# JONNY FLUFFYPUNK PLAYLIST

"It was good fun putting this together. I err on the side of Io-fi; of the incomplete, the ramshackle, the imperfect. Human stuff. I'm not much interested in production values and things like that. Not to say there isn't some stuff on here that isn't the product of months tweaking in the recording studio, but if there is, I'd be hard pushed to tell you what, and it's certainly in the minority. I grew up with punk rock, and DIY attitudes. If you had something you wanted to say, it was far more exciting to get up and just do it rather than worry about technical things, like learning to play properly. Anyone can sing in tune; anyone can play a guitar. James Blunt can do both; he moves me not. The Ramones could do neither; they changed my life. This playlist, like most people's, is just skimming a cupful from an ocean of possibility. It's what came to mind when I sat down, just now. No long deliberation or tweaking to make sure it's fine-tuned for optimum coolness. There's tons of obvious classics I've missed off, some people (Wreckless Eric, The Burning Hell, Prince Far I) who should really be on there and loads of genres I love dearly that are sadly unrepresented- I love loads of experimental improv stuff, but that's rarely about individual tracks. There's also stuff I love that you won't find on spotify, cos the people who made it release it on cassette, or floppy disk (!) or just make damn sure it's not available on spotify. Lots of the artists below operate like prolific cottage industries. R. Stevie Moore, Jad Fair of Half Japanese, Stanley Brinks and Jeffrey Lewis release steady streams of output in small runs on obscure labels, scratching livings on the artistic margins. Boldly following their stars, oblivious to prevailing trends. I urge you all to check them out."

# STROUD BOOK **FESTIVAL**

The organisers of the Stroud Book Festival have achieved something very few governments have come even close to this year. They responded early and decisively to the looming pandemic in a manner that protected both the community and the arts. While others prevaricated over their Covid protocols, the festival team elected at the beginning of the year to take this year's festival entirely online, and this summer they made an even bolder move to make the festival free to the public.

For Festival Marketing Director, Louise Brice, this was no mean feat: "Community was at the forefront of our minds, so having made the decision to go online, we felt it was appropriate to make a further gesture by making it free of charge. When we set up the crowd-funder this summer we weren't sure what to expect. But we received a lot of individual donations, and whilst that was great for the fund raising, it also really boosted our confidence that we were doing the right thing."

If the pandemic spurred the decision around logistics, have Covid and current affairs such as Black Lives Matter also influenced this year's festival programme? "We were working on most of this year's themes very early on. For instance, we were planning to feature Adam Rutherford's How to Argue with a Racist before we'd heard about George Floyd. But it couldn't be more relevant than it is now", says Festival Programme Director Caroline Sanderson.

Sanderson and Brice were keen to make this year's festival simultaneously 'very Stroud' and outward-looking. There is a strong showing from local authors with local stories such as Alice Jolly's period novel Mary Ann Sate, Imbecile, adapted for podcast by Red Dog Productions, which will be streamed nightly as a bedtime story. Local celebrities, Cath Kidston and Joanna Trollope power up the festival's wattage. Meanwhile, Helen Macdonald's session on her much-anticipated second novel Vesper Flights; and Anna Bailey's preview of her debut novel bring scale and exclusivity to the programme.

Through her career in publishing, Sanderson is well-placed to map literary trends, and I ask if authors are responding to this year's crises in their choice of stories and narrative form. Sanderson contemplates a deeper, slower impact: "It takes a while for world events to percolate in fiction. And there is always the risk of getting behind the zeitgeist if you are too reactive. But the pandemic has certainly created a heightened mood, and one in which life's simple pleasures are regaining a cultural value.

As in previous year's, the festival programme has a rich environmental seam, with the Polly Higgins tribute, an obvious highlight. Jonathan Porritt gives us reason for hope after a decade of confronting climate change and Dara McAnulty, the 16-year-old winner of the Wainwright Prize for UK nature writing introduces his charming book Diary of a Young Naturalist.


Sanderson is keen to broaden the appeal of the festival, and she believes McAnulty will chime with younger audiences. To that end, this year's festival has greater potential reach by virtue of being digital. The 2019 festival was considered a big hit with ticket sales of 4500, but there are no limits online. "It's actually pretty exciting that audiences can tune into our YouTube channel from anywhere", says Sanderson.

The Stroud Book Festival has depth, breadth, imagination and entertainment at its heart. It has been organised and curated with sure hands and inquisitive minds, supported by local businesses and community organisations. It is a blueprint for community action in a time of crisis that a few world leaders would do well to adopt.

# STROUD SHORT STORIES

Stroud Short Stories is a bi-annual event, founded by local artist and writer Bill Jones in 2011, it's aims to encourage, promote and showcase contemporary writing by residents of Gloucestershire. Writers submit their stories, ten are selected by SSS organiser John Holland and a cojudge and, in 'normal' pre-COVID times, all ten stories are read aloud to a packed audience. Clearly, things will need to be a bit different this year - more on that later....

In 2014 John Holland took over from Bill as organiser, describing the post as 'a labour of love'. Former librarian, library campaigner and satirical gag writer for the BBC and Punch magazine, John started writing short fiction in 2012. He has now had more than a hundred stories and flash pieces published in anthologies, magazines and online and has won five short fiction contests, and been runner up, short listed, long listed, commended, etc in competitions nearly 50 times.

I met John for a cup of tea back in February – face-to-face, sitting on the same sofa, no-masks in sight....imagine! – and chatted again online recently, to get the low-down on what makes Stroud Short Stories such a special part of the area's arts landscape.

### CHELTENHAM LITERATURE FESTIVAL CALLED STROUD SHORT STORIES "POSSIBLY THE BEST SHORT STORY EVENT IN THE SOUTH WEST" – WHAT DO YOU THINK MAKES IT SO SPECIAL?

Because it's crazy successful compared to many other short story events - this doesn't happen anywhere else. OK, there are events all over the country. but they don't get 150 people turn up and they don't sell out every event: every event we've held since May 2014 has completely sold out - that's 14 in succession. The quality is the thing that makes people come back again and again - there are some extraordinary stories. Of course, it's also partly about Stroud as a place - we are a creative centre and there's clearly something about the way we do it that makes people so enthusiastic.

### WHAT MAKES A GOOD SHORT STORY?

I am constantly asking myself that! There are no rules, but having said that...here are a few things to bear in mind. The key thing with a short story is that every word has to count, so make sure it's crisply written - you don't have time for verbiage or back story. If you've taken a whole page to set the scene, it's not going to work. You need to engage your reader from the very beginning. Some entries have too much padding, I read them and want to shout 'Get on with the story!'.Create a universe the reader can buy into. A consistent authorial voice is a good thing, as is dialogue - that enlivens any story and will help with characterisation. Ideally there should be some sort of conflict in there and it shouldn't be predictable or mundane - there should be some sort of a surprise in it: a lot of the stories I read, I know what's going to happen, and it's great when I don't! Or even better, when I think I know and I'm proved wrong – that's fantastic.

### ALWAYS THINK ENDINGS ARE REALLY TRICKY IN SHORT STORIES – BOTH AS A WRITER AND A READER.

Yes. I'm a short story writer myself and the ending is - as you say - the most difficult. We've had some very good stories that we haven't included because the author blew the ending, and it's really easy to do that. When I say I like surprises, I'm not talking about those 'twist at the end' kind of moments - I'm not keen on the 'it was all a dream', or it was aliens or ghosts kind of ending. People also have a tendency to explain the ending: don't. My suggestion is to re-read your story and then remove the last sentence. And then remove the last two sentences. See how that works. Then without the last three sentences and so on. Just keep cutting away until you are at the essence of what the story actually is. When it comes to a close a story should ideally give you a moment's pause for thought. You want something that's like a bell - it goes off and when you stop reading, it still resonates and you are still thinking about it for a while afterwards.

### THERE WERE 119 STORIES BY 90 DIFFERENT GLOUCESTERSHIRE-BASED AUTHORS THIS YEAR, HOW DO YOU CHOOSE THE TOP TEN?

I always have a co-judge, this time it's novelist and short story author Ali Bacon. We both read everything – it's thorough, that's one of the things that makes SSS good. We don't see the names of the authors, we read them blind, it's all anonymously judged. Most tend to come in as a flood in the last weekend - that's always an interesting time. Ali and I create a long list, then a shortlist, then the ten. The level of judging agreement varies! Not every short story, however good, will work when read out loud. That's always at the forefront of our minds when we're making our decisions.

### THE READING-ALOUD AND READING IT LIVE IN FRONT OF AN AUDIENCE – WHY IS THAT SO IMPORTANT DO YOU THINK?

A few reasons: Personally, I consider reading short stories to an audience to be a rite of passage for authors - I was absolutely terrified about performing my short story the first time I did it, but it's so important. There's little to beat sitting in a darkened room to hear an author read his or her words to you. You are fully 'in the now', not worrying about anything else. You lose yourself in it, and I think that's really special. And it's important to note that SSS has always been very much a live event. Yes we've published two anthologies, we do podcasts and videos but essentially it's about people coming along to hear authors read their own stories - and to me, everything else is peripheral. People refer to SSS as a competition but although there is a competitive element to it, it's more of a curation. It's about choosing 10 stories that will work together, of an evening, to amuse, inspire and entertain an audience. There is also a strong social and networking element to live SSS events. Authors meet authors and share their successes. failures, hopes and dreams; firm friendships have been formed between authors who met for the first time at SSS; audience members talk to authors about their work, or are inspired to start writing their own stories.

### THIS YEAR'S THEME IS DISRUPTION - CAN YOU TELL ME A BIT ABOUT THAT?

March, two weeks before the COVID lockdown so it follows that most of the stories are not pandemic related. Disruption can be about all kinds of things, it doesn't have to be literal - we wanted writers to think about it widely. This year's event is dedicated to the late Rick Vick - local author, writing tutor, events organiser and SSS mainstay. who sadly died last year. DISRUPTION is a theme Rick would have loved. Rick helped support Bill Jones in setting up SSS in June 2011 and read at the first one. In total Rick read eight times at SSS - a record. We miss him dearly.

### THINKING OF CURRENT TIMES AND KEEPING WITH THE THEME OF 'DISRUPTION' - HOW HAVE YOU MANAGED TO STILL GO AHEAD THIS YEAR?

The choices in this year of pandemic were clear - go exclusively online or don't hold an event at all. So, on Sunday 8th November our event will be held on YouTube via links on the SSS website at 7.30pm. The chosen ten stories have now been recorded ready for November and it's been interesting hearing from the authors about how they've found doing it this way. Many said they missed the buzz of the live event, the sighs and laughter of the audience. But certainly there are pros as well as cons - some authors have been less nervous in front of a camera rather than standing reading into a microphone on a stage to an audience. In close up

on screen, the facial expressions - the manifestation of emotion on the faces of the authors - are clearer and possibly more powerful than at a distance. It will be really interesting to see how many views each recorded story receives on YouTube. It's special for a number of reasons this year: It's part of the wonderful Stroud Book Festival (all their events are also online this year too) it's also our 20thevent since we were founded in 2011 and it's also free for the first time. My hope is, of course, that our next event, which will be on Sunday 9th May 2021, is live once more in front of a sell-out audience at the Cotswold Plavhouse.

### WHAT WOULD YOU SAY TO ANYONE WHO IS THINKING – AND MAYBE HESITATING! – ABOUT GETTING INVOLVED AND SUBMITTING A SHORT STORY?

The thing to remember about short stories is that this is how we already share our everyday experiences: when we meet as friends what do we do? We tell each other little stories, "This funny thing happened to me last week .... ". The telling of stories, and the listening to them, is built so deep within us. Tap into it. I get it - that fear of failure, the blank page, am I good enough to write something excellent? As Rick Vick said, "Just write every day. It doesn't matter whether it's shit or not. Eventually it will improve." I'd like more young people to submit. We want to hear their voices!

# TEDX STROUD WOMEN

NEXT MONTH TEDX FINALLY COMES TO STROUD, BROUGHT TO US BY ONE OF OUR RELATIVELY NEW BUT NOTEWORTHY RESIDENTS, ROZ SAVAGE MBE, ENVIRONMENTAL ADVOCATE AND THE FIRST (AND SO FAR, ONLY) WOMAN TO ROW SOLO ACROSS THE WORLD'S "BIG THREE" OCEANS...

TED is a non-profit organisation devoted to spreading ideas, it launched in 1984 as a conference where Technology, Entertainment and Design converged, and has since evolved into a community of knowledge sharing spanning all disciplines and cultures.

TEDx is their grassroots initiative, the vehicle for bringing the spirit of TED into local communities to uncover their new ideas, share research and spark conversations. The TED concept feels especially fitting for our great town of Stroud, a melting pot of ideas and conversations that have for centuries influenced positive social and environmental change.

Event organizer and TED veteran Roz Savage has a habit of jumping into big ideas (cite solo rowing across oceans to raise awareness of environmental issues) and was inspired to launch the event after listening to an interview with Chris Anderson, head of TED, outlining his longerterm objectives. "I chose TED as a platform for sharing my experiences and ideas because it has incredible reach, the concept for making great ideas accessible through free knowledge sharing is a true practice of emergence and I find that incredibly thrilling." Says Roz.

Roz put forward Emergence for the theme of the event at the very first meeting with the TEDxStroudWomen team and it perhaps feels fitting at a time where we are emerging from the effects of an unprecedented pandemic, but the theme is about much more than that. "To explain emergence, you have to start with synergy," begins Roz. "Synergy describes different parts coming together to form a whole and to me, the exciting thing about emergence is the idea that the whole can become greater than the sum of the parts. That's pretty magical. In science we see it in things like water, where one water molecule isn't 'wet', but a load of molecules are. In ecology, we now know that a forest is more than a bunch of trees - its emergent property is as an interconnected, vibrant ecosystem of trees, fungus, and creatures. And in the human world, we often say two heads are better than one, and when you add in emergence, two heads are actually exponentially better than one!"

Roz first experienced the power of 'emergence' on her 50th birthday when she brought together a diverse group of 35 insightful women in a retreat environment to see what would emerge. It was groundbreaking stuff, and from this small beginning her community 'The Sisters' was born. Two years on and the The Sisters are a thriving community working towards a vision for changing the world by harnessing the intelligence and strength of the world's women and directing their actions toward change.

It is through this lens that Roz and her dedicated team are approaching the TEDxStroudWomen event; due to take place during the same fortnight as the international TEDWomen 2020 it also supports their vision that in this moment, diversity of ideas is more important than ever.

And what a range of diverse ideas there will be, with nine 15-minute talks spanning education, economics, sustainability, compassion, rural life, intergenerational trauma and creative collaboration, the ambition for TEDxStroudWomen is to create space for these diverse ideas to synergise, complement one another and see what magic emerges.

When asked to pick a favourite she bites her lip and looks upwards, eyes flickering, considering, "the selection process was agonising at times," says Roz. "The standard of entries was incredible, each team member had more than one favourite that didn't make it through. Our selection process was rigorous, considering the merit of the ideas but also the diversity of the program and so we actually have more than a few that got away" She adds. "We are so proud of the final line up, and as the workshops with our speakers continue, we couldn't be more excited to bring these ideas to the event." When pushed further to share a favourite Roz is reluctant but quietly references Dr. Zareen Roohi Ahmed, as one of the most moving stories stating, "it will be hard for anyone not to be moved by this wonderful woman who took such a heartbreaking personal tragedy and turned it into the motivation to be a force for good."

Due to the ever-evolving restrictions the TEDxStroudWomen team have recently had

to take the painful decision to become a virtual event. "Our core intention was to use TEDxStroudWomen to build community and we had imagined this would be easier to do in a real-life event, so we were considering cancelling this year all together." Says Roz, "But with TEDWomen only happening once a year and the topics we are covering being incredibly timely for 2020, we couldn't afford for this delay. With the support of our expert partners at twentythree.net we are curating a fully interactive and community building experience to live up to our original intentions and allow us to spread this unique experience even further."

As a member of the audience, the team and speakers at TEDxStroudWomen are inviting you as individuals to become part of the TEDxStroudWomen whole; your attendance won't be a passive experience; as with life imitating art, by being part of this synergy you have the opportunity to be part of the emergence. That's an idea worth spreading.

The event takes place on Sun 29th November at 2pm - 6pm with the final line up featuring Ann Finlayson (the Chief Executive at SEEd), Sharlize Nicholas (designer and director at Madia & Matilda), Inez Aponte (facilitator and educator in the Human Scale Development), Lucy Chan (Mindful Living Retreats), Dr Zareen Roohi Ahmed (founder of social enterprise Gift Wellness), Nishita Dewa (founder of CollaboratEQ), Jojo Mehta (co-founder of the Stop Ecocide campaign), Angela Findlay (professional artist, writer and freelance lecturer and a former teacher of art in prisons) and Eleanor Salter (writer and climate activist).

# KATE YOUNG

# <u>"I'M A WINTER FAN AND</u> <u>ALSO A CHRISTMAS FAN,</u> <u>SO IT WAS THE PERFECT</u> <u>BOOK FOR ME TO BE</u> <u>ABLE TO WRITE."</u>

Personally I'm not a winter fan, but I do like Christmas and Kate Young's book The Little Library Christmas is already setting me up for the celebrations, whatever they may be!

Kate Young is a food writer, recipe writer and a true fan, not just of winter, but of literature. "The blog was called The Little Library Cafe, which I started in March 2014 and it was putting a recipe a week online." Recipes inspired by beloved literature, but Kate didn't start out as a food writer.

Kate was born "out here" (in the UK) as she puts, it and brought up in Brisbane, Australia "I would say that my lived experience of Australia is that it is an incredibly food focused place...there is just such a lot of passion for sitting outside, eating together and having a nice drink and that very much is part of my childhood."

Part of the success of Australia's "superfoodie" status, Kate explains, is the produce. There are tropical tastes of mango, avocado, banana in Brisbane but not far away (by Oz standards) across the Great Dividing Range, it's colder, and that serves up the best apples and then there's seafood and the wine and the different heritages. But Kate did not start with food, she started as a theatre producer. She took Theatre Studies and Drama Teaching at the Queensland University of Technology so when she escaped the Australian summer and came to London, she worked with youth projects as a producer for The National Theatre, the National Youth Theatre and The Tricycle Theatre.

"I loved producing, it was absolutely the bit of theatre that I wanted to do, I loved being that person that brings everyone together." Her love of theatre is not dimmed and she finds the current situation regarding the support or lack of it for the arts "deeply upsetting". She is cogent in her defence of theatre on

economic terms, but that's for another day. Ultimately she was never tempted by the life of a thespian, acting and directing did not appeal so in 2014 she started baking. "It was a tough year emotionally. I had been here for five years and had a real sense that I would probably be here permanently, that was certainly the hope. But I think I was missing my family and the security of being around people you love all the time."

Following a career in production was likely to lead her away from the aspects she enjoyed. "I think that it wasn't a lack of creative outlet that made me want to do something different, it was that I wanted to do something independent." The Little Library Cafe blog was born, the Guardian found it, reposted it and ultimately offered her a column which she wrote until 2018, when books took over. The Little Library Cookbook came out in 2017 followed by The Little Library Year and The Little Library Christmas which was published in October. You can buy it from her now in Stroud Bookshop where she sometimes works.

Kate moved to Stroud in 2019 to be with friends but, she says, "the farmers market was an enormous draw." Last Christmas Kate's Stroud flat was dressed for Christmas and the The Little Christmas Cafe book was photographed. Her cooking is authentic, her cookbook meticulously presented and yes every literary influence has been read "I'm really fastidious about that, in that I don't want to include a book if I don't think it's worth recommending."

"Food" says Kate "comes into play in so many books in so many different ways, not just in enjoyable ways, but the lack of it becomes a plot." Food can tell the reader so much about the character "whether they enjoy eating ...how easy it is for them to get access to food... how expensive it is ... perhaps a sense of somebody's cultural background."

"I think that I have found that all my favourite descriptions of food are generally in books by women and they are generally set in domestic settings which gives a chance for people to sit down around the table together and eat a meal, and that is the sort of food that I most love to recreate" She cites Elizabeth Jane Howard's The Cazalet Chronicles as a favourite.

And the men? Marcel Proust and his petites madeleines in Remembrance of Things Past. "I mean the whole idea of food having a sense memory or of putting you in a particular place is Proust." But few write about food like Charles Dickens. "There is so much rich brilliant detail of the food. I mean in A Christmas Carol, but also in everything, in all of Dickens because he grew up hungry." Kate's Little Library Christmas does include A Christmas Carol in fact she is adamant that the film The Muppet Christmas Carol is the best rendition of the story ever made. "The food in The Muppet Christmas Carol is perfect, it is beautiful." Then there is Little Women, both in book form and film form "that Christmas breakfast is really visceral.. and certainly the detail of that is really laid out on the screen as it is on the page." The food, the sacrifice and generosity with it, as described in Little Women are crucial to stories we tell. Even arguments about brussels sprouts can delight and inform, such as depicted in Anne Enright's The Green Road or how they can be cooked to perfection as described in The Country Child by Alison Uttley.

The Little Library Christmas includes the food of literature and the joy of the event; themed thoughts on the winter, the search for a tree, Christmas TV and film. There are recipes for all tastes and traditions, vegan and vegetarian.

Who knows what Christmas will bring? But the Little Library Christmas will provide cooking for comfort.



# THE PRINCE ALBERT

RODBOROUGH HILL IS STEEP. VERY STEEP. BUT THE CLIMB IS WORTH IT. FOR AT THE TOP LIES A GEM - THE BEST BOHO BOOZER IN THE WEST AND MY FAVOURITE PUB ON THE PLANET, THE PRINCE ALBERT. AS THEIR WI-FI PASSWORD SAYS, "ILOVETHEPA". I'VE HUFFED AND PUFFED MY WAY UP IN THE PAST AS A CUSTOMER, A PERFORMER AND A WEEKEND BARMAN BUT TODAY I'M HERE FOR GOOD ON PAPER TO TALK TO THE LANDLORDS, LOTTE LYSTER AND MILES CONNOLLY, TO FIND OUT HOW THEY'RE COPING IN THE TIME OF CORONAVIRUS.

It's been six months since I last sat in the courtyard here. Lotte and Miles had just returned from their Thai honeymoon after getting "civilised" in February and the world was yet to be turned upside down by a pandemic. A couple of weeks later the country was in lockdown and the Albert was shut.

As Lotte and Miles say on their website, the Albert is much more than just a pub. It's "a performance space, a gallery, a living room, a quick chat with friends new and old, a meeting point and always a friendly face". Their passion is "making events" and the Albert is home to fantastic entertainment - live music, "silent" cinema, comedy and even (whisper it) stand-up poetry. I can vouchsafe that it's a fabulous place to play with an atmosphere that's second to none. A focal point for the local community it welcomes everyone from knitting clubs to all female Morris dancing sides, it hosts parliamentary hustings and mask making workshops and collects donations for Stroud Food Bank (a ton and a half of groceries so far and still counting).

While they were closed Lotte and Miles did a bit of re-decorating. The bottle green walls are now a lusciously livid lockdown yellow and blue (complimenting the remaining neon pink bits) and although the socially un-distanced chaise longue is currently upstairs in their living quarters the vibe remains the same - a little bit rock 'n roll, a little bit louche lounge lizard more Brixton backstreet than Cotswold country. Those psychedelic walls are still adorned with images of Tom Waits, Ian Dury, John Cooper Clarke et al. Kitsch chandeliers, a painted double bass and all manner of objets d'art hang from the ceilings.

Newcomers are often surprised to discover that despite the idiosyncratic

décor The Prince Albert isn't a free house but is owned by one of Britain's "Pubco's". It's a labour of love running a pub and as tenants it's financially precarious at the best of times. Lotte and Miles' income is regularly supplemented by Miles' work as a roadie for Glenn Tilbrook and Squeeze and his business supplying marquees to festivals. So what do you do when the entire hospitality and entertainment industries close down overnight?

Their Pubco gave them a rent holiday but that rent was still due at some point. Lotte says they were reluctant to look like they were begging but they decided to take part in a national initiative launched by the Music Venue Trust to help prevent the closure of hundreds of independent venues through Crowdfunding. As an established and much respected grassroots music venue live gigs are part of the Albert's DNA. They put on everything from Tuvan throat singers to Caledonian punkabilly via Baroque ensembles, feel-good funk, roots reggae and Balkan gypsy ska. The playlist they curated for last month's issue of this magazine gives a flavour of their wonderfully eclectic taste.

The Crowdfunding page raised £2,000 overnight and has now reached over £12,000. "We were blown away by the outpouring of love" says Lotte. A quick look at the comments section of that page reveals that the Albert is held in huge affection by locals and occasional visitors alike - and with good reason. Lotte and Miles' energy, warmth and generosity is legendary. They've housed, fed and watered countless itinerant bands some of whom stayed for days and found themselves sharing a bed with Erik the hedgehog.

The money raised proved a vital fighting fund to keep them afloat until they could re-open. In the meantime they installed



two pizza ovens supplied by the Pubco and started selling takeaway Barrel & Stone pizzas prepared by Miles in his new self-styled incarnation - "Skinny Milo's". Before Covid 19 various pop-up restaurants would serve a smorgasbord of food in the courtvard - Japanese. Jamaican, Indian vegetarian, burgers and - yes - pizzas. However, since re-opening in July they've continued to do the food themselves with table service as well as takeaway. As Miles says "without the pizzas we wouldn't be here". They sold 999 of them in August (the vegetarian "Garden Club" proving particularly popular - natch - this is Stroud).

They've been meticulous in complying with Covid-safe regulations with detailed information on their website and whilst the essence of the Albert is the same they've had to completely re-style what they do to keep going. "It's like starting a new business from scratch" says Miles. Lotte agrees showing me the bookings for the evening - "yes, a restaurant business". Numbers are necessarily down and regulars aren't as regular so staffing is currently mainly kept in the family - Lotte's daughters Ruby and Pearl with "assistance" from resident canines Fernando, Baxter and recent arrival Margot. It's a balancing act between not having too many customers but enough to make a living. However, they're making it work. More than that, undeterred by the fact that nobody really knows what even tomorrow might bring they continue to make plans.

As befits Stroud CAMRA's pub of the year 2020 the beer here (from Stroud Brewery, Bristol Beer Company and


beyond) is excellent and on November 4th they're putting on another Beer Festival (a sort of of NotOktoberFest, lederhosen not required). Unlike previous festivals that have attracted throngs of drinkers this will have to be a slower, low-key, "heated and seated" affair. November should also see the screening of a BBC2 documentary Saving Britain's Pubs with chef Tom Kerridge - the Albert is one of the four featured pubs. Details are hush-hush at the moment but watch this space...

As I leave I ask them who would be their dream booking for the first gig back whenever this crisis might be over. "I'd love to have Cerys Matthews play here", says Lotte. Miles laughs, "there's this bloke called Elvis McGonagall". It's good to see that a plague hasn't dampened his sense of humour.

Next May will see the 25th anniversary of Lotte being at the helm, 15 of those with Miles and as I saunter back down the hill I think of Hilaire Belloc's words, "when you have lost your inns, drown your empty selves, for you will have lost the last of England". The Prince Albert is the beating heart and soul of Stroud. Let's all ensure it carries on beating for many years to come.

# MERMAID CHUNKY

ONCE AGAIN THE COLLABORATIVE DUO THAT MAKES UP THE MERMAID CHUNKY MOTHERSHIP HAS LANDED IN STYLE WITH THE RELEASE OF THEIR NEW SINGLE GEMINI GIRLS ON SEPTEMBER 18TH 2020.

THIS EXPLOSIVE SONG MARKS THE START OF SOMETHING EVEN BIGGER: THE RELEASE OF THEIR DEBUT ALBUM VEST, WITH FAITH AND INDUSTRY RECORDS. Formed in 2017, Mermaid Chunky are now a regular in the Stroud arts and music scene: when you see them on a line up you know that you're in for a good night. Freya Tate and Moina Walker share out the roles in the band between them as they see fit – the music, the lyrics, the costumes... all are collaborative.

Mermaid Chunky is quite a hard band to categorise, not only because their sound is so unique but also because they couple it with elements of avantgarde performance art, comedy and just plain wholesomeness. Who could help but like them? They don't fit into any particular genre yet they take aspects from many including psytrance, jazz, club, hip hop, spoken word and (in their own words) The Sheepherders' Guide to Music. Their invigorating performances have succeeded in raising the calibre of what a good night out means.

I caught up with them remotely, with the intention of finding out something new and something fun. They, of course, delivered.

### COLLABORATION IS VERY IMPORTANT TO YOUR ETHOS, AND YOU WORK HARD TO BRING AS MANY DIFFERENT PEOPLE ABOARD THE MERMAID CHUNKY MOTHERSHIP AS POSSIBLE. WHAT IS IT THAT YOU ENJOY ABOUT WORKING WITH OTHERS?

Freya: It gives everyone a lot of energy.

Moina: I feel like, for me there's no point

if you don't get everyone involved.

**Freya:** It goes flat if you don't share and change stuff.

**Moina:** Totally, it gets so exciting when you've got so many amazing friends who can do all these amazing things. You want to be involved in their magic.

### ON THE NOTE OF COLLABORATIONS, ARE THERE ANY IN PARTICULAR THAT STOOD OUT TO YOU AS VERY EXCITING?

M: That's hard... the people who really shine are all the amazing hometown Stroud crew. Everyone has amazing creativity and openness... an openness that can be hard to find. It cooks up a powerful feeling of shared ownership. But particular music collaborations? There have been so many but I really enjoyed playing with Yoshino Shigihara and Ursula Russell that time.

F: Yes, I was about to say that. Was it These Girls [a song by MC]? It was already really hectic and we had the drum machine, Ursula started doing this amazing drumming over the top and Yoshino on percussion, so it was kind of like having three drummers. Very intense.

YOUR NEW ALBUM VEST IS BEING RELEASED WITH THE INDEPENDENT RECORD LABEL FAITH AND INDUSTRY. HOW DID YOU CHOOSE WHO TO GET YOUR MUSIC RELEASED BY? (OR DID THEY CHOOSE YOU!)



F: Well we've worked with Kristian (Capitol K) before. He recorded our album at the Total Refreshment Centre in London. We really enjoyed working with him, and then he asked us to be on his label. It just seemed like the natural thing to do.

M: He's recorded some amazing musicians. He recorded Tony Alan just before he passed away, The Comet is Coming, Alabaster dePlume, Snapped Ankles, so you know, he knows what he's doing. He's very lovely and he doesn't tell us what to do, which is what we like.

### TINY TOPS. LITTLE WORDS. PINK BIKINIS. SWIMMING CAPS. WHAT WAS BEHIND THE DECISION TO CALL YOUR LATEST ALBUM VEST?

M: So we were on our way to do this live performance on Worldwide FM, feeling excitedly nervous. We realised we were going to be asked about our album and what it might be called. It was quite a big occasion and we were like sh\*t we need to come up with a name right now! Right in this nauseous taxi! There were lots of silent pauses. I then said 'BEST'. there was like a 20 minute pause and then Freya said 'VEST'. We both found it incredibly funny, both of us got really hysterical for some reason. But I think it seems to work because the vest is like the foundation of any kind of expression that goes on top.

F: It's kind of symbolic because the songs that are in Vest we've been doing

for three years and they have always been constantly changing. It's like they are the blueprint for a different journey every time. They always have the same

... 'oh the base comes in here and the clap comes in here' but then the lyrics will change and then the whole mood might change which is nice - a framework to build a whole outfit on for the winter.

M: It's our debut album, so it's the first layer we're buttering up the world with. Who knows what is going to come next. We like to create anticipation and vests can do that very well. Also we couldn't say no to the endless slogans ... 'Invest in Vest', 'Vest Yourself', 'Invested', 'Vest is the Best'.

### TAKE US THROUGH A JOURNEY OF THE ALBUM.

**M:** It starts off with quite a soft song, aww, which feels like little creatures searching through the landscape.

**F:** It's super sensitive and then it gets a bit more desperate as it goes on.

**M:** The next track is Friends, which we actually recorded twice and the second take was so much more desperate.

F: It got really clingy and really psychotic. But also earnest as well, like a song by someone who's actually a stalker but it doesn't mean their feelings aren't really real to them. It's actually beautiful and transcendent.

M: Then we've got Gemini Girls, a

song you may have heard ... our recent single. A juxtaposition of feelings following on from Friends. We recently got some feedback from a DJ about Gemini Girls who was like 'love this sleezy little number'. Guest that sums it up.

F: The next group of girls is, These Girls. A frantic song about pulling yourself out of the muck and going out for the night. Club power. Keeping going.

M: Then we have Newbury Bypass. That is a very confusing song, very short, very percussive. Freya does some really good chopping tricks on the drum machine. It's also literally about Newbury Bypass, where all the trees got cut down, a very upsetting time for the locals and the political tree dwellers. There was an especially sad horse that actually in real life started kneeling down by the chopped down tree stumps, bowed its head and shed tears. So that was definitely written in a time of sadness, I was really feeling an affinity with the horse there. But it's a very happy song! So that's good!

F: Last of all we've got King of the Herbs. When we were first making this track we were like 'Aaaaaaah, this is what Mermaid Chunky is gonna... kind of sound like.' Moina set the scene with some 70's children's cartoons. And I just sort of riffed off that.

### HOW WILL YOU CELEBRATE VEST'S RELEASE ON NOVEMBER 6TH?

M: We are going to be releasing a very exciting film and recording of the Mermaid Chunky Vest performance, created at the Brunel Goods Shed in collaboration with SVA, d&b audiotechnik, Callum Chaplin, LocoDooms and Milligan Beaumont. Ideally we'd love to screen this film in the middle of a lake where everyone is on pedalos! Keep your eyes and paws on the buzzers. News coming soon...




