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<u>Stroud</u> <u>Book</u> Festival

This November sees the return of the beloved Stroud Book Festival, back now for its fourth year in a row. Chatting with Artistic Director Caroline Sanderson, I was able to catch up on a little bit of festival history... "Conversations about the fact that Stroud ought to have a book festival have been going on for years," Caroline tells me, "certainly since I moved to Stroud in 2005, and probably well before that. The first was in 2016, under the auspices of Stroud Festival and the direction of the wonderful Jamila Gavin [celebrated children's author and Stroud resident]. Then at the beginning of 2018, the current team came together and took on the mad mission of making Stroud Book Festival even bigger and better."

Caroline is one of the busiest people I know, in part due to her work as Associate Editor at The Bookseller, and I ask her how she first got involved with organising something as hectic as a literature festival. "I was tangentially involved in the first two Festivals, doing some ad hoc advising and chairing events (event chairing is one of my day jobs). In 2018 I threw my hat in the ring as Artistic Director, and very happily, our other brilliant core team members-Paul McLaughlin (Festival Director); Louise Brice (Marketing & PR); Jane Churchill (Children's Artistic Director); and Shannon Newton (Fundraising and Sponsorship)-came on board shortly afterwards. We came together in a scratch, ad hoc way, but this is the best team of people I have ever worked with. Everyone has fantastic expertise and is also great fun to be with. We're also indebted to the charm and recruitment skills of our volunteer coordinator. Camilla Hale."

Stroud's Bohemian atmosphere seems wellsuited to hosting a literature festival, although sculpting one from scratch is always bound to have its challenges. "We're a fairly new festival," Caroline explains, "so occasionally I've had to really sell everything that Stroud is about to persuade some of the bigger names from elsewhere to come and join usactually, persuade their publishers mainly. But, happily, most are quite keen to visit Stroud (why wouldn't they be?) Mostly I'd say that staging a festival like this, while great fun is very, very hard work and takes hundreds of hours. We all do it around our various other day jobs, and very, very occasionally I think I must have been mad to take it on. But only very, very occasionally.'

Organising a celebration of literature on this scale definitely has its rewards too. "What's not to enjoy about bringing some of your favourite books and authors to your beloved hometown? Although it's always agony having to narrow down the list to a manageable programme, I particularly love introducing the work of new authors to our all-age audiences. And I've also hugely enjoyed getting to know people who work on some of our other fantastic festivals here in Stroud and dreaming up ways to collaborate with them. Finally, it was a total joy last year and incredibly satisfying simply that people supported us and bought tickets in such numbers. They seemed to really enjoy the

Festival we staged for them. Fingers crossed for more of the same this year!"

The Festival line-up seems to get better every vear. and I ask Caroline if there's anything she's particularly excited about. "Ha! You want me to pick just one thing? You'd expect me to be thrilled that we'll be welcoming such starry names as Booker Prize winner Ian McEwan, PEN/Pinter Prize winner Lemn Sissay, and the father of nature writing, Richard Mabey. And I am. But our schools day is also going to be tremendous fun: there's no buzz quite like hearing a room full of schoolchildren completely caught up in what a real-live author is telling them. And I'm particularly looking forward to the programme on our final day, Sunday 10th November. Partly because then I can start relaxing-just a little-but also because it's a day of utter contrasts. It starts with a workout (Annie Deadman); includes three reflective and truly thought-provoking events with some remarkable human beings (Mind Matters, The F-Word and David Nott); celebrates local writing talent past and present (Made in Stroud. Down in the Vallev): and concludes with a brilliant comedian (Katy Brand) and a film showing (Dirty Dancing). How's that for varietv?"

Any plans for next year's festival yet—or is that way too far off? "It's a little way off, but programming a festival is a bit like painting the Forth Bridge, so it won't be long before we're thinking in earnest about 2020. Personally, I'm keen for the Festival always to have as diversely 'Stroud' an identity as possible. I always bear in mind that although we're a small town, we have a far from small town mentality here, and that is a gift when it comes to adventurousness of programming."

Of course, events like this rely on the support of local people, so what can we do to make the fourth Stroud Book Festival a success and ensure it returns in 2020? "Buy tickets! Bring your friends! And if you enjoy the events you attend, please let us know, and/ or post on social media, if that's your thing. Business and personal financial support is also always welcome to help us make the Festival a sustainable event that will run for many years to come. And if you like what we do and want to get involved, consider joining us as a volunteer. Please email if you're interested – volunteers@stroudbookfestival. org.uk."

Katie Fforde is one of my writing heroes. Not because she's a hugely successful novelist (though that does make me proud to know her). Rather my admiration stems from the years of graft that have gone into achieving her bestselling status. Almost every morning for the best part of thirty years, this early bird writer has been getting herself up, and getting words down, reliably crafting the stories that her droves of readers love: and annually delivering a new book on schedule to her publisher. Earlier this year her 25th novel - "A Rose Petal Summer" ("Is it ever too late to fall in love?") -rewarded her efforts by shooting straight to Number One in the hardback bestseller lists.

Katie summarises its irresistible plot as we settle down to chat in the sitting room of her lovely house in Rodborough, her two King Charles spaniels curling up between us. "It's about a woman in her 40s who has never quite forgotten a man she met on a Greek island years before. They spent a magical night talking, but didn't exchange contact details when she had to rush off and get her taxi to the airport because at the time, it was just a kind of dreamy holiday romance. But years later, she applies for a job advertised in The Lady as a companion to an elderly man, because it's in the very place in Scotland the man told her he came from. And sure enough, she and the man who got away meet again".

What are the essential elements of a Katie Fforde story?

character goes gliding. I couldn't quite bring myself to do that!".

Katie began writing in her early thirties after her mother presented her with a writing kit containing pens, paper, a rubber, Tippex, a dictionary and a thesaurus, "She had actually written a couple of novels herself so knew how to get me started. It was a sort of shut-up or get-on-with-it gift, although at the time I thought it was a bit unreasonable of my mother because I had three small children and a dog and my husband was away at sea a lot. But once I started writing I was addicted. I would get up insanely early and squeeze in an hour a day, and then that hour became two and it grew from there. I gave up ironing completely, stopped being a proper housewife, and kept on writing. And then later writing became my job. Mind you, a friend did once say to me: 'why aren't you a proper mother?'". Presumably that friend now has a more than satisfactory answer to her impertinent question.

Katie's chosen genre - romantic fiction - is often derided for being lightweight, fanciful and unrealistic. But she is unashamedly proud of writing love stories. "My readers enjoy what I write because they want a place of safety – whatever crazy thing is going on in their lives or in the world, they know it's going to be alright in my books. Over the years people have said: I read your book while sitting by my husband's bedside while he was in hospital, or your book got me through my chemotherapy or whatever. I don't want

"My novels mostly start at a point of change for the protagonist. And I like my characters to be in control of their lives to some extent – obviously we're all at the whim of nature – but I like them to be able to make brave and exciting decisions for themselves. And I always make sure my novels have a decent plot. As a reader myself I like beautiful writing and I want to be told a good story. It's no good leaving it up in the air and saying to the reader: 'you decide whether it ends happily or not. That's the writer's job!".

On the subject of jobs, Katie also likes to try on different professions for size in her novels; and accordingly, her heroines have been garden designers, wedding planners, antique dealers and more. "If I see a job advertised, I'm always curious about it unless it involves accountancy. I often do hands-on research too although in my new novel out early next year, my main

to make myself out for being a saint for writing these books but they do have a place".

Katie and husband Desmond who have three children and six grandchildren came to live in Stroud almost 40 years ago. "I have lived in Stroud far longer than I've ever lived anywhere else. It is definitely where I feel at home – I <image>

love the scenery, I love the mix of people. Stroud is a place with quite a strong personality; but it's a giving and generous personality".

The same could be said of Katie herself who frequently uses her writing celebrity to fund-raise for good causes including most recently, holding an in-demand writing course at her house in aid of Stroud Valleys Project and Rodborough parish church's current fund-raising appeal. She is also an enthusiastic champion of new writing talent ("it's my biggest thrill"), not least through her sponsorship of the Romantic Novelists' Association's annual Katie Fforde Debut Romantic Novel Award, for the best romantic novel by a first-time author.

And indeed for the Stroud Book Festival event staged to celebrate her 25th novel, Katie has – with typical generosity– chosen to share the stage with two of her favourite debut novelists of the past year. They are Joe Heap and Anstey Harris; the former, the winner of Katie's 2019 RNA Debut Award for his novel, "The Rules of Seeing"; the latter the author of "The Truths and Triumphs of Grace Atherton", a recent Richard & Judy Book Club pick

Feelgood, uplifting and nurturing. Frankly the event couldn't be more Katie. So we hope you'll join us for a glass of pink wine, and help us celebrate the latest rosy success of this most enduring of Stroud writers.

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PERCIVAL By Matt Shinn





Kids have it hard these days. But do they have it harder than they used to? Not necessarily, according to Rodborough-based children's author and illustrator Tom Percival, who will be appearing at the Stroud Book Festival this month.

"Children today are under a huge amount of pressure, from SATs and social media. But children have always had mental health considerations: everyone does. It's just that people in the past tended to downplay the importance of children's mental health and emotions."

Children's mental health and wellbeing is a theme in many of Tom's recent books: "my aim is to help children understand how their emotions work, learning that it's ok to feel emotions and work through them, and not feeling that you have to ignore or hide feelings, which can cause bigger problems down the line. If you can understand your emotions and deal with them, you'll be a happier person in the long run. That's why it's important to me to make my books – kids need guidance to learn to manage emotions."

Tom is currently producing children's picture books (most recently Ruby's

Worry and Ravi's Roar) - each one about a particular mental health topic. He is also writing a series of illustrated chapter books, aimed at children around 7 to 9 years of age: these also deal with mental health and wellbeing. but through the idea of the Dream Team, an odd assortment of fantastical creatures who inhabit the dreamscape. Says Tom: "if you have bad dreams, it can be down to problems in your waking life: the Dream Team help kids to work through these problems. My aim in these books is to deal with guite weighty issues in a light-hearted way, keeping the stories funny and adventurous, but with a core idea: how do you deal effectively with anger, or jealousy, or anxiety?"

Tom sees himself as being very much part of a wider trend, as children's mental health is beginning to be taken more seriously. "Around 2005," he says, "I used to work at a book publishers. Back then they could be quite dismissive of any 'issue' book with a message or moral. I don't know exactly when exactly that changed, but it's certainly not the case anymore."

Indeed, Tom's picture books are very open about the themes that they tackle. "When you've got maybe 400 words to tell the story, you have to be concise: you can't muddy the idea. The message of my picture books is clear: we all feel this way sometimes, and here's what you can do about it. There's something that children can take away from the story, and it helps them to build empathy, by seeing the characters go through these situations. With a longer story the focus can be that little bit broader: with the Dream Team I'm being less explicit about the themes of the stories, but they're still contributing to an increased emotional literacy and awareness of mental health."

Much of Tom's recent work developed from a book of his called Perfectly Norman, which deals with the theme of being different. "Kids feel intensely uncomfortable when it comes to sticking out," says Tom. "This is a story about the challenge of choosing whether to be who you are, or not be authentic to yourself in the hope of an easier life. Norman wrestles with that: he's got wings that he keeps hidden under a big coat. It's resolved for him in the end, because you can't keep your true self hidden. You have to own your wings, whatever your wings are: anything that a child thinks might single them out. You have to accept what makes you unique, and celebrate it.'

Tom has had an overwhelmingly positive response to his books, from children themselves and their parents, as well as from schools, charities and mental health groups. Reading the stories, you can see why: they're fun, and don't feel in any way didactic or finger-wagging.

Tom's slot at the Stroud Book Festival will give a nod to emotional wellbeing, but the focus will be on quick-paced, lively fun. Tom will get kids to come and draw shapes on an iPad, before turning those drawings into book characters. He'll show how small differences in the drawing of a face can convey different emotions. There will also be some playing with the elements of stories, picking random objects out of a suitcase and making a narrative out of them. And it will all finish with a song.

MOLLY SCOTT CATO By Sarah Dixon



Long-time Stroud resident Molly Scott-Cato is an author, economist and politician. She currently represents the South West as a Green MEP and is going to stand as MP for Stroud in the next UK election. Molly will be appearing at the upcoming Stroud Book Festival to discuss the future of democracy, with Professor David Runciman and reporter Jack Shenker.

The author of three books on how economics can work within natural boundaries, Molly could be seen as the embodiment of the principle 'think local, act global'. To find out more about her connection with Stroud and her vision for the future, I grabbed a chance to chat with Molly in between meetings at the EU Parliament.

She grew up in Bath and has lived most of her adult life in the West Country. She studied politics, philosophy and economics at Oxford University and later earned a doctorate in economics from Aberystwyth. "I joined the Green Party when my first child was 18 months old. There was definitely a connection. But I couldn't have been an MEP until my children were grown", she says, highlighting how for her the parental role and the public one for her are not things she would wish to compete with each other.

Molly is now fearlessly taking on some of the biggest challenges of our time and offering up solutions and models that can take us forward. Her book 'The Bioregional Economy: Land, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness' outlines how we can focus more on local food and manufacturing, creating more self-sufficiency and reducing inequality locally and around the world. Some of these ideas she credits to being a resident of Stroud itself, which she has been since moving here in 2006 as a single mother. "There's nowhere I'd rather live - it's full of creative green thinking. You can suggest something and people say 'Yes, lets try it!' Stroud has a massive reputation for innovation - particularly in Green circles in Germany and across Europe. What we do well here in Stroud could solve big problems. For example, this is a place where people are building community - meaning we don't need so much to escape to foreign holidays. We can buy local food and live here well. It's also a place where town and country connect in a really unusual way. You can be right in the town but then walk directly out into the countryside. We are in a time of major transformational change and Stroud offers some good models. We can be creating national frameworks from some of the innovation here."

But if democracy's future is under question, as suggested by the title of the talk, where does that leave ideas like this? Molly is clearly passionate about this and is taking a leading interest in the way social media, in particular, is impacting our social structures. "Ours is an 18th century democracy - and not a full one. We need constitutional reform and crossparty working. How are we going to control Facebook and WhatsApp and Twitter sending propaganda - it's a massive propaganda fest! You can't run a democracy unless we have a shared view of what is going on. Social media is out of control and other media are very poor. We are not capable of running free and fair elections in this environment.'

That sounds pretty dramatic and very serious. Why is it not quite as high on the public agenda as we might expect? "People haven't caught on to what's going on, partly because it's frightening. and technical and unpleasant to think about. I recently commissioned a report titled 'Facing Down Facebook'. We need to stop them broadcasting lies - in the form of fake people and fake accounts. And we need to stop people overseas - especially the US - funding campaigns for lies. In Britain we aren't doing any of that. Julian King, the British Commissioner for the Security Union in the EU supports a voluntary code of conduct for platforms. I believe more legislation is needed. GDPR is not enough to prevent the corruption of these platforms."



When I spoke to Molly she was in-between a meeting on the digital regulation of crowdfunding, and another with the Babassu Coconut Breakers - a group of women's rights campaigners from Brazil. I wondered how it is possible to be writing books as well as managing this intense schedule. "It's very hard to read or write when you are a politician. The longest piece I can write at the moment is about 1000 words. But I spent my summer holidays editing the second edition of The Bioregional Economy. It was very relaxing and restful - writing about how we can change trade to support the environment.

And then I discover she has experienced a way to combine slow travel with productive work. "I wrote a book on a boat. It was 11 days journey from Natal, Brazil to Algeciras then another 5 to Tilbury. I was coordinating an academic conference in Brazil and I used the time to create 'Towards Just and Sustainable Economies'. I flew out but decided to come back by cargo ship to save emissions. All cargo ships have 2-6 spare berths" she adds, making me wonder if it's an option more of us could consider.

She also tells me she doesn't own a car, and is interested in diverting funds from HS2 to establish bus systems that work for everyone, across rural districts like ours as well as in towns and cities. I can see that despite the challenges of politics it's also where Molly is able to develop ideas gleaned in Stroud and from around the world. "I love it - it's fascinating. I'm giving everything and I'm happy to do that. It stretches me - emotionally, physically, and intellectually. I'm going to work as hard as I can."

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IT ALL STARTED WITH THE WORD 'VOTE'.

For a lover of words and language. I jumped at the chance to meet artist Andrew Wood and his studio assistant Guy de Lotz. Together the pair have hit upon something really rather sensational - an ever changing, word art installation in the centre of Stroud. On a grey day, I am greeted with HENDRIX, number forty three in the series, 26" giant black lettering with a neon surround seeminaly floating above an unassuming fence. Andrew insists, "there is no limit to the scope of this project, it is not site specific. The words mean different things to different people." But what do they mean? "They mean what you want them to mean. They're a reflection of your own life, your own self. They are totally random."

If you have no idea what I'm talking about, wander into the centre of Stroud and along the London Road. High up on a fence post you can't miss the word of the week....or month. It might make you laugh, gawp, snigger or... think. "Make of it what you will." All the words are the same height, made of 15" plywood, cut and painted by hand.

Andrew Wood is a well known and respected artist in our town. He welcomes me with a warm smile, and despite slowing down due to Parkinson's disease, he extends generous hospitality with plenty of humour. His Stroud studio is airy, bright and colourful – a gallery, workshop and home - plenty to distract me from the job in hand. I am here to talk about his new book, 'The Word' a glossy catalogue of all the word installations and a brief explanation about its conception. As a limited edition print run of five hundred, it's advisable to snap up a copy or two, available from Stroud Bookshop at a mere £10.

I hesitate to make predictions, but wager it could be a collector's item. It would make an amazing coffee table book and talking point (who IS Alan?) not least with a bonkers foreword from Keith Allen and a poem by Elvis McGonagall which cleverly weaves together all forty three words. McGonagall himself, stand-up poet and comedian, is no stranger to word play – his stage name references the notoriously bad poet William McGonagall and Elvis, "the wrongest name I could think of to go with McGonagall."

With no hint of pretention, I'm delighted to hear that this project

started life with no master plan it just happened. Although the seed of the idea was inspired by the 2017 General Election, Wood doesn't take it too seriously, as the introduction suggests. "I am not a political animal, apart from a month in Los Angeles in 1990 organising banner painting workshops protesting Bush Senior's invasion of Iraq." Inspired by Keith Allen's robust political graffiti scrawled across the hoardings of he Marshall Rooms, Wood decided to encourage his community to get involved, hence the first word; VOTE. "It's surprising how many people living in the UK don't vote...it was time to take action."

The idea has since evolved to include all sorts of random words, puns...simply having fun with language. When I ask which has been the most popular, they respond, "It's hard to say. Reactions are different to each word – SCROTUM ruffled a few feathers so we kept it up for longer than intended. LOVE AND PEAS was a favourite. People often stop for selfies. The response in general has been incredibly positive." In a poll conducted by the Stroud News & Journal asking readers, "Is the scrotum sign too controversial?" 87% said no. Luckily we do still have a sense of humour and you get the feeling that he is kind of tickled by the whole controversy.

Wood has lived a very full life and the Stroud Valleys have played a starring role. He first came here as a nineteen year old student of Fine Art at Cheltenham Art College and rented a cottage near Painswick. "in a pretty little place called Paradise, the rent was five pounds a week, the landscapes just blew me away. Our local pub was called the 'Adam and Eve'....I made some really good friends. I suddenly had people around me who talked about art and painting, it was great!" After a year at Cheltenham he transferred to Falmouth College of Art where, early on, he discovered clay and it has been his preferred medium ever since. After a knock out graduation show he was offered a solo exhibition and studio at the Nicholas Treadwell Gallery in London.

A tutelage with ceramicist Robert Arneson inspired a prolific period of work at the University of California offering a new perspective, inspiring pieces such as 'Narcissi' – a tongue in cheek comment on male vanity. This



playful outlook is a thread that runs through all of his work, 'a celebration of colour and form.' Abstract, colourful, textural, spikey, sculptural, organic, witty – all of these terms describe his work. He is a multi media artist – he can paint and sculpt, there are wall collages using reclaimed materials, the Jesmonite church tower, stunning pencil drawings, heads are a recurrent theme. I favour the abstract reliefs, unashamedly painted with bright, jewel like colours – malachite, emerald, amber....they are optimistic.

He bought Prema Arts on a whim in the early 80's when it was then a derelict Georgian chapel. He hadn't intended to, but went along to the auction with a friend and ended up bidding for it....the rest is history. Prema means 'divine love' in Sanskrit and recalls a period of spiritual awakening with guru Sathya Sai Baba which set the tone for a supremely successful venture leading the way in arts, world music, poetry and dance - one that still thrives today. Touching on spirituality, we briefly discuss a project that is still in it's early stages, 'The Golden Spire' - Guy has been working tirelessly to pull together all the elements of a

multi-layered town collective of arts related events centred around St. Laurence's Church which culminates in a celebration of all things gold, including the spire itself! The event is planned for August 2020 to coincide with Wood's seventieth birthday.

So you see, there is plenty of work to be done, ideas are flowing. Andrew Wood may have sold work to the likes of Sir Elton John, Ringo Starr and Christian Louboutin, but Stroud is THE WORD. From Stroud to California, Tuscany back to Stroud, I can't wait to see what happens next.

These paintings were made, intuitively, in studio over a two- month time span in 2011. This 'spontaneous' expression emerged after eleven years of solitary annual visits to the Bosherston region of Pembrokeshire.

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

ROUND UP

Ishmael Ensemble's Pete Cunningham has achieved much in his time on planet earth including releasing a critically acclaimed LP, remixing tracks by Detroit techno legend Carl Craig, and earning plaudits from Gilles Peterson and Mary Anne Hobbs amongst many others. His love of his native Bristol has informed much of his work, and yet, his latest project sees a move 30 miles up the road to the SVA Goods Shed.

The turning point for this latest venture was in May when Pete witnessed fellow jazz saxophonist Alabaster dePlume perform 'in the round' at Jazz Stroud 2019 using d&b soundscape. Not only did this create great intimacy but Pete was staggered by the terrific sound provided by sound engineer Jack Page using a technology that enables the pinpointing of sound based upon the exact specification and location of performers and audience. Enthused by the possibilities of this combination of sound, approach and venue Pete and SVA Director Neil Walker hatched a plan for the Ishmael Ensemble to host an ongoing monthly residency..

Each month Ishmael Ensemble will host an event, acting as a house band supporting, and then playing with, a guest performer. The first event of this new partnership takes place on Saturday November 16th and will see the group creating original pieces as well as playing some of their existing material before a guest performance from British-Bahraini trumpeter Yazz Ahmed and her quartet playing a sound that has been described as psychedelic Arabic jazz.

The arrangement seems mutually beneficial for each of the three core partners. Ishmael Ensemble gets to form an ongoing relationship with a venue without saturating their home town with gigs, d&b audiotechnik can road test their emerging technology and SVA can stay true to their vision of creating great art and pushing boundaries.

For Neil the relationship is key to the overall objective of making the Goods Shed a renowned venue for great sound. They are already talking to a number of internationally known outfits about bringing acts to Stroud and we can expect an increase in the number of gigs coming to the venue in the next year or two. Ongoing relationships with partners rather than one off gigs are central to this in order to provide a coherence and consistency to the programme.

At the heart of this approach is the increasingly respected 'Jazz Stroud' festival which takes place each May and Neil's aim to "bring name acts to town that would usually only be seen in a city". Plans are already afoot for 2020 with a number of key artists already confirmed. Despite being a small rural town, Stroud's location is increasingly useful in this regard with the scenes in both Bristol and London less than a couple of hours away and in d&b audiotechnik one of the world's leading music technology brands within striking distance and keen to contribute to the local scene as lead sponsor of the event.

Reciprocally, Jack is enthusiastic about the acoustic opportunities afforded by the Goods Shed "This is a more real and engaging experience than providing a simple left/right sound" he claims. He, like the other partners recognises the importance of the 'in the round' format as key to all of this as it provides an intimacy that forces the audience to directly engage with the artist in a way they wouldn't with the traditional audience/performer on stage format.

It's clear that each of the three partners has much to gain from the arrangement as do the people of Stroud. "We want to announce the guest act on a month by month basis" says Pete – "for the first event we want people to grasp the format and concept, to get the feel of the in the round experience and then tell others before coming back again..."

"We want to capture the spirit of the early days of Pink Floyd or the Grateful Dead" he says in that "we want people to come and experience something more than just a band on stage. Something unique, unexpected and hopefully inspiring."

Rarely do we see such a strong partnership with such a strong sense of artistic vision, it certainly feels like the start of something great for all of us...

Round Up #1 with Yazz Ahmed and the Ishmael Ensemble takes place at the SVA Goods Shed on Saturday 16th. Tickets start from $\pounds 10$ from the SVA or $\pounds 12$ on-line for early bird tickets, $\pounds 14/\pounds 16$ for standard tickets, $\pounds 10/\pounds 12$ for under 24's or $\pounds 20$ on the door. 
