FILM FESTIVAL 2020

Stroud Film Festival 2020 is a rare thing, a genuinely independent film festival.

Here, on our doorstep. In a world of blockbuster comic book franchises and studio marketing budgets, this is no mean feat.

Backed by the BFI, Stroud Town Council and local businesses, SFF is now in its 6th year. Unlike other top-down festivals, it is a collaboration between 12 independent organisations and venues that curate their own programmes, resulting in a menu of such range to appeal to even the most diverse palettes. The 2020 line-up is entertaining without being obvious; and challenging without being pretentious.

SFF is also unusually immersive and inclusive. Young and old are invited to shoot their own films, provide input into others' films, bring their own projector, meet the filmmakers, ride a half pipe, or simply dress up.

Co-directors Andy Freedman and Jo Bousfield are passionate about the community value of public screenings, and they recognise the importance of events like this to emerging talent.

They also both relish the democratic manner in which the festival comes together. "I really think it's unique," says Bousfield, "maybe because this is a small town, the venues can talk, collaborate."

So, here are some of this year's many highlights:

IMMERSIVE

Immersive cinema meets e-sports in the inaugural Rush Film Fest! Grab your board, pop an olly, and head to Rush Skate Park to catch a 'sick' evening of action sports docs and shorts.

More refined cinemagoers can join Crosby and Sinatra for Lansdown Film Clubs' screening of 1956 classic High Society. Glam up with black tie and pearls, and quaff vintage cocktails from Hollywood's post-prohibition heyday. Hic...

If you have never seen a silent movie with live musical accompaniment, then book tickets for William Wellman's

Beggars of Life. Country music luminary Kate Lissauaer and bluegrass guitarist Jason Titley will serenade you while you watch one of Hollywood's first feminist rebels. Louise Brooks' young woman on the run in a male-dominated underworld shook priggish moviegoers to their pious cores when the film launched in 1928.

AWARD-WINNING

Bafta-winner, Bait, is an intimate portrait of a Cornish community wrestling with unwelcome change. Martin is a fisherman struggling with a sense of displacement after his brother re-purposed his fishing boat as a tourist tripper. In a neat collaboration with Atelier, Soup Versammlung will offer soup and conversation with Bait producers Kate Byers and Linn Waite before the screening at Lansdown.

The selection from Wotton-Under-Edge's Electric Picture House is typically thought-provoking and high-quality. Noah Baumbach's multi-award-winning drama, Marriage Story, is notable for its brutal honesty in the heart-wrenching, hand-wringing machinations of a divorcing couple. Never maudlin, and strangely uplifting.

Portrait of a Woman on Fire, written and directed by the brilliant Céline Sciamma, is a beautifully disquieting romance, set in 18th century Brittany, where a female painter and her muse form a bond that challenges societal norms. Credit goes to the Electric for unearthing this woefully overlooked recent gem.

RARE GEMS

The folks at Stroud Brewery also deserve a medal for digging out the unremittingly charming French animation Belleville Rendez Vous from 2003, by comic book artist Sylvain Chomet. If you like the surrealist

















slapstick of Jacques Tati, you will love this. So, order a Tom Long, sit back, and smile.

While we're on an uplifting vibe, check out the Aretha Franklin documentary feature Amazing Grace. This film was unwatchable until recently because the footage was out of synch with the sound. In 2018, wizards of digital technology fixed the glitch, and now this time capsule classic is released in all its Aretha gospel glory.

Another treat for film historians is the work of Stroud animator Harold Whittaker and the former Stroud animation studio Halas and Batchelor, which will be showcased across several events at the Museum in the Park, including the 1954 Orwell classic Animal Farm.

FAMILY-FRIENDLY

Top tips for the tiddlers are Aardman Model Making Workshops at the Museum in the Park and the Willy Wonka (1971 version) chocolate and gob-stopper fest, courtesy of Strictly Cinema

TAKE PART

At the Goods Shed, Hollywood director and Stroud local, Mark Jobst, leads an innovative pitch-in-progress event for Home, his musical about three voung homeless people in Bristol. Jobst, whose recent credits include The Witcher, will narrate his film idea, accompanied by a live performance of the music and movement that infuse the story. If sharing work-in-progress were not unusual enough, Jobst will also invite the live audience to contribute ideas to his pitch. I put it to him that it takes a brave - or foolhardy - filmmaker to submit work-in-progress to public scrutiny. "We can be all too exclusive in the film business," says Jobst. "If I

am going to do this properly, I want to throw it open and engage with people. With this subject matter, it can't be too pat." Jobst, rather disarmingly, admits to being both nervous and excited by the experiment.

There's also nothing safe about the winner of Stroud Shortcuts, the pitch competition for 16-25s, says filmmaker and mentor Joe Magee. "I was excited by originality of the idea," says Magee, of 16-year-old Louis Gardner's winning submission. Magee and Gardner shot the 90 second film in February.

Aspiring young filmmakers at Flies on the Wall youth theatre have also made 10 short films for the Festival, and budding 'Scorceses' of all ages are invited to take part in the 60 Second Film challenge on 14/15 March, when this year's theme will be revealed. Selected entries will premiere on the big screen at Film Stroud on 20 March, alongside the Shortcuts winning film.

If projecting films is more your bag, then BYOB Bring Your Own Beamer at Studio 18 invites you to join this DIY one-nighter in which artists and enthusiasts will bring their own projectors to screen a dizzying array of films on every surface: walls, floors, ceilings. Register your interest via the SFF website.

LOCAL HEROES

Cultural preservation is juxtaposed with the perpetual change of modern living in the award-winning feature, Blackbird, written by Nailsworth-based filmmaker Robyn Pete. A Q&A with Pete and her collaborators follows the screening, organised by the Stroud Women Filmmakers Collective and Atelier.

Stroud filmmakers and founders of The Good Grief Project, Jimmy Edmonds and Jane Harris, have curated an evening of films exploring love and death, The Language of Grief, hosted by Open House. Edmonds' and Harris' non-judgemental and genuinely curious approach to bereavement debunk this culturally suppressed subject.

Beyond Solastalgia at Hawkwood asks climate experts to contemplate a sustainable future. Peter Moseley's film also celebrates the work and life of Pollv Higgins, Stroud-based environmental campaigner, who died last year.

And finally, SFF pays tribute to Rick Vick, another Stroud hero who died last year. Vick is remembered for the huge contribution he has made to film culture in the local community.

As I said, Stroud Film Festival is a rare thing. Please support it in all its wondrous and manifold guises, not least because of the wondrously talented people and manifold organisations behind this brilliant event. Enjoy.

ROBYN PETE

"There is no such thing as a gap year in South Africa," says filmmaker Robyn Pete. "but I did really want to travel. I thought 'I've got a degree I have made a feature film I want to go to the UK and work for the BBC'."

What could go wrong?

Robyn's career in film started after she completed a degree in Drama at Stellenbosch University in South Africa. She signed up for an MA course and with 2,000 rand in hand (approximately \$200) made a film, a feature no less. "And I came out with change!" she says. "I think that's when I fell in love with filmmaking. It was filmed on video, we had to do everything, we had to shoot it ourselves, we had to edit it ourselves...just me and two first-years who helped out. I think it was great to wear many hats and learn what everybody does."

The screening was a success. "It did well for me, people laughed where they should have done, bless the actors there was no rehearsal it was just 'please can you show up and perform at this time'." She graduated top of the class! The next step was to save enough to come to the UK.

Waitressing is a traditional preparation for a media career and it provided Robyn with the opportunity, not just to raise money, but to meet Brits. She bagged any table seating someone with a British accent, once she had served them their vindaloo she would find an opportunity to "sing her little song" to them about how she was hoping to work in the UK in film and media, and after many vindaloos, on the penultimate night..."there were two Brits in and I went over and sung my little song and they happened to be working for the BBC!" Details swapped, contacts made future assured...

Through her contacts Robyn spent some time on a film set and got a job working for the APA (Advertising Producers Association). She began to shoot film again. She entered the Straight 8 competition, shot a short film on a Super 8 cartridge given to her by the competition and won a screening in the Cannes Lions selection..."that was a really lovely taste of where film can take you" she recalls.

But it was the London Film School that gave her the breakthrough she needed, by now married and living in the UK, she took the PostGrad course and she met a producer (James Barrett) who had been working with Jamie Chambers on a short film titled When The Song Dies. This short film was to

inform their main objective which was to make a feature film. Robyn came on board as screen writer and first assistant director. She worked through the draft scene by scene, with the director, to produce the screenplay and then, as first AD, called the shots. "On the set itself I send out the call sheets. I make sure the director is ready and the cinematographer is ready, and the sound people are ready and I say 'roll sound', 'roll camera' and the director calls action. It worked well for me having written the script".

Blackbird was the film and "it was made on a beautiful shoestring". Its theme was to explore the loss of culture through the eyes of a young man trying to remember the oral tradition and the songs and stories of a Scottish community before the songs disappear.

The film also brought a more literal meaning to the phrase cliff hanger. It was a fraught night shoot on a beach. The fire was lit, the cameras ready. The Scottish summer night is only four hours long, so time was crucial, and then the producer had to head back up from the beach to get some supplies "so he got in his car but he had to go up this coastal path in the dark." Robyn recalls, filming was frenetic and the dawn on its way. "I could see his tail lights go up the path from the beach." Then. "I got a radio call from him... 'Robyn I need you to call off the shoot! I need you to send everyone up here I'm hanging from the cliff in my car.' I looked up and I could see his tail lights...". A cliff hanger indeed, but no producers were harmed in the making of Blackbird and the film's scenes on the beach made it to completion.

Since then Robyn co-wrote a script

which won \$15,000 dollars and resulted in the short film 13 starring James Harkness. It won best production at the UnderWire Film Festival.

A trailer and some fundraising raised finance for the charity Duchenne UK and Robyn is preparing a documentary about four women who are dealing with the impact of Duchenne's Muscular Dystrophy on the lives of their children. Meanwhile a script for a new feature Seeds of Love (co-writer Dave Fadesh) was shortlisted for the Euro Script Competition.

"I really enjoy learning, I really enjoy being the auteur, I think that's why sometimes the short format suits me, because I do like the writing, and the editing, and I do like finding the stories." Robyn is regular contributor to the Stroud Women Filmmakers Collective and works with Cheltenham Arts Award.

Blackbird's title is from a song by Martyn Bennett part of the community in Scotland where the film and the documentary were made. It was nominated for the Michael Powell Award in Edinburgh, won Best Picture at the Catskill Mountains Film Festival and will be screened at Atelier on Friday 6th March as part of this year's Stroud Film Festival.

from Cheltenham, have a nice little bowl of soup and a pot of tea at Star Anise first, then I end up taking away a big bundle of records. It's a great day out!"

Excitedly flipping through an enormous pile of freshly-delivered Japanese second-hand vinyl, Spencer, a man in his mid-50s, is clearly besotted with Sound Records. GOP is here to talk to joint owners Tom Berry and Sean Roe who in March will celebrate the shop's second birthday. For vinyl obsessives like Spencer - and indeed this writer - it's hard to imagine that there was once a time when Sound Records didn't exist. But since it opened at the bottom of Gloucester Street in 2018, it's seamlessly entered into the fabric of Stroud despite the fact that the town already has one of the South West's most established and beloved record shops, Trading Post.

So what's special about Sound Records?

Sean leaps in first "I think we have a diverse collection of records, they're well organised - and they're pretty cheap! We love records and the music that we're selling, so we can actually talk about the stuff." "Exactly," adds Tom, "I think sometimes people come to the shop and they don't necessarily know what they want - they have an

idea of the sort of thing they are after but they want us to guide them towards what they might like. So they'll say something like 'I really liked that Middle Eastern tune have you got more like it?' - and our role would be to find something that has the same feel but maybe takes them somewhere different. I guess one of the biggest selling points of the shop is our knowledge really. We're very different people too, that's our greatest strength: I'm structured and organized; Sean's a lot more esoteric and creative; I'm more fluent in dance music, hip hop, contemporary music and classic rock." "And I'm from the experimental side," adds Sean, "jazz, but not just bebop, free jazz as well; I'm also pretty strong on African music as well as old school electronica from the 50s and 60s. There's a lot of crossover too - we both love world music, Arabic music, reggae and

It's true, there's nothing that music fans like more than discovering new music via the traditional route of human interaction – something the world of Spotify algorithms just can't compete with. Since they've moved into their bigger premises at the top of the High Street, the shop has become a social hub for music fans, "The new location is fantastic, – we can stock a lot more records and now customers can spend quality time in here, have a cup of tea and explore – we've got listening stations, we host live events; we're right in the heart of the Stroud community; we get teenagers coming in and buying The Cure or Paul Simon's Graceland."

So is it like that scene in High Fidelity where John Cusack whispers, "I will now sell five copies of The Three EPs by The Beta Band" by just playing it in the shop? "Absolutely," says Sean, "We put records on and they sell – it happens with Talking Heads' Remain In Light as well as Speaking in Tongues – people know Burning Down The House and the rest of side one but when you put the other side on they start nodding their heads and asking 'what's this?'"

"There's an album called Rat by a local act called The Rat Affair and whenever we put that on there's a lot of interest," says Tom, "we've sold loads of that by playing it."

Of course one of the key things about

Sound Records is that it's about 75% second hand vinvl. Sure, they'll order new releases if they like them (Tom shows me this week's delicious haul of Soul Jazz compilations, the new Tame Impala album and a Sam Cooke rerelease) but most of their stock comes from us, the public, when we decide to part ways with our discs, so they have to be gentle. "Selling a collection often coincides with a major life event," says Tom, "maybe someone's got divorced or a family member has passed away, so when you're approaching people to buy records you have to be sensitive. You're very conscious of the fact that people are giving away their whole life history or their partner's life history. So it can be very emotional - sometimes people are in tears...""One woman asked us to take photographs of all the records she was selling so that she could remember what she had." adds Sean. Has it ever got awkward? "There was an incident," he explains, "where someone actually gave away their partner's life history. She came in the next morning demanding her records back because her husband had sold them! We gave them back, of course."

With records being so personal, have they ever discovered any long-forgotten mementos in a collection? "Well, there was a 'herbal' roll-up and a pubic hair in a copy of the Beatles White Album!" laughs Tom. "Or it may have just been a bristle from a paintbrush..." adds Sean with a raised eyebrow.

So how are they going to celebrate their second birthday? "Well, for our first birthday we had a great show with The Orb at the Goods Shed," says Tom. "We're very excited about the show this vear: we want our party every year to be a reflection of what we are doing in the shop. Musically, we think Flamingods are very much in sync with what we're all about: exotic but melodic. Plus. we've got an amazing supporting bill: Graham Dunning, who's going to make techno from household objects; Dubbu and Mendoza - who are two of Stroud's best DJs: Moina Moin and of course Wooolheads, who are an electro groove megaparty!" Sean looks mildly uncomfortable but also slightly chuffed at his partner's bigging up of his own band which also includes local poet/ performance artist Uta Baldauf.

Any plans for Year Three? "A record label," says Sean without hesitation.

Like Soul Jazz or Honest Johns, we want to do current stuff as well as historical releases and compilations." "Whatever we do," says Tom, "it's going to be eclectic. We're never going to be pigeonholed into one genre..."

Throughout our conversation, Spencer has been looking through the Japanese vinyl and is now ready to pay. He's a jazz and blues fan but Sean and Tom have clearly blown his mind and his choices reflect this. As I turn to leave he says, "This shop has helped to introduce me to all sorts of other music like reggae, punk, post punk, world music particularly Brazillian music and afrobeat. It's just such a fantastic eclectic selection." Sound Records, how long can we keep it a secret?



Imagine a show that encompasses puppetry, music and theatre. A story with adult themes but appropriate for children as well. A story without words which enables the listener to form their own version of the narrative – such a show is RAT and it comes to Stroud this month...

Born out of a collaboration of two musicians on the set of a stage version of We're Going On A Bear Hunt, The Rat Affair project has been in gestation for over two years. Stroud resident Joe Carey (saxophone) and Cornishman Louis Gulliver King (piano, accordion) met through a shared love of Fastern European music and the groundbreaking production of Shockheaded Peter by The Tiger Lillies devised theatre. Once the idea of developing a similar concept-based show based around The Pied Piper of Hamelin was born. the initial draft of the show was written by Louis almost immediately. The pair worked with other musicians over an intensive week to develop the storytelling and, this in turn drove

Already an album, now a stage show and ultimately a book, this is very much a multi-media project. As the first piece of the jigsaw, the album is a triumph. Recorded at the legendary Sawmill Studios in Fowey and pressed on vinyl as well as available digitally, the record soon

became one of Sound Records' albums of 2019. It first reached our ears when Joe brought it into the shop last summer. We put it on and within an hour we'd sold a couple of copies to interested customers drawn in by an unlikely but fantastic combina-tion of soul, soundtrack, klezmer and rock. The record works very well as a standalone piece or as a sound-track to the story itself. As 2020 arrives however, it is the story that has become the primary focus as the project moves into the stage show phase.

Integral to the live show are three other musicians, double bassist/ guitarist Eliot Allison, drummer and vo-calist Roger Luxton and Alyssa Lynch whose violin underpins so many of the most memorable passages. There is clearly a desire to bring a 'gig' mentality to the storytelling, to bring a gig audience to a theatre show and vice versa. Louis readily admits that if he gets a whoop of recognition for any of the pieces of mu-sic on the upcoming eleven date tour based on what people have

heard on the record, his work is done!

There are also a couple of puppeteers, lighting and sound technicians to help bring the story to life and, in particular, the simple but beautiful drawings of Ailsa Dalling, which gives the whole project its unique char-acter. Lino prints of Ailsa's drawings are put onto acetates to illustrate the story and provide the audience with pointers to the narrative. Joining Ailsa on stage will be puppeteer Nix Wood, the pair have worked alongside each other for many years, and will be creating the visual world of RAT.

On one level the story of the Pied Piper is very simple – a town is infested with rats and a piper is employed to take them away – but actually there are a number of more adult themes that the story explores – greed, migration, generational gaps and ostracized communities are just a few of the narratives that the team ex-pect their audience to consider.

The show has already played to receptive audiences in Cornwall

and will visit Stroud before taking in Bristol, Wolverhampton and other locations before a possible wider tour and even festival dates in the future. The show will literally evolve as it is performed each night with enough flexibility in the storytelling to enable different outcomes if that feels appropriate at any time.

What comes next for the group is as yet unclear but there are plenty of ideas in the pipeline. In the mean-time we have a unique opportunity to see a project which has involved over twenty people in its inception and is continuing to mutate. Whether you love theatre, storytelling or just damn good music you'd be a fool to miss its arrival at the SVA Goods Shed on Wednesday 4th March.

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

A Wayzgoose was at one time an entertainment given by a master printer to his workmen each year on or about St Bartholomew's Day (24 August). It marked the traditional end of summer and the start of the season of working by candlelight. Later, the word came to refer to an annual outing and dinner for the staff of a printing works or the printers on a newspaper.

Nowadays, it refers to any kind of celebration, exhibition or event in the printing world, and more specifically for us, it's a letterpress exhibition, sale and party at Stroud Brewery on March 7-8, showcasing the area's crème de la crème of the inky world of letterpress.

Organised by renowned letterpress poet and writer Dennis Gould with book designer and graphic artist Lucy Guenot, plus others, this year's Wayzgoose will include artists and craftspeople such as John Furnival, Andrew Morrison, Otto Gobley, Nick Pride, Imi Maufe and of course Dennis and Lucy themselves who met through Kitty Crossley, a fellow printmaker who will also feature in the fair.

Dennis is a famous face in Stroud, his workshop tucked away next to Star Anise Café. His story is such that an entire issue of Good on Paper could be devoted to him, and indeed his personal story has been featured on these pages previously. Born in Burton-On-Trent and raised in Derbyshire it includes a stint in the army, campaigning for nuclear disarmament, a brief spell in prison, and poetry. He came to Stroud in 1989 to visit his friend, fellow peace activist John Marjoram. Nowadays you can find him on Saturdays selling his works at

the Shambles market.

He started letterpress printing in 1991 after meeting John Grice, who established Evergreen Press in the 1980s in Stonehouse. "Before Tesco was built by Stratford Park there was a tree sit in and I wrote a poem called Stroud Eye Views about the trees and John printed it. Two weeks later I bought a letterpress," Dennis explains.

The world of letterpress has "completely changed" since Dennis began."In 1991-92 there were mostly the old private presses, you know they had their letterpress machines and type and it reminded me of how the old booksellers used to be. All the old booksellers used to hate paperback, paperback books were seen as cheap and would bring ordinary people into the bookshop and they hated it, so it's similar with the old printers, they were slightly sniffy about things like post guards, I mean I am generalizing. The man at the Whittington Press - John Randale - is the opposite, he includes and encourages everyone else. He is the letterpress man in the country who just happens to be in Cheltenham.

Lucy completed a masters in Multi-Disciplinary Printmaking at the University of the West of England, and is a member of the Gloucestershire Printmaking Cooperative (GPC) in

There are more than 16 letterpress printers in the Stroud Brewery event, and almost all live in or have a connection to Stroud. This seems rather a lot of people for what was a little-known discipline? "In Stroud I think it's because there's such a good artistic community, so there are things like the Stroud Artists Book Group and quite a few of those members use letterpress. I am part of the GPC and we've got letterpress there. All of these places they end up linking up and people keep in touch. Of course, Dennis himself is a bit of a club figure himself and so people know him, because he is so generous with his time, space and gives gifts so much," Lucy tells me.

"There is an international network of letterpress printers, and there are many more than one would imagine," Dennis adds. "A lot of them aren't members of any group. There is an Oxford Guild of Letterpress printers, which many belong to. Perhaps every other town has a letter press printer, if not more than one. Most of them print private press books, that are more limited edition, but there


is a new generation. A lot of young women who are letterpress printers, you can see they can be independent by printing, making cards and posters and doing what we call 'jobbing printing' – every day printing – and that's a whole new wave. I've been to several art schools talking about letterpress where they've put it back in. Most art schools have got letterpress that they kept, and now they're using as a contrast to computer design."

It can't be a coincidence that the craft is enjoying a resurgence as our lives have become more engulfed by screens and digital products. Dennis agrees: "There is a resurgence of craft because of the computer, the screen, which are virtual, crafts give self-confidence, but also of course you are using your body as well as your mind. I think there is a great need. Everyone needs to do something physical, and sadly now in society most people don't get the chance, unless you do take up an art or a craft of passion."

"Touch is very important in printing isn't it, the feel of the paper, all of the senses really – when you're rolling out the paper the hiss of the ink has to be right, you've got to get the right sound so you know you've got the right amount of ink, the smell, it's just very sensual in

a way and is an antidote to the screen which can be so isolating," Lucy adds.

"What distinguishes it from computer design, even with distressed letters on the computer, is that the inks are denser, so the black is blacker than you could ever get on a computer, and the red is redder and so on. It used to be called the black art, letterpress, not because it was devilish, but because of the ink," Dennis says.

"Setting type is very meditative isn't it," Lucy gestures to Dennis' piles of printed work in front of us. "You can't rush it, you have to concentrate. With printmaking the process is as much the pleasure of it as the final product. The wooden letters are so beautiful they are lovely objects in themselves, they are very pleasing to work with."

Is it also that we are excited by the imperfect? In an Instagram-perfected world Dennis and Lucy's work is a beautiful antidote, the occasional smudge making it all the more charming. "Yes, but if you say that to the fine printers they would be horrified you see, by my work!" laughs Dennis. "Badly printed wooden type that's the absolutely horror. There's a divide," Lucy explains, "I think the difference

is that we come to it from an artist or craftsman side," Dennis says. "I was a writer so technically I knew nothing, and I wasn't interested originally in the technical side, although I am now, I just wanted to produce the work. Ironically, it is what people like, but it is what fine printers hate! John recognized what I was doing and what other craft artists were doing, even though our printing. in their eyes, is appalling, you know. I am pleased when it comes out clear, but I am not concentrating on that, whereas the fine printers do. But there's this whole network now of printers who are primarily artists and printers who are doing their own designs and their own art and posters. It has grown considerably.3

The Wayzgoose Printers Fair takes place at Stroud Brewery on March 7-8, 12-4pm and includes cards, posters, books, printing equipment and a letterpress exhibition.



HARRAH PERSAUD

Hard evidence that Stroud is now the short story capital of the world comes from local novelist Hannah Persaud. I discover that she once came runner-up in a national short story competition to a guy called John Holland, famous in these parts for being the doyen of Stroud Short Stories. "It was amazing: there were around 800-900 entries, all judged anonymously; and John won, and I came second", Hannah tells me over morning coffee.

Not to be outdone, Hannah went on to win several short story competitions in her own right. Now her debut novel. "The Codes of Love" is being published by classy independent, Muswell Press. Set both in London and rural Wales, it's a portrait of the 'seem-to-haveit-all' marriage of Ryan and Emily. Behind the happy headlines however, trouble is brewing in the shape of the free-spirited Ada who represents the freedom Emily has been striving for. and the escape from convention that Ryan didn't know he wanted. The novel is hugely impressive: I've rarely read a more charged account of contemporary human relationships.

Appropriately given Hannah's short story pedigree, the origins of "The Codes of Love" lie a prize-winning story she wrote entitled "Cyfannedd Fach". This then became the name of the Welsh cottage where Ryan and Ada hole up to conduct their affair, and is based on a real location. "It's a place I went to with my family in the middle of the Welsh mountains. It's totally remote and I completely love it. I started writing the story there and finished it when I got home".

A strong sense of place is one of the essential components of a Hannah Persaud novel. Setting, she says, is hugely important to everything she writes. "Other writers get inspiration from a character or something they

overhear, but for me it always starts with a place and only then do I insert the characters". Hannah is currently at work on her second novel, inspired by the atmospheric location of The Convent in Woodchester.

The genesis for this location, location. location approach lies perhaps in Hannah's unusually peripatetic upbringing. Born in Yorkshire the eldest of three siblings, she lived in Devon until her "restless" teacher parents announced they were moving to Nepal, "I was 11 and had never been on a plane before. And then suddenly we were moving to Kathmandu. I remember driving out of the airport along a road lined with cows and dogs, and thinking: where IS this place? It was such a culture shock". Hannah lived in Nepal until she was 16, attending a Christian missionary school ("that was an interesting experience as I'm not religious at all") and then went to an American Christian boarding school in Uttar Pradesh in India to study for her A levels. "It was so remote: an 8 hour bus ride from Delhi up into the mountains. My mum dropped me off and left me standing on the side of a mountain". After five months however, the school stopped teaching the courses Hannah wanted to study and she eventually completed her 6th form education at a state school in Oxfordshire before going to Oxford Brookes University to study English and Publishing.



Ironically Hannah rejected publishing as a career, believing it to be too competitive and cut-throat; but now finds herself in the even more competitive business of being a published author (she also works part-time as a fund-raiser in the charity sector). She moved to Stroud with her husband and two now teenage children in 2009, having come know the area because her formerly restless parents decided to retire here.


The second essential component of a Hannah Persaud novel is her preference for playing with point of view and time frame, "The Codes of Love" alternates in the telling between Emily and Ryan, and also plays fast and loose with the sequence of events. The effect is to keep the reader planted up on their toes, a quality I personally find invigorating in any novel. "I wanted to tell Emily and Ryan's story from both their perspectives but I didn't want to just repeat the same scenes which is why the novel is structured as it is. I really love books and TV dramas that play with time sequence; and which try and give you a more rounded picture of how the plot evolves from the point of view of different characters".

And finally, a Hannah Persaud novel will always include an element of noir: I confess that there were times when I got quite spooked by "The Codes of Love", particularly when reading the chapters set in Wales. "I really love darkness", confirms its author. "The Codes of Love could easily have been darker still: I would really love to write a super dark novel one day".

Those who prefer an uplifting read shouldn't let this put them off. "The

Codes of Love" is an accomplished debut about the complexities of human relationships. It's also a shining example of the catalyst that short stories - while a worthy genre in their own right - can provide for aspiring novelists in need of both practice and resilience, "I think short story writing is a really good way to practise the craft of writing", reflects Hannah. "And the process of entering competitions is also a good grounding, both because of the feedback you get, and because of the rejections. When I started writing and I wasn't getting anywhere in competitions. I used to take it really badly, doubting myself and thinking: I'm never going to write anything again". But reader, she did.

"The Codes of Love" by Hannah Persaud is published on 5th March by Muswell Press (muswell-press.co.uk)




