BBC Proms. This will be a rare UK concert with Icelandic record producer, mixer, composer, engineer, musician and Bedroom Community record label founder Valgeir Sigurdsson. The Austrian composer, ensemble leader and hang player Manu Delago has become established as an innovator through an impressive body of work across the last decade, which has included collaborations with Biork, the Cinematic Orchestra. Anushka and Olafur Arnalds, as well as four genre pushing recordings of his own compositions. Closer to home, many readers will have attended performances led by locally based composer Emily Hall. Emily has written for the London Sinfonietta, LSO, and the Brodsky Quartet, amongst others. For Hidden Notes she will be joined by the Stroud Fringe Choir, vocalists Chloe Kempton and Jess Mitchell, Pianist Claire Hammond and the other half of Emily's new duo Mandel – Misha Law.

The sheer variety of the programme reflects the diversity of the field. Ambiguously named and hard to define, Contemporary Classical music has sometimes been seen as iconoclastic, breaking with the conventions of composed music, discordant, difficult. It has been dismissed as aloof academic modernism on the one hand and ambient, vaquely spiritual, lacking in musical event (what a friend of mine called 'Icelandic easy listening') on the other. Whilst it is always possible to find examples that confirm prejudices, this denies a century of boundary pushing sonic experiment. Certainly for the last few decades, music has happily transcended narrow categorisation, with a rich traffic between the languages of classical, jazz and popular music. The pioneering work of composers such as Steve Reich, Terry Riley and Philip Glass developed an aural language that is at once completely modern, affecting and accessible. Arvo Part and John Tavener brought sensuous, harmonious transcendence to the canon and in recent years composers such as Nils Frahm, Max Richter and Olafur Arnalds have completely broken out of the classical music niche into the mainstream, making music that is hugely popular, selling out concert venues worldwide and leading a younger audience towards earlier composers such as Satie and

I always remember attending a concert in 2008, marking the anniversary of 1968, a year of revolution and resistance to the forces of reaction. Rock music was by then firmly established as the authentic voice of youthful transgression. The #54 | Sept 2019 MUSIC (













concert featured a performance of Peter Maxwell Davies Eight Songs for a Mad King, composed in that year. I walked out at the end of the concert, reeling – Davies composition had felt like the most radical, visceral, profoundly shocking piece of music that I'd ever heard.

Hidden Notes may not set out to shock in quite this way, but it will be full of variety and surprise - thrilling, meditative, melancholic, noisy, quiet - there is not a single concert in this festival that I will want to miss.

As well as bringing modern classical music to Stroud, Alex and Adam want to build on the reputation that St Laurence has already established as a venue for new music. They intend donating potential profits to the church's vital ongoing refurbishment costs.

Whilst drawing on the audience that already exists here for this kind of music, they want to open it up to new listeners. This is consistent with their wider mission - to engage with a broad audience in terms of age group, to attract the attention of new audiences in neighbouring cities and towns to Stroud as a prime destination for arts, music and culture and to support all the venues, artists, organisations and events that they regularly promote within the pages of Good On Paper. "I love seeing people being given the opportunity to put some shows on", says John Bassett founder and organiser of the Stroud Theatre Festival now in its seventh year. The festival runs from Friday 13th to Sunday 15th and will be a weekend packed with performance...

"The first one came about after I went to the Barnstaple Festival in North Devon" John recounts "which has been going for at least 12 years, maybe longer...It was just a model that I liked." In fact the Barnstaple Theatre Festival is so successful that applicants are now selected by lottery. This year the festival, which receives no direct funding and is volunteer led, has managed to find room for everyone that applied, but the logistics are tight "we are probably now at our top level".

Stroud Theatre Festival "is different to somewhere like Edinburgh where you have to find and pay for your own venue and publicity - and hope for the best - or where you might get in the brochure but you have to arrange your own venue which, if you don't know the place might be difficult. I find some of them [other festivals] kind of off putting because they say: 'here's a list of venues; find yourself a venue...". I did Edinburgh once, and we were in an old garage... but it was one of these round the corner venues so no one knew where it was!"

Geography is important to John. The guiding principle of the festival is to keep everything close so all the venues must be within fifteen minutes' gentle walk from the centre of Stroud: "the one that unfortunately gets left out is The Cotswold Playhouse. It's

a perfect theatre, lovely, but it is just that bit further out of town so it's really difficult for people to get to go and see a show, so we don't use it because you can't get from the Subs Rooms to the Cotswold Playhouse in fifteen minutes unless you're driving".

In order to appear in the festival, performers apply, pay a fee, and John finds venues, technical support, and a place in the brochure. Like most festivals the hope is that you don't just see one piece and then go home. "Because we do the same thing that Barnstaple Festival do which is six shows for the price of fiver". Audiences get a card and get that stamped at the venues they attend, that's why the venues are close together.

So what about quality control? "we don't judge" says John, "It's totally random...To some extent the festival and its shows are dependent on word of mouth, once a show is seen to be good, word gets around and it gets attended'. John points out that theatre is subjective, which is why he doesn't want to be the judge of what gets seen, "I've seen stuff where people have gone 'Oh that's wonderful!' and I've been bored out of my mind, and there's other things I have seen which I think are fantastic and people go 'Oh no it wasn't!'. It's up to you what you like and what you don't like. It's very subjective".

Bassett is no stranger to theatre in Stroud. He left a career working in insurance in the City, to work in theatre; education through theatre has been a specialist area for John and led him to work for the Science Museum, the London Transport Museum and the V&A. He became quite an expert on the Napoleonic wars when he worked for Apsley House, former home of the Duke of Wellington. There, his work included a reconstruction of the Battle of Waterloo, with just two actors! In addition to that he can read upside down "an old insurance trick" he tells me. His museum work continues in Stroud working at the Museum in the Park and with Snowshill Manor, which he recommends for a local visit. He is also Front of House Manager at the Sub Rooms.

While he is an actor, John regards himself primarily as a writer and in recent years, as a result of the WW1 Centenary, his work on WW1 theme has included performances that some may remember. In 2010 there was 'Tommy Atkins and the Canary Girl' about women munitions workers in Gloucester, then there was 'Trenchcoats for Goalposts' about the famous WW1 football game and coming soon, as an end to this commemoration, 'War in Mind' about shell shock and a local Stroud doctor's role in saving lives from the Front.

John is not going to offer favourite performances for this year's festival, after all it is all subjective, "for me the purest theatre is a stage and a pure black box". But as a guide he tells me "if you are after the theatre of the absurd and silly then the 'Church of Phil' by Fire Donkey Productions is the one." It is an alternative comedy set on a Welsh camp site. 'The Breath of Love' by Learning Through Theatre offers Commedia dell Arte, including the dead, the undead and the faithful Harlequin. The Small Spaces Theatre Company looks at the history of local aviation with a 14 strong cast, billed as a 'radio play with a difference'. On the audio theme there will be some short audio plays to listen to via headphones in the Nook, 'Refugee Letters' showcases letters written by local refugees to be performed publicly. 'Radicals, Revolutionaries and Poets' honours the life of Thomas Spence, who, at the time of the French Revolution, toured the pubs of London advocating land ownership for all. This performance will feature a variety of poets who will participate and perform on the Thomas Spence theme. including Jonny Fluffypunk as William Blake. There is also a return of the White Hippos with their one man show 'The Numbers Station'.

The Museum in The Park will be the main venue for children and John is keen for people to go along. 'Pandora' by Multistory Theatre from Barnstaple. 'Miss Potter's Tailor's Tale' by Brandywine Productions, the 'Invisible Museum' by new local group Knapsack Productions and for older juveniles Bill Jones' 'Growing Victorians in Your Garden' which is a must-see, in fact all of it is a must-see.

And John's final piece of advice... "never run a play in all small space next to a brass band rehearsal".

THROUGH THEATRE

What makes us laugh? It's partly about being surprised. Surprise that the unexpected has happened, at the audacity of what someone says, at the misfortune of someone in a mess. Laughter is certainly about being human.

I met Cheryl Stapleton one sunny morning in Mills Café, Stroud and we talked about humour, and the power of comedy to communicate our feelings about the world. Cheryl is the Artistic Director of 'Learning Through Theatre'; a theatre company which uses Commedia dell'Arte to educate, engage and entertain.

Commedia dell'Arte is a traditional comic theatre style which started in Italy in 16th Century. It began as workers making entertainment for passers-by in the street and market place. A roughly marked out space on the ground gave a 'stage' to actors to 'play' with the intricacies of human behaviour, creating characters from real life and making up stories that mirrored social and working lives. The genre has survived four centuries, inspiring Shakespeare, Moliere and even Picasso. It is the bed rock of all comedy including farce, slapstick, clowning, tomfoolery and modern sitcoms.

Performers wear masks that cover the top half of the face, leaving the mouth free to enable speech. Each commedia mask represents different people in society, in roughly four categories: servants, masters, lovers and interlopers. Within that there can be various characters such as a heart-broken heroine, faithful servant, greedy old man, incompetent fool, cowardly captain or a pompous pedant.

For this year's Stroud Theatre Festival Cheryl Stapleton and her fellow Learning Through Theatre actors, John Broadbent and Mark Reid, will be generating laughter in a newly written Commedia dell'Arte performance called 'The Breath of Love'



where they engage in the antics of these archetypal characters: "The year is 1590 and the wind of change is blowing through the field of knowledge. Doctor Leglimbo, renowned alchemist, is on the brink of a profound discovery - a divine elixir that will open Death's door and guide the departed back into the light. Missing a key component, he enlists his hapless servant Harlequin to capture the vital vapour...But, when love is in the air and everyone is out to get rich... who knows where their greed will take them?"

Learning Through Theatre was set up by Cheryl in 2013 as a Commediabased vehicle for drama workshops, performances and training. Originally studying performance at Brunel University, she later specialised her training with Philippe Gaulier, John Rudlin, Antonio Fava and Michael Chase and went on to found Kabosh Commedia troupe in the mid-90's which toured festivals in London, Edinburgh, France and Ireland. After spells in education and television, she moved to Gloucestershire where she worked at the heart of Cirencester College's performing arts courses.

John Broadbent also has decades of experience in Commedia work. He originally trained with Italian director Carlo Boso and co-founded The Fortunati, an English Commedia troupe that toured the UK and Europe with many productions. He has performed with TAG Teatro di Venezia including the Venice Carnival and London International Mime Festival. collaborated with Ophaboom Theatre on many of their comedies and teamed up with Chris Howitt on the award-winning Severed Heads (a very English take on the French Revolution). More recently, John toured the solo show 'Mak the Sheepstealer' and played Chief Barker in 'Saved', a modern Mummer's play.

Mark Reid comes from Australia where he trained, qualifying with a Bachelor of Education in Drama and Dance. Since then he has honed his practice in comedic performance with such practitioners as Marcello Magni, Kevin Brooking, Angela De Castro and Barry Grantham. He has been a core member of Physical Theatre companies such as the Anglo-Brazilian Dende Collective and Forbidden Theatre and has performed in a variety of venues from the streets of London's Covent Garden to West End studio spaces. He turned up at one of Cheryl's workshops and she quickly realised he was a superb physical comedy performer and was soon invited to become part of the team.

These three energetic and witty physical performers run copious sessions for schools, colleges and adults in other settings, using the rich resource of the commedia characters, placed in different improvisational situations.

Their fun, active and stimulating sessions make for a powerful way to learn about comedy, status, communication, body language, creativity, motivation and ... ourselves! Sometimes the biggest laughs we have are when we notice how absurd our own behaviour is.

Laughter is a good medicine, imbibe it when you can...

The Learning Through Theatre troupe will be performing their delightful show 'The Breath of Love' at Stroud Theatre Festival on Friday 13th at 1pm and 8pm, Saturday 14th Sept at 1.30pm and Sunday 15th at 6.30pm. They will also be running a commedia workshop on Saturday 14th from 3 till 5pm.

An evocative, otherworldly tin shack stands tucked away amid the grandeur of the Museum in The Park, the sound of voices float out from within drawing you closer... As you approach and peek in the window, you are transported back in time to the golden age of radio. Inside you see vintage Bakelite radio equipment, yet crystal clear digital audio is playing out from it... the voices of today sharing stories of yesterday, intimate moments of life infused with the atmospheric charm of radio in its heyday.

The Radio Hut is the latest experimental art piece from Bart Sabel and Tara Downs - the creative duo behind the Miniature Museum installations so well beloved by Stroud and regularly on show at the Museum in the Park - in collaboration with local spoken word artist and performer Jonny Fluffvounk.

Miniature Museum create interactive cabinets of curiosities inviting playful interaction with heritage and history through a combination of collection pieces, public contributions and specially fabricated 'unnatural history'. The Radio Hut is an audio extension to this work, drawing on Bart and Tara's shared background in theatre and set design - a portable portal for collecting oral histories and engaging with heritage through the medium of radio.

This emergent collaborative art piece, conceived and brought to life with Jonny Fluffypunk, is a fusion of museum, installation and micro theatre space. Jonny has written a bespoke theatre show about the magic of radio - Test Transmissions from the Edge of the World - to be performed in and around The Radio Hut at the Museum in The Park as part of Stroud Theatre Festival. Throughout and beyond this residency, the creative team will be actively exploring and developing the combined artistry of theatre, radio and installation - researching future directions for the project.

"The Museum in the Park have been very supportive from the beginning," Tara tells me. "We have a long collaborative relationship which goes back to my MA in Museology,

and have included several items from their collections in our Water Cabinet and Desk of Ingenuity installations. It feels like the logical place to launch a new evolution of Radio Droogdok this summer."

Radio Droogdok was first conceived as a sound connection between creative spaces - the SVA in Stroud and creative communities ADM and NDSM in the docklands of Amsterdam - and was supported by Arts Council England. Visitors on both sides were able to step into the tin hut and start a conversation with a curious passerby on the other side. In this first iteration, the Radio Hut proved to be a playful, spontaneous and intimate space for experiment and connection.

After making their initial connection over the airwaves of Radio Droogdok, Jonny and Tara met face to face in The Radio Hut during its installation at the Goods Shed for Jazz Stroud, to dive deeper into their shared love of radio and conjure up a future collaboration.

"I was brought up in a radio house where the TV was rarely on," Jonny tells me. "I grew up with classic things like falling asleep to the shipping forecast and 'The Archers' theme tune. Life was held together with a whole background web of radio. Listening to John Peel as a teenager really changed me too. Radio was always there and I have always been drawn to it."

"When Jonny approached us last year, we leapt at the chance to collaborate with a theatre-maker," says Tara. "It's a highly improvised situation and we are excited that this week long residency at Museum in the Park, and three performances of Jonny's show in the hut will really be just the beginning of an experiment. The responses and interaction from people in Stroud will shape the evolution of the show and of The Radio Hut itself."

The Radio Hut will be in residency at The Museum in The Park from 13th September for a week. Performances in The Radio Hut, which are supported by Stroud Festival, will take place at 5pm on Friday 13th September and Saturday 14th September in the forecourt of the

Museum in The Park, with a matinee show at 12:30pm on Sunday 15th September in The Collector's Room.

In between performances, the hut will be open to the public as an interactive installation and at certain times the artists will be there for a chat and to collect stories and impressions from visitors. The resident artists will also be hosting visiting trainers in technology and audio processing and so if you are lucky you might find yourself part of a live research and development experiment!

Jonny explains: "We are inviting the people of Stroud to come down and share your experiences of the intimacy of radio and its meaning in your life. In this way, people who share their stories with us will become part of the museum itself as audio exhibits. Come and be a part of an evolving art piece that will be travelling on around the country - and maybe the world! Help us create a repository of our country's love affair with radio."

After this residency the Radio Hut will continue journeying to new sites, and will carry the stories collected from Stroud to share to new audiences along the way. "Our vision for The Radio Hut is for it to become a more universal miniature museum piece," says Tara. "A miniature museum of radio that can tour around different places collecting site-specific stories and playing them back as an interactive installation."

WOOL&WATER FESTIVAL

Artists view things differently!
This was the bold thought that launched the first Wool and Water
Festival. David Elford, Festival Director, saw that art and heritage don't always connect in the public space and wanted to rectify that. A call out was made to artists in his adopted home of Stroud and a new Festival was born.

David has collaborated with Stroud Textile Trust in this its 20th year, the Cotswold Canal Trust and the Museum in the Park to present a Festival he describes as "a cornucopia of exhibitions and events all celebrating the wonderfully creative spirit that exists in Stroud and its environs".

The programme for this year's Festival includes exhibitions, poetry, music, talks, mill visits, film, workshops and storytelling throughout September in and around Stroud.

David's plan was to ask artists to respond to the heritage and natural environment in the Stroud Valleys. This response has taken many and varied shapes. Miniature Museum will explore the heritage of the mill industry with a kinetic sculpture at Dunkirk Mill using "an exquisite collection of dismembered textile machine parts"; while digital artist. Anna Cadv. considers the famous Stroud Scarlet from a strikingly different angle from that which we may be used to. Stroud Poets have produced a new series of pamphlets responding to the themes of the Festival to give us food for thought: and local author. Tracey Spiers, launches her playful and highly original book, Stroud's String of Pearls, capturing the story of Stroud's mill history with her unlikely guides, a cochineal bug and a sheep!

Anna Cady's installation is part of one of the main exhibitions of the Festival, Material Flow, curated by Patricia Brien. This exhibition has drawn artists from far and wide, including Australia, the world's largest producer of wool. David told me, rather disturbingly, that they were planning to hang around 30 artists as part of this exhibition! Now that's a response I didn't expect and I may have misunderstood him slightly! The artists were asked to respond to five artefacts, four from the Museum in the Park's collection. These include a Native American artefact, which showed

the journey that some of Stroud's historic red cloth took over oceans to the Americas. The historical trail of the cloth shows it appearing across the continent as it became currency in the trade between the Europeans and the Native Americans.

Of the 150 mills which used to crowd these valleys, not many remain for their original function. Many have become flats and offices, while others have become Ghost Mills. A tantalising glimpse of the past is brought to the Festival by the artists of Walking the Land which will be exhibited at the SVA on John Street, Radical historians. walking artists, printmakers, painters, map makers, textile artists and photographers engage with a Proustian "recherche de temps perdu" or a search for lost time. They seek traces, remnants and ghosts of the past; links between the mills, textiles, agriculture, geography, power and wealth in these valleys. Let the Ghost Mills strand of the Festival put a shiver up your spine as the artists lead you through the past of the great Stroud mills to a suggestion of

The Wool and Water Festival runs for over a month and includes so many fascinating exhibitions and events, that we may all have to take some extended leave to get around it all! To help me out, I asked David which of the various elements of the Festival he would recommend. While this is like asking a parent to name their favourite child, he did helpfully point me in one or two directions.

It transpires that Stroud is home to an unusually high number of Book Artists, i.e. creators of Artists' Books, as opposed to illustrators. These artists use the book in all its forms as the basis for extraordinary artworks. It could be a deconstruction that we see, making the idea more conceptual than representative; it might be using the processes involved in creating a book - folding, cutting, stitching, gluing - to create a new, sculptural work. Some are small and intricately crafted, others are on a far larger scale. All are unique and beautiful and inspired by the archive of the Stroudwater Navigation Canal (which has been owned by the same company since its inception in the mid

18th century!) They will be on show at the National Trust's 16th Century mansion, Newark Park.

David was also rightly thrilled to have not one but two world premieres in the Festival this year. Hugh Barton's The Wool and Water Cantata will be performed at Stroud Brewery by the combined forces of Ensemble I.a.t.B and the Cotswold Canal Singers. World premiere number two introduces musician Andrew Heath, who investigates the soundtracks of the old mill environment with an exploration of the repetitive and rhythmic qualities of the machinery with a piece called Warp & Weft. Rather than focusing on the huge volume of noise within the mills, Andrew creates a hypnotic work which draws the listener into his interpreted sonic world of the weaving industry.

The final signpost I was given was to a fascinating talk by Dr Val Kirby. She will go beyond the buildings, the sheep and the rivers to discuss how this landscape was formed. How did all the elements required to create a centuries' long wool and weaving industry come together in this place? What quirks of geology and tectonic motion were responsible for putting cloth on snooker tables, new balls on Centre Court and Guardsmen's uniforms on Horse Guards Parade?

2019 is the first Stroud Wool and Water Festival and it looks to be launching itself onto the town's festivals' landscape with vigour. It is broad, rich in texture and goes deep into the area's heritage. Very much like the wool, cloth and water it celebrates.

The Wool and Water Festival runs from 17th August to 29th September. Venues include Museum in the Park, Lansdown Gallery, Stroud Brewery, Dunkirk Mill, Atelier, Wetpaint Gallery, SVA, Gloucestershire Printmaking Cooperative, Newark Park and many more. Details of times, venues and prices are all on the Festival website at woolandwater.org

R IS FOR REVOLUTION

What does Revolution mean to people in Stroud? A unique installation will be exploring this question in Gallery One at the Museum in the Park from 24th to 29th September.

The R Is for Revolution giant alphabet installation is part of the Revolution in the Arts Festival supported by Stroud Festival in which there will also be free DJ events, revolutionary poetry, letterpress stamp workshops and art history talks...

What does revolution mean to you? Are you working towards one? Do you fear it? Does it strike you as inherently violent? Is non-violent revolution possible? What do you want to change and how do you want to change it? The concept of the R for Revolution installation comes from Christine Felce and Rachel Oram, but it depends on contributions from the wider community. This is art that needs your involvement.

Many people in Stroud have already embraced it enthusiastically, with shops and cafes getting involved as well as the library. You can add your comments to books about revolution at the Museum in the Park, Black Book Cafe, Star Anise, Stroud Bookshop,

Stroud Library, Sound Records, SVA and more. Those comments will be printed onto streamers of paper during the letterpress workshops and added to the installations.

We live in unsettling times. For many of us, the need for radical change politically and socially, is obvious. Where that change should take us is an entirely different question. For some, the desire is to close borders, double down on controls, and limit personal freedoms while carrying on with business as usual, refusing to admit that climate chaos is even an issue. For others, the radical change desired is all about responding to climate crisis and bringing human behaviour into line with what the planet can support. And no doubt there are a fair few people for whom revolution means watching it all burn and many people who would prefer it if nothing had to change.

What we desire and dream of is diverse, and to each of these polarised groups, the dreams of the other side seem dangerous, foolish, irresponsible and unreasonable. Culturally speaking, we already have a revolution on our hands – it is happening around us and we are part of it. In such an environment, to do nothing is also a deeply loaded political choice, tacitly supporting whichever movement turns out to have the most influence. The choices we make as a country in the next few years will have long term implications for us all.

It may be tempting to see art as at best a sideshow in any real revolution, but when it comes to 'cultural' revolutions, art and creativity often end up in the firing line. Totalitarian regimes do not encourage imagination. At the same time, what we do culturally can lead to significant social changes in a quieter, more organic way.

So, what's happening in Stroud? Installation organiser Christine Felce explains: "The project was born out of all the political unrest, it seemed everywhere I have been for a couple of years now people are keen to talk about Europe, peace, identity and of course climate change and the roll of multi-national companies in shaping our society. I feel it's a special time in history, people have a big interest in getting their views out. I know a project like this could easily exist on social media, the big difference is that this is not a digital format, there is something very special about handling making and leaving your words in a very analogue way. It definitely has a paper trail.'

Fellow organiser Rachel Oram adds: "It was poet and author Rick Vick from the Stroud Festival committee who was so encouraging towards the idea of R Is for Revolution and helped with a grant. It was also amazing how everywhere that has offered to have one of the books in their shops and cafes for people to write their comments and thoughts, have embraced the idea and improved it. Stroud Library were so enthusiastic, even building a shelf for us. Shelley Campbell - a talented history of art tutor has been building up a whole series of lectures on Art and Revolution since she heard about the project. She is giving lectures for free at the Museum in the Park in mid September. Tom Berry and Sean Roe of Sound Records made the connection

with revolution and music. They are all about analogue technology and are providing Vinyl DJ sessions during the installation. Ione Mako is curating the music events during the installation week and has such good ideas about revolutionary songs. The Loose shop in Stroud are amazing and straight away were thinking about climate change and how that ties into revolution. Poet Adam Horovitz has offered to curate an evening of revolutionary poetry with an open mic night on the 27th of September, inviting poet and letterpress print artist Dennis Gould and singer songwriter Emily Barker to take part as well as many more to be announced. Having an open mic might also encourage people to make up their own poems from the comments on the walls. I think it will be a fun event.

We can only guess, with hindsight, when and where a revolution started. I doubt it has ever been obvious to anyone at the time that they were doing or saying something that would prove definitive. There is no knowing what may happen when we talk about revolution.
