

Unlike the main character in his semiautobiographical feature film about coming of age in Stroud, writer and director Guy Davies has never fantasised about escaping small-town life. "When I was growing up," he says, "everyone was so desperate to leave but I personally think it's wonderful here."

PHILOPHOBI

And so the film, Philophobia (definition: fear of falling in love), which follows the acute highs and lows of a group of teenage boys throughout their final few days of school, avoids the sallow, gritty tropes you might expect from a tale of British provincial youth. "Some of the summers that I had out here were just absolutely glorious and vibrant and there's so much colour in the countryside." says Davies. The heady days of his protagonists whirl between euphoria, fear, anxiety and sexual tension amidst golden sunsets, dapple lit forests, misty valleys and a sparkling swimming lake.

Despite his loyalty to Stroud, Davies hasn't been home much of late. The final quarter of 2019 was spent on the film-festival circuit, upon which Philophobia has been steadily hoovering up prizes. There were two at San Diego International Film Festival, including best global film. It won best feature film at both the Melbourne Lift Off Film Festival and the International Film Festival of Wales, where Davies also scooped the best director award. Joshua Glenister won best actor in Wales, too, for his portrayal of sensitive, bookish lead character, Kai (beating Timothy Spall).

Davies has been making films in Stroud since he was still at Wycliffe School in Stonehouse (which he left a decade ago). During his early 20s he set up production company, Zebrafish Media, in the town with old friends. But his work has often taken him away. There was a year

spent studying cinematography at the New York Film Academy. There have been music-video and commercial shoots elsewhere in the US, along with weekly commutes to London and many a film set further afield.

Davies started adapting the screenplay for Philophobia, his first feature film, from an idea for a short that his old friend and Zebrafish co-founder Matt Brawley, had previously started. Davies picked it up idly as an excuse for some creative me-time while in San Diego working on a commercial for a fitness brand. Brawley's script, says Davies, "had some of the same characters in. and it was set on the rooftop of the Library, which is one of the places where we used to hang out." In the film, said hangout is the scene of stoner tomfoolery, bullying and longing glances, but sadly all this can no longer be replicated by Stroud's youth, "It's all fenced off now," laments Davies.

By the end of that week in San Diego, says Davies, "I got a rough draft of the whole script. And then I didn't do anything with it for four years." In January 2017, determined to make a first feature, he started rifling through his scripts, "and I thought this one had the most legs, and I was most interested in it," he recalls. "So then I rewrote it, and I started raising money and all that jazz and set a date to start filming on the 31st of July."

"It was the easiest thing I've ever written," he says, "because I was really familiar with the characters and how they would behave. They're an amalgamation of people I know."
This meant he could be sure of their authenticity, a priority he carries with him as a director: "The main thing I'm doing is asking myself if it feels honest, if I believe it."

He says he wanted to tell the story through the cinematography as much as possible, and the results stunningly project the clandestine thrills of teenage lust, the pull between freedom and restriction and each characters' journeys as they veer between hope, heartbreak, mundanity, thrill seeking and for some, catastrophe.

"I was focused on things being more saturated and having luscious greens and warm sunsets," says Davies. "A lot of our references were more from Americana films, such as The Spectacular Now." Davies recommends this 2013 film about teenage lovers, directed by James Ponsoldt as an underrated must-see. He also cites the 2012 US small-town crime drama, The Place Beyond the Pines, as an influence.

Most of the main characters in Philophobia have absent fathers. "It was something that I was curious about," says Davies. "I noticed that there was a lot of fatherlessness, not in my own life but among my extended friendships." When, in the film, Kai seeks solace alone in the countryside, a vast stag appears, representing a paternal presence. "It presents itself in moments when he would want to talk to his father, or get some advice or has an anxiety about something," says Davies.

It's an effective device, in fact the stag deserves an Oscar for his turn as a wise and protective spirit. "We got him from a zoo in Oxford," says Davies. "He was amazing, like a dog, you could just tell him to do anything and he would."

Symbolic spirit animal or not, being able to disappear into nature must be quite a source of strength when you're young and need to sort your head out. "I think that's a huge strength," says Davies. "There's something about being alone in nature which is quite human. It's probably something genetic. It is an environment where you can be honest with yourself - nature is not judgmental."

At the heart of the film lies some strong childhood friendships, but will these bonds weaken after school's out for good? Davies' own friendship group, he says, despite moving all over the world, is incredibly close. "I think maybe friendship is a little bit stronger here, because there's less people and everyone knows each other, and people get bonded for a long period of time. We had a lot of long summers, lounging around not doing much."

Award winning comedian
Susie Donkin has dressed up
as a vagina, worn pants on her
head, embraced the Toothy Hag
archetype, and been on TV with
a talking Wonder Dog, all in the
name of keeping us happy. Her
mum is still embarrassed by
her antics, but undeterred, she
presses on with writing and
performing great physical and
character comedy.

Donkin, whose credits include Horrible Histories (CBBC), Bearded Ladies (BBC Radio4) and Smack the Pony (Channel 4) is one half of award-winning comedy duo Spitz & Co who will be bringing 'Les Gloriables' - the third in the 'Gloria' trilogy - to the Sub Rooms later this month, to cheer us through the dark days of January. The other half of the duo is not Spitz, as the name suggests (Spitz is actually Donkin's 'yappy fluffy white dog') but French actor Lise Boucon.

The production sees the return of the characters Josephine (Donkin) and legendary French actress Gloria Delaneuf (Boucon), whose lopsided relationship is at the heart of the show's uproarious comedy. Gloria is a vain, fragile diva and Josephine her long-suffering assistant, ever adoring of the great woman, enduring jibes, compensating for her faults and keeping the show on the road.

'Les Gloriables' is Gloria's offering to the world of musicals. Inspired by Hugo's "Les Miserables", the diva has created a 'life-changing' piece of theatre which will reunite Europe! A show about socialism and the power of the people, she has dreamed a dream, and her hapless assistant Josephine has promised to build a barricade. Highly visual, very physical, and extremely silly, it can be enjoyed by the whole family. Performed in French and English with lots of interaction and singing, Les Gloriables is a riot...Vive La Revolution!

I leapt at the chance to interview Susie, having discovered her with Pauline Morel playing Gloria Delaneuf, in the belly-achingly hilarious 'Glorilla' in Gloucester. After telling me her spirit animal is probably a hamster, 'cheerful and relentless', we get down to serious conversation...

So how does a woman get into comedy these days? "It was when I went to Edinburgh University that I really got into theatre and comedy. I discovered the Edinburgh University Theatre Company who put on different productions throughout the year - including the Edinburgh Fringe. I loved it, and did everything from Grease the Musical to comedy improv, to dressing up as a vagina for a Dadaist cabaret. It is where



I met Charlotte McDougall - we were the tragic greek chorus in an awful production - a very bonding experience. We started writing our own character sketches as McDougall & Donkin and took it to the Edinburgh Fringe in 1998, in a tiny venue - alongside a tall, unknown character comedian called Miranda Hart. We teamed up with another female comedy duo, Messina & Rusling to become the Bearded Ladies. After a successful pilot we did four series for BBC Radio 4. Then I got involved as a writer for Horrible Histories for CBBC and begged them to let me be in a few of the sketches (mainly toothy hags) which I loved. When we moved to Stroud I met Pauline Morel and Spitz & Co was

She tells me she discovered she was funny when she was nine. "We were doing gymnastics at school and I did a stupid dance - and everyone found it very funny, they all said 'do it again' but of course it didn't work the second time! I've always loved making people laugh. I've got a gorgeous sister who is a dancer, and maybe I was reacting

against that." Perhaps some of that sibling relationship has found expression in the Gloria series? "Perhaps yes - but there is no rivalry because Josephine just adores Gloria. Gloria is a nightmare to work for and with, because she's such a diva. But Josephine sees her and just thinks 'look at that skill and artistry!' Josephine would love to do something like that. My mum still feels embarrassed about my shows though. She says things like 'Aren't you a bit old to be wearing knickers on your head?'"

How did you come to be in Stroud? "In 2010, we moved quite suddenly into a cottage in Randwick. We had friends here, and it is near enough to London. We are so lucky to live here. The kids have loved it, there's Randwick woods, the Brewery, the market...Being the new person it takes a while to get to know people. I read a Pam Ayres poem for an event in the village hall after someone heard I was an actress. It was the most excruciating experience - but I have redeemed myself now. It's a great village. We rehearse in Randwick Church and I met our designer, Sue

(Condie) here. Her kids were at the same school as ours. Meeting Sue was a really integral part of forming the company. Her design contributes so much to the show - she makes schlonky sets. Good schlonky rather than shit schlonky! When we moved here I also came across Giffords Circus - I absolutely loved it! It led me to a clowning workshop, where I met Pauline Morel. That was the start of Spitz & Co."

As a writer and sometimes a collaborator myself, I'm wondering about the creative process? "Well I write a script - then we go through it together - there's lots of room for improv, we like to keep that vibe. Gloria is based on a British stereotype of French people. It took ages to make the first one and got easier after that."

Les Gloriables has also taken the form of a 30 minute street theatre show, in Yarmouth, Derbyshire and Plymouth, and I figure that must be challenging and quite different from the stage play. "I love the interacting - the honesty of it. You have to entertain, or they just walk away.

It's free, and it's really fun! We learnt loads from it - we are taking things that worked well on the street back indoors - It's become much more interactive. I do a placard writing workshop before the show starts - you can write whatever you like. On the street there are lots more kids, and people who wouldn't normally go to the theatre. Doing the street stuff is where comedy theatre is less rarefied. I hate that thing of pretension. It should be entertaining above all. It can't be boring."

There is very little danger of anything being boring, with Spitz & Co in town. See you there. And Vive la Revolution!

GALLERY PANGOLIN:

20/20 VISION

Gallery Pangolin's '20/20 Vision' exhibition will be a visual preview of what's planned at the gallery in 2020.

This year the gallery is focusing on an 'All Female Cast' of exhibitions and '20/20 Vision' will showcase highlighted works by each female artist as a taste of things to come.

"The gallery has a close relationship with the Pangolin Editions foundry and therefore we showcase the best of the excellent work cast in house. This is the main selection criteria for most of the work and artists represented in 20/20 Vision. Alongside this we are privileged to be able to select works from artists represented by our sister gallery Pangolin London," Gallery manager Sally James explains. "We are always on the lookout for emerging or established artists both locally and throughout the UK."

The exhibitions in 2019 unexpectedly turned out to be very male orientated, so this year, James wanted to focus on female artists: "This was due to our pre-selected exhibition schedule and an additional memorial exhibition for one of our beloved artists Anthony Abrahams. Therefore to tip the balance we feel 2020 should be first and foremost dedicated to female sculptors!"

The show will feature a number of local artists such as George Taylor, who selects, recycles and preens feathers of Victorian taxidermy specimens, road-killed birds, plucked chickens and pheasants destined for the butchers' shop to extraordinary effect.

Born in Macclesfield in 1975, Taylor

moved to a farm set in Stroud when she was 10. Here she began working with her father as he tended livestock and managed the woodland, initiating what has been a lifelong enchantment with the natural world. She's since worked with Dan Chadwick and Isabella Blow, presenting 'La Petite Mort" at Scream Gallery in London in 2008.

Her worked is inspired by the natural world, literature – such as Georges Bataille's 'The Story of the Eye' and Luce Irigary's text 'Elemental Passions' – as well as artist's such as Bridget Riley, creating mesmerizing, optical illusion-like pieces, urging you to stay a little longer and work out what's inside.

Another local artist is Abigail Fallis. Fallis was Pangolin London's first sculptor in residence and worked for a year from the studio at Kings Place on a new body of work that formed the basis for her solo show Fallis in Wonderland, inspired by Lewis Carroll's classic Victorian novel. Fallis' work first captured the public imagination in the nineties with her commentary on the 'Cool Britannia' movement and a pair of framed hand stitched Union Jack Y fronts, entitled Cock-Eyed Jack. In 2009, a public sculpture by Fallis was installed in Central Square, Newcastle, entitled DNA DL90. Standing at a monumental nine-metres high this double helix of shopping trolleys commented on contemporary consumer culture and the implications of scientific discovery.

Further afield, Eilis O'Connell is based in Cork, her abstract work is inspired by a wide range of sources including archaeology, architecture or found objects. Many of her works are large scale public commissions. The gallery will be showing her smaller maquettes in a wide range of materials, including bronze, silver and resin.

Ann Christopher will also feature in the show. In 1980, at the age of 32, Bath-based Christopher was elected as a member of the Royal Academy, one of the youngest artists to achieve membership, and became a Royal Academician nine years later in 1989. She was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of British Sculptors in 1992.

Site-specific installations over the years include the 4.9m Cutting Line (1996) at Marsh Mills, Plymouth, and the 5.5m Towards the Sky (2001-2) at Port Marine, Portishead. More recently, Christopher was commissioned to make a piece for the Keeper's House garden at the Royal Academy. The 5 metre tall sculpture Following the Journey (2017) was the result.

Christopher's non-figurative sculptures, cast mainly in bronze, stainless steel, silver and weathering steel (or Corten), come in all different sizes. At the Pangolin London exhibition which ran from November and December 2019, there were tiny table-top sculptures such as Finding Stones (2019), cast in bronze. At the opposite end of the scale are works such as Outside the Edge (2018) or Holding Lines (2019), standing at 3m and 2.4m tall respectively.

As well as sculpture the 20/20 Vision exhibition will also feature prints, drawings and works on the wall by familiar Gallery Pangolin artists along with a few new names such as Sue Freeborough, Elisabeth Frink, Barbara Hepworth, Briony Marshall, Charlotte Mayer, Polly Morgan, Merete Rasmussen, Lorraine Robbins and Almuth Tebbenhoff.

The exhibition runs from Monday 13th January until Saturday 22nd February. For opening times and further information visit gallery-pangolin.com



A raffle ticket for a £5.25m mansion in Hertfordshire; 3g of Milk Makeup KUSH Lip Balm (other lip balms are available!); 8.5kg of haddock at Peterhead fish market (on 29/11/19); a ticket for Stroud's unique Baroque Night at The Prince Albert. £13.50 will buy you all of these things. In more real terms, it's about 3 pints in said pub. But what you get for this price is beyond compare.

Dave Ayre, is the driving force of these regular nights in the pub, accompanied by an array of some of the finest musicians in their fields. Dave himself is a musician with a CV as long as Rodborough Hill. A CV that includes BBC Concert Orchestra, Sinfonia Viva, Welsh National Opera, the Hallé Orchestra, Royal Philharmonic and more; film work on blockbusters including Shrek, Sleepy Hollow and Moulin Rouge; not to mention rock and roll with the likes of U2, Joni Mitchell, Damon Albarn, The Jacksons (only 4 of them!), Dame Vera Lynn and Led Zeppelin. Not a bad set of references. He is also a jazz musician of some note. So when I met Dave in a local hostelry to discuss the history, the attraction and the future of the Baroque Nights, one of the first questions I had to ask was "whv?"

Dave arrived in Stroud with Sophie,

his wife and regular soprano at the Baroque Nights, about 15 years ago. He had been booked to play at a couple of Baroque themed events at St Laurence's Church with the Le Page Ensemble. He stayed over a couple of nights and basically fell in love with the town. They had been looking for somewhere to bring up their new family out of London, and Stroud definitely fitted the bill. Anyone who knows Dave knows that good beer is up there in his list of important things in life, so he found himself in a few local haunts, including The Albert. Miles found out what he did and suggested "let's do that here" and a seed was planted.

As well as concert and film performances, Dave was and is heavily involved in music education work around the country. He felt that, if they were bringing "classical" music to the pub. then it had to involve people and be more than just a concert. And so it continues. Thomas Ravenscroft (1582 - 1633) is one of Dave's musical loves. Ravenscroft's songs are a fixture of the Baroque Nights now - community singing round the piano was never like this in Eastenders! Dave has really upped the audience participation ante and now has the entire audience singing three- and four-part rounds written 400 years ago. The fact that they are often a bit rude sometimes helps, he says covly!

High quality music played by top class musicians was always the driver for these events. It is about bringing a quality experience to a new audience, rather than expecting them to come to a concert hall. Breaking down the barriers to accessing good music has been part of Dave's mantra since day one. Whether that audience is

children and young people, or adults who wouldn't necessarily venture to a "classical music" concert, introducing them to music they are unlikely to have experienced anywhere else, and making it fun, is what Dave Ayre's Baroque Night is about.

In order to do this, Dave opened his little black book and started asking contacts from his professional life to come and play. From the very first concert, which cost £5 to get in and had about 30 in the audience, the band included people from top orchestras. After the first couple of nights, people started contacting him to be involved. Baroque Night alumni include Tom Davey, Principal Cor Anglais for the Hallé Orchestra; Karen Glen, one of the foremost harpsichord players of her generation; and trumpet player Anthony Thomson who has played with as diverse performers as Sting, the RSC and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. Then there is the audience favourite. cellist Kate Price. To pay £13.50 to hear Kate play is a bargain in and of itself. A world-class cello soloist, Kate returns again and again to Stroud because she loves the venue. loves the audience and, of course, loves playing with Dave and the band. Dave recounted a tale that tells us all we need to know about Kate and how lucky we are to see her so often. In the early days of the Baroque Nights, he was desperate for a cellist so was persuaded to call Kate ("but she's proper big time!"). A brief conversation and she was booked, signing off the call with "sorry love, got to go, just going on stage now for my recital"...at Carnegie Hall!!

Don't think, however, that it's just parachuted in mega-stars. Stroud has its own stars too. Take guitarist

Tom Jacob for instance. He asked to come along to the first event, wowed the audience with a Vivaldi concerto, got the accompanying bug, won the big prize at Bristol Uni and now accompanies people like soprano Emma Kirkby. Not bad for a young lad from Stroud, inspired by the music making in his town!

It has changed a little over its 26 iterations. Now it's so popular that tickets sell out in a couple of days and the audience are in rows of chairs, sitting cheek by jowl and only a few feet from the performers. This feeling of being crammed in allows the events to retain a little of the original pub feeling, even though it's now a little more formal. The overall atmosphere is still relaxed – clap when you want to; go to the bar if you want to; and Dave and the other musicians talk to the audience – a huge plus from me!

One thing that has remained the same – top class music from top class musicians in a great local pub in Stroud. I asked Dave why he kept doing it – his answer came in an instant, "I love making music with people" – not "at" or "for" but "with". That is the essence of the man and the essence of Stroud's Baroque Night.

Dave Ayre's Baroque Night returns to the Prince Albert on Sunday 5th January at 8pm ft. the music of Bach, Vivaldi, Handel and other brilliant composers. Tickets cost just £13.50adv £15otd £3 12-18, visit theprincealbertstroud.co.uk for further info.

There will also be a full day programme of entertainment in St Laurence Church, Wassails at the Sub Rooms and Museum in the Park, the grand procession through the town, dancing and mumming in the streets and the Winter Revels in the evening. This year will also see a Bhangra dance workshop and a song workshop for singers of all abilities

The origins of wassailing are over 1000 years old, as a toast to wish your companions good health. Wassailing today is the tradition of visiting your neighbours around 12th night with a wassail bowl and a song, to wish them a healthy and a prosperous new year.

The Stroud Wassail in particular, is a winter festival to wish you a healthy and prosperous new year. In one of the darkest days of the year, the town will be brought to life with wassail songs, colourful costumes, music, Morris dancing, wassail bowls, hobby horses and The Broad. The Stroud Wassail is based upon documents found in the Stroud Museum and upon the recorded reminiscences of people in a Stroud pub back in the 1970s. It is thought that, previously, wassailing was carried out in Stroud up until the 1920s...



Author of the intensely creepy The People at Number 9, local author Felicity Everett is back with another psychological drama. The Move tells the story of Karen as she and her husband uproot from their life in London to a seemingly charming cottage deep in the countryside.

"On the surface, their life looks idyllic," Felicity explains. "He is a devoted husband who has refurbished their cottage in fine style. The neighbours seem welcoming and Karen looks forward to returning, post-family, to her burgeoning pottery career. But the landscape is eerie, and not everyone in the area is necessarily what they seem. As Karen delves back into her troubled past, she finds it increasingly difficult to tell what is real and what is imagined."

Her previous novel. The People at Number 9 came out in 2017 and received widespread praise, including a glowing review from Stroud's own Katie Fforde, who called the book "clever, relentless and utterly recognisable". As with The Move, it explores the idea of people not being who they seem; I ask Felicity what it is about this concept that proves so enticing to readers. "I think people are complex and hard to read." she savs. "even those closest to us. I find I'm a different person in different scenarios, sometimes outgoing, sometimes shy. Certain people bring out the best in us; others the worst, and who hasn't had to re-appraise a favourable first impression of a friend, a neighbour, even a partner?

Human relationships seem to me to be like a kaleidoscope, glimpses of something beautiful among a pattern that's constantly shifting."

Felicity's writing often feels as though it has a very personal angle, and I ask her if she sees elements of herself in her characters. "I'd love to say no, as people don't always like my main charactersincluding me—but I'd be lying! There's always an element of autobiography in what I write. I have felt exploited in relationships with charismatic friends-as in The People at Number 9-and I have recently moved to the country and felt spooked-as in The Move. But if I only wrote from life, my novels would be very dull, so I use my own experience as a iumping off point from which to create original, twisty plots which have authentic human experience at their heart.'

Location plays a vital role in The Move. It's hard not to be inspired by our dramatic Cotswold landscape, but did any real-life English idylls influence the setting in Felicity's latest novel? "The Move is based very much on where I'm now living in the Slad Valley," she tells me. "The book has a strong sense of

place because I looked out of the window and described what I saw. Although it looks like idyll, it felt far from idyllic for me at first, so I projected my own feelings of loneliness and alienation on to the landscape. A few years on, I've made my peace with it and can now appreciate its beauty. There have been other idyllic places in my life—certain beaches in North Wales and South Australia (where we lived for a few years); also Marple in Cheshire, which was somewhere I used to visit in my childhood."


As well as The Move, The People at Number 9 and her 2011 novel The Story of Us. Felicity is also the author of over twenty fiction and non-fiction books for children. What prompted her to start writing fiction for adults? "It took me a long time to pluck up the courage to write a novel. It felt like a very grown-up thing to do and I didn't feel brave enough. Then I hit forty and my best friend, Michele, died of cancer, aged only thirty-two. I started writing a novel to come to terms with that bereavement and by the time I had finished it. I'd understood that having a novel rejected was far from the worst thing that could happen, so I sent it out and wasn't too devastated when it was rejected. The next one was accepted. and I've been writing ever since. None of it took a fraction of the courage my friend showed. I try to remember that, always."

She tells me writing The Move took her eighteen months—"Which is quick for me!"—and its excellent timing to ring in the new decade with a new book. But what's next for Felicity Everett in 2020? "It's very exciting to have a book out on the cusp of change. I hope it coincides with a positive change in politics and a renewed sense of hope and democracy too. I'm already hard at work on a new novel (as yet untitled) about the uneasy truce between baby boomer parents and their grown-up millennial kids. It

concerns, family, friendship, class, and the north-south divide. There are also iokes."

Whatever the generational divide (and gosh, all sorts of other divides these days), one thing that still unites so many of us is creativity; I ask Felicity what advice she'd give to anyone currently feeling as she once did: trying to work up the courage to write that first novel. "I'd say be brave and trust in the power of your story, but if you're getting bored, your reader will be too. At the point when your interest starts to flag, take a step back and think about what you would like to happen now if you were reading this book, not writing it. Write that."

The Move will published by Harper Collins and is available to pre-order now.


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
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
