VOKA GENTLE

"THERE'S NOTHING BETTER THAN FINDING SOMETHING YOU LIKE AND THEN SEEING HOW FAR YOU CAN TAKE IT..."

This is the mantra by which Voka Gentle have made WRITHING! It's a beguiling record, that might just be one of the best you'll hear this year. A menagerie of beach boy-esque harmonies, tribal drums, Brexit inspired pop songs and guest slots from members of Pet Shimmers and the Flaming Lips. It's initially a bewildering listen, but repeated plays reveal a brilliantly clever and intriguing work that will only be enhanced in a live setting.

The band, a partnership of William J. Stokes and sisters Imogen and Ellie Mason emerged from the ashes of the post-millennial London folk scene. Soon realising that they had a shared interest in pushing their songwriting forward the trio started experimenting with synthesisers for a piece of work for the Stasis dance troupe and quickly found a sound that combined melody and experimentation.

A couple of EPs were released and very quickly Voka Gentle were riding the crest of a wave. Nude Records signed them and debut LP 'Start Clanging Cymbals' soon followed. The music press lapped it up; Uncut claimed it was "Hard to classify and even harder not to love" while Mojo praised it for its "ambition and self-assured daring." They joked about one day getting to play with the Flaming Lips only to end up supporting the Oklahoma pioneers at Brixton Academy.

Then Covid struck.

Covid was a massive inconvenience for everyone in the music industry but for Voka Gentle it was particularly cruel, halting momentum at a key time in their evolution. A fire above Imogen and William's flat didn't help matters and the death of people close to them also contributed to a period of deep introspection. Rather than grinding to a halt, they used the time productively, writing many songs (lots of which didn't end up on the record) using their discomfort to explore the theme of struggle which would go on to define album number two.

A key strength of the band is that all three members contribute to the song writing. The trio work really quickly and, because Ellie is a recording engineer by trade, they are able to get ideas down as soon as they have formulated them. "A big inspiration are the White Stripes and the way that they rarely take more than ten days to record an LP," says Imogen. Given the complexity and variety of this particular record this is doubly impressive.

The result is spectacular, the album flows beautifully, yet contains a number of potential hit singles. One particular stand out is Dread/TKOE, perhaps the most political track, recounting the story of a recurring character on the record, Mr Brown. "Mr Brown is a traditionalist, a little

stuck in his ways lamenting the dying gasps of English nationalism" explains William. An inspiration for this song and others was the work of Northumbrian musician and poet Richard Dawson. Other inspirations are Weather Report, Kristin Anna, Talking Heads and Americana highlighting the ocean of sound that the album conveys.

Another undoubted highlight is Necrofauna/
The Garden of Eden which features Wayne
Coyne from the aforementioned Flaming Lips.
"After our show with the band at Brixton, Wayne
gathered us in a group hug" say's Ellie. "This was
a formative moment for us, he validated us and
gave us confidence in ourselves. He offered his
support in any way he could so we asked him to
contribute something."

While there are undoubted stand out moments, the most satisfying thing about the record is the way that it works as a whole. The engineering of the record by Sam Grant from Pigs x7 is masterful, finding a perfect balance of melody and experimentation. The band self produced the album at Sam's studio in Newcastle and this direct involvement in all aspects of the sound has really paid off. Two or three ideas might develop in a single song and, yet, the record never loses the listener. "There is always an emphasis on the songs" recounts Imogen. The vocals are at the fore of the record and this ensures that the emotional core of the record is retained throughout. The trio claim not to be masterful musicians but insist that this isn't always the key to great music." 'Everyone has the tools to achieve, but who is curious enough to know what to do with it?"

Stroud will have the opportunity to experience Voka Gentle on the 27th November at SVA's Goods Shed. William and Imogen have recently moved into town and immediately found themselves at home. Ellie recently produced fellow Stroudie newcomer Mara Simpson's recent record (featured in last month's issue), another brilliant collaboration from these hills. "We love the yes mentality of the town," says William, "things are so collaborative, it makes us think what can we give rather than what can we take?" In WRITHING! They have given us all something fantastic to enjoy already...

STROUD ARTS FESTIVAL

The Stroud Arts Festival is back again, following last year's Covid-enforced break, and it returns perfectly-timed to celebrate its 75th anniversary. There's a certain poetry to this year's events, a poignant link to the very first festival of 1946. Then, Britain was still emerging from World War II, and as the new normal began to take shape, and people embraced their freedoms once more, a local scoutmaster named Netlam Begg created a two-week feast of classical music and theatre with a view to bringing these high arts to a wider local audience, in particular the young. Three quarters of a century later and here we are again, emerging from a seismic world event that has compromised the freedoms that we all took for granted. But the Arts Festival has stood the test of time and it lives on to watch as other festivals it supports through sponsorship and funding such as the Stroud Book Festival, Select Trail, Hidden Notes et al - enjoy their annual frolics. It is the mother of the Stroud festival scene and, over the past 75 years, has remained true to Netlam Bigg's philosophy. And how could it not? For he still influences and inspires the festival's current organisers, including trustee Jennifer Greenshields.

"The legacy left to the people of Stroud District is a generous and far-sighted act by the Biggs, who not only valued the arts and how they enrich the soul but who cared deeply about Stroud and the people of Stroud," she says, before going on to remind me that Bigg, along with his wife Margaret, bequeathed a small fortune to Stroud District Council when he died, and over the past 20 years some £250,000 of it has





been spent on the Arts in the local area. "I feel a strong obligation to try to spend the money in ways they would appreciate, even though times have changed and not all of the projects we sponsor or events that we promote would have happened in their day."

Jennifer is one of three trustees who help oversee the festival, along with four further trustees from the Margaret and Netlam Bigg Trust and five members drawn from the local community. One of those five this year is musician Dave Ayre who has taken on the role of Guest Artistic Director. Jennifer, herself, has been involved for eleven years after being persuaded to muck in by the late, great Rick Vick in 2010. "When I first joined," she says, "we were doing two mini-festivals a year – Spring and Autumn – both spread over long weekends, putting about half of our annual budget into that and spending the rest on grant support to others' projects, and we had planned to return to our original slot of mid-October in 2020."

But Covid came along to stop them in their tracks, which is why they have now altered the structure of the festival. Instead of the two smaller festivals in Spring and Autumn, all of the events have now been spread out across a six-month period, meaning that this year's Stroud Arts Festival pretty much continues non-stop from September until March. This technically makes it the Stroud Arts Festival 2021-22. "This way we felt that all would not be lost if Covid restrictions happen again for any short periods," Jennifer explains. "It means that the workload is more consistent over the year, although there is still a lot of admin to do!"

All of which means that we are promised two high-quality events each month from now until three months into next year. Cool, huh? Very! Especially when you find out just who you'll be looking forward to. This year's line-up includes Sinfonia Viva featuring Sophie Rosa who will be performing pieces by Bartok, Tchaikovsky and Astor Piazzola. Stroud Symphony Orchestra will be performing both Vaughan-Williams' The Lark Ascending and Elgar's Pomp and Circumstance March No.4 among other popular works. The Hewletts Opera will be performing Mozart's Marriage of Figaro, and Sinfonia Viva will be back to add their music to Flutter & Fly, an award winning show for children. Alice Oswald's lockdown inspired poem Gratitude, with song and dance accompaniment by Acapellies Community Choir and The Cotswold Players performance of Noel Coward's play Peace in our Time, about a Nazi-occupied London, kicked things off in September. To see what treats they have in store for 2022, you'd best follow their website to keep abreast of future acts.

There are so many wonderful local annual festivals to look forward to now, of course, an eclectic mix of pop music and folk music, fine arts and conceptual arts, author Q&As and irreverent poetry recitals. But the Stroud Arts Festival was the first, the rest all followed it, and if the end of the pandemic proves to be a similar breeding ground for creativity as the end of the War, then we're in for one heck of a ride these next 25 years until the SAF gets to celebrates its glorious centenary.

ASHA MCCARTHY

ASHA MCCARTHY CREATED HER DEBUT ALBUM. EPITAPH. ALMOST ENTIRELY INDEPENDENTLY, WRITING AND PRODUCING IT HERSELF AND **RECORDING ALL BUT ONE** OF THE INSTRUMENTS. **ALL THIS TOOK PLACE** AT HOME WHILST **RECOVERING FROM A** TRAUMATIC EXPERIENCE OF GIVING BIRTH, WITH **ASHA SNATCHING TIME TO WORK WHILST HER NEW-BORN WAS SLEEPING.** IT'S AN ASTONISHING ACCOMPLISHMENT, AND THE HAUNTING SOFTNESS OF THE **MUSIC SPEAKS TO THE EMOTIONAL INTENSITY** OF THE JOURNEY WHICH **BROUGHT IT INTO BEING.**

Asha was trained in Western classical cello at school, before spending time in Delhi studying Hindustani classical music. Since moving to Stroud in 2014, she has taught and written music for choirs and has collaborated with numerous artists, but tells me that she never thought of herself as a solo artist or a singer. She explains how her daughter's difficult arrival provided a final impetus to create a solo project, as a monument to her experience and a gift to her child – "I just thought, this is what I want to leave behind". The album is Asha's own anti-epitaph, written in defiance of the loss which came so close to her.

Epitaph germinated during Asha's first few months of motherhood, when she wrote lullabies to soothe her sleep-stubborn baby, but she quickly realised that it wasn't only children who could benefit from her songs. The finished album offers people of any age a tranquillity which Asha sees as too rare in life and in media nowadays – "it's about trying to feel calm in a stressful world, and finding something calming to our nervous systems which can get pretty fried living in this society", she explains.

More specifically, Asha's lyrics deal with issues surrounding perinatal mental health; aiming to de-stigmatise discussions of these common experiences. Epitaph reminds mothers and



caregivers of the validity of their experience and offers support. Another element of Asha's therapeutic musical practice is her appreciation of the power of communal music, in the form of both group singing for children and adult choir groups. In Epitaph, she has accordingly managed to balance a specific focus on the experience of early motherhood with a shared emotional experience which builds its own community of care. The music is ultimately for all of us – her reminders that "it feels like the sky is listening tonight" and that "love surrounds you" will find many grateful ears.

Asha's album incorporates and reworks numerous threads from her musical heritage – whilst she characterises the album as mostly folk-inspired, her choral work emerges in multiple harmonic interlocking voices, and her Indian classical training is audible in delicate, tripping melodies on vocals and cello. Her compositions catch on the brain and hold it, offering mesh after mesh of elements which converge into deceptively simple, and hugely captivating, moments.

Epitaph is a decisively hopeful work, but Asha hasn't shied away from addressing the more difficult issues surrounding its creation. She explains that 'Love Surrounds You', for example, is about "the pressure and intensity of not getting enough sleep", and 'All New"s emotional crescendo arrives when she sings, soberly, "I pray to be worthy of your trust". Another track is introduced by the sounds of a lapping tide, which Asha tells me was a nod to a favourite Tennyson poem, 'Crossing the Bar', which speaks to the hope of a peaceful departure into death. The result is an album with a refreshingly honest and often surprising complexity of tone. And Asha even surprised herself, recounting that she didn't anticipate being so pleased with the most pared-back song on the album, "Til Dawn" - "there's something to be said for just keeping it simple".

Producing the album herself was important to Asha both creatively and as a matter of principle. She explains that being able to record and mix the tracks at home allowed her to work much more intuitively than she could have in a recording studio, and she credits some of the album's more intriguing vocal harmonies to this opportunity to properly experiment before sending the final album to Lukas Drinkwater for mastering. Asha's interest in producing, which she learnt through a course with musician Isobel Anderson, also stems from a frustration with the gender disparity she has identified within the industry over her career. "I've worked in studios for years and years, and never had a female producer or technician or engineer", she says, "so I felt like I wanted to do that for myself because there really aren't any role models".

Going forward, Asha hopes to use her new-found producing skills to collaborate with other musicians in Stroud and start "pushing more boundaries", and has plans in the pipeline for an album of Indian classical music and some live gigs. For now, though, she offers us a rich and beautifully puttogether album, which is a must-listen for anyone in need of a moment to really pause, breathe, and recentre. It is a testament to all of us, but above all to motherhood and its distinctive emotional journeys. Asha's daughter is apparently an enthusiastic singer now – although she prefers Frozen's 'Let It Go' to her mum's songs...



IN HOUSE IS THE DESIGN AND PRINT STUDIO FOUNDED BY ARTISTS HAYLEY AND MARCUS WALTERS BASED IN FROGMARSH MILL, JUST OUTSIDE OF STROUD. TOGETHER THEY CREATE COLLECTIONS OF ARTWORK THAT THEY DEVELOP INTO PRINTS, PATTERNS AND PRODUCTS. HAVING PREVIOUSLY DESIGNED FOR HEALS, TATE AND HABITAT THEY ARE NOW LAUNCHING THEIR LATEST COLLECTION OF ARTWORK AT THREE STOREYS IN NAILSWORTH.

"Project 8 is the culmination of many months of experimentation in our print studio with different patterns, textures and materials. This year we decided to create a body of artwork utilising the ideas we have had simmering over the last few years. Re/Construct features a range of collaborative art pieces, from stretched canvases, wall hangings and wooden collages all hand screen printed at our studio. The work starts with texture, pattern, mark making and then those elements are exposed onto silk screens. Our canvases and wall hangings feature artworks which overlap, building layers, colours and taking on a new direction from its starting point. We also used wooden panels, laser cut to enable us to reconstruct compositions of different colours and printed textures.

We get inspiration from many places, from artists such as Anti and Josef Albers to screen print art to pattern and design we see on our travels - we collect patterns, textures and ephemera everywhere we go which often makes its way into our artwork. As artists we endeavour to create something new, but as designers we strive to make our art useful and accessible. Having lived in the area for over 10 years we are really excited to finally have our own exhibition in our home town of Nailsworth."

Project 8: Re/Construct runs from 29th September - 10th October at Three Storeys, Old Bristol Road, Nailsworth.

FROM KING LEAR TO RAIN MAN,
INHERITANCE HAS ALWAYS BEEN A SOURCE
OF CONFLICT IN FICTION, LIFE AND DEATH.
WE PROBABLY ALL KNOW SOMEONE WHO
HAS STRUGGLED WITH INHERITANCE,
WHETHER IT'S STARING AT THE TAX BILL,
MAKING A WILL, FINDING OUT THAT THERE
WAS NO WILL, OR THAT EVERYTHING

A Thousand Tiny Disappointments, a novel by Sarah Edghill, published by Bloodhound Books in September, is about inheritance and legacy. "It's something people have strong opinions about," says Sarah. "The whole subject is deeply emotive and entwined with issues of duty, obligation and our 'rights' as children." The novel asks the question, what does a good daughter do when her mother leaves everything to a total stranger?

Before fiction, Sarah started her career working on women's magazines reporting on real life dilemmas. "My first job was on She, which had some really quirky features in it." After working there as a junior sub-editor, she graduated to the London freebie Ms London, then landed a writing job at IPC's Woman magazine, but left after a year. "I don't think I was hard-nosed enough, so I went freelance!" (Side note, I think being a freelance journalist is a tough qig... respect!)

Sarah continued to work for newspapers and women's magazines and credits her early career with inspiring the characters and atmosphere that inform her novels. "I think that through interviewing people about their lives, you learn an awful lot about humanity, character and resilience. There are some extraordinary people in this world and I'm really grateful to have done the job I did."


Sarah and her husband lived in central London for several years, but at the weekends they headed to Stroud. "You escape from London on a Friday night and all you can hear is owls hooting, it's magical. So, when we decided it was time to move out of London this was the automatic choice."

That was back in '97. "I can remember writing articles and printing them

out and running up to the post office afterwards to get them sent to editors." Even at that stage, fiction was always in the background. "I thought about writing fiction for a long time, but didn't know where to start. Then my husband bought me a place on a Guardian Novel Writing Masterclass. It was a weekend course and absolutely fantastic. It was tutored by writer Ed Docx, and covered everything. I still have the notebook from that weekend and it's jam packed full of really useful basic information."

Sarah was so inspired that she wrote an awful book. "It was awful," she insists. "I didn't really know what I was doing ... so I put it away in a drawer." Not daunted, she got a place on the Faber Writing a Novel course, a costly programme that meant she had to head up to London every Tuesday night for isx months to attend the session. "I remember leaving at three in the afternoon, in order to get the train up to London in time to do the two-hour session, then I'd get back at about midnight." That's dedication!

Moving on she wrote another book and then another, then another and another. She did not submit all of them. maybe three or four, and then came the rejections. "It is absolutely souldestroying; you create this thing that you think might have some potential and you send it off to agents and most of them never get back to you. Every now and then you'll get a standard 'no thank you' popping into your inbox. I did get some really nice personal rejections as well and everyone says that if you get those from an agent, it's a near miss - which is good and positive. But actually it doesn't feel positive, because a miss is still a miss." During these years she was also long-listed a couple of times for Stroud Short Stories, but never got further than that. But

since the competition continues to run twice a year, she'll keep accepting the challenge!

The first hint of success came with the Stroud Book Festival Novel Competition. "I remember sitting in the Subs Rooms and Katie Fforde started talking about the winning story and why she'd liked it, and something she said made me think 'Ooh that might be mine.' Then she actually said my name and I couldn't believe it!" This was a great boost. "It helped me believe that I should keep going." That was the beginning of a novel called Wrecking Ball, which hasn't been published but which she hopes to revisit one day - watch this space.

Then along came lockdown and A Thousand Tiny Disappointments. "I actually planned this one, chapter by chapter, which is a new thing for me and that meant I wrote it very, very quickly, probably in about three months. I finished it during the first lockdown."

Novelists, suggests Sarah, are either 'pantsers' or 'plotters', as in you go by the seat of your pants or you plan out every detail. "Having always insisted I was 'pantser' through and through, I would say now that I'm definitely a plotter because it just makes life so much easier. I used to worry it would

be too constricting and not creative in some way, but you still have lots to write around the chapter you've planned."

While the subject of legacy and inheritance can be a bleak one, Sarah would not say her novel is dark, nor would she describe herself as a writer who lacks humour, despite the seriousness of this particular subject. "I would say that A Thousand Tiny Disappointments is the most serious of my books, but with a note of positivity. There is definitely an uplifting ending."

CLARE HUDMAN

"I LIKE TO THINK IT'S A BOOK FOR SEVEN TO 107 YEAR-OLDS"

Children's and young adult literature has a good history of merging into the sphere of grown-ups – think Harry Potter, The Curious Incident of the Dog at Night-Time and Charlotte's Web. Doesn't everyone have a dog-eared book from childhood that they treasure and go back to time and again?

This merging of ages is what Stroudbased writer Clare Hudman wishes for when her debut novel, Mothboy, is published nationwide this month. While it will sit on the 'middle-grade' book shelves – for ages 8-12 – she hopes the story resonates with children and adults alike, centred around a universal theme of belonging and being loved.

"In the run up to publication, I've had a lot of feedback to say the book speaks to a lot of ages", says Clare, who combines writing with her work as a hypnotherapist, life coaching and time spent helping young people with their anxieties.

Mothboy gets deep under the skin of Ches, a ten-year-old boy whose inauspicious start to life amounts to being left on a doorstep in Cheltenham as a newborn. And in a plastic bag, to boot. Though adopted into a loving family, Ches has some large life hurdles to face as he approaches his tenth birthday, and the story focuses on his search for acceptance, with a few adventures along the way. It's told in the first person, and from the outset, Clare captures that innocent, enquiring and cheeky voice of an adolescent.

So, how does a 63-year-old mother get into the mind of a 10-year-old mixed race boy, whose entire world has the potential to be turned upside down?


"I feel strongly that everyone has an age they're comfortable with,' Clare says. 'You might actually be forty, but feel you're fourteen, or twenty but really you think like a fifty-year-old. My comfortable age just happens to be ten, and so in that sense it wasn't difficult to think like Ches."

And although her daughter, Finlay, is now 27, Clare has ongoing contact with young people through her work, and with children in Stroud co-housing community, where - up until lockdown - she was involved in putting on the annual play. Writing is perhaps a natural progression to her very mixed bag of employment since graduating with an English Literature degree; she's worked in theatre as an actor (learning to play the trombone to bag one part), held residences in schools and run arts workshops, as well as being one of the first artists at the SVA with her work in stained glass.

Clare feels each of her skills has been held together with a single thread: "I suppose it's because I've always been a storyteller – whether you're acting, creating or writing, it's about stories. I simply love art, people and telling tales."

Mothboy was born of something deeply personal too. Clare herself was fostered at just three weeks, into the family of a single mum – as is Ches. "In my case, this was a time when it wasn't OK to be a single, pregnant midwife, as my birth mother was. And so it was very hard for her - she had a big decision to make."

Although Clare was fostered into a 'great family' and later rejoined her birth mother in a new household, it left her with an enduring curiosity and feelings that later influenced her work. "I've always had a fascination with the subject of being good enough, of belonging and being loved enough." It

led to her working in children's homes, and in a boy's hostel, where she met and formed a close bond with a young mixed race boy. Years later, he became the inspiration for Ches.

The book itself was completed in lockdown, Clare having already written children's books and an adult novel, as yet unpublished. She wrote part-time "but it simply flowed out of me. I write in my office in the house, and when I switched on the computer, I felt like I was coming back to my family. I'm literally living two lives when I'm in the middle of a project like this."

It still meant Ches could come up with his own surprises. "I'm not a planner when I write, and so I know something's going to happen, I just don't always know what. It means I'm excited to see what will come off the page. And I think Ches took me on a journey too!"

With a finished manuscript, Clare began the usually long haul of finding a publisher, but was delighted to see her debut snapped up quickly by Book Guild Publishing. She sees Mothboy as being the middle book of a trilogy, and is now busy writing the prequel and answering what is bound to be a

burning question: How did Ches come to be left on a doorstep in a plastic bag?

For now, she's keen to see her first paperback in the hands of young people – and a few adults. "I want the readers to go on a journey with Ches – to be rooting for him, and for themselves too, to know that every child out there is good enough, and is lovable."

"But more than that, I want them to have fun with him too – to be part of his adventures and be caught up in the story!"

FOR THIS MONTH'S YOUNG ARTISTS FEATURE WE CAUGHT UP WITH JAKE AWFORD, ONE HALF OF SIBLING ALT-POP DUO THE WAYBACK COLLECTIVE...

WHEN DID YOU BOTH START MAKING MUSIC AS THE WAYBACK COLLECTIVE?

The day I got back from travelling in Asia. We were always keen to make music. Archie focused a lot on his songwriting and his live loops as a teenager, whereas I used to play bass in a couple of bands. The day I got back, Archie showed me his new set up for recording tracks at home. He actually gave me a crash course in logic that day. It was meant to just be a tutorial, but we actually ended up writing the foundation to Ember Linings – a track we released over a year later. Since that night we've been bouncing ideas off each other.

SO...YOU ARE BROTHERS....HOW'S THAT WORKING OUT SO FAR? ANY SIBLING RIVALRY LURKING AROUND IN THE STUDIO?

So far it's worked out pretty well. As we're so close, we can be fully honest with each other. If one of us is not feeling an idea, we'll let the other one know for sure. Definitely helps that we have a pretty similar music taste as well. When we're feeling an idea you can really get a sense of the energy in the room. That being said, with the lockdowns and being constantly around each other, our last project had a few heated moments. At the end of the day, we love the music we make – we both want to bring the best out of each song. For sure there's a bit of sibling rivalry, but our songs wouldn't be the same without it.

WHO INSPIRES YOU? AND WHO ARE YOUR MAIN INFLUENCES?

Growing up, our dad used to make CD's of his favourite bands for us. We both quickly became obsessed with The Red Hot Chili Peppers. I think their blend of rock, funk and hip hop set a solid basis for our individual tastes. In terms of Wayback, we'd have to show love to Brockhampton, Mac Miller and the Dreamville artists for the hip hop side. I really got into the Australian Indie scene as a teenager. Bands and artists like Sticky Fingers and Tame Impala have really inspired our instrumentals and the way we produce/ arrange a track.

HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE YOUR MUSIC?

I would say it's alt-pop. I think Archie sees it as our own blend of indie and hip hop. I think both are pretty good at describing our sound. We like to combine colourful guitar tones with 808 bass and hip hop drums. Imagine beach music but we want to keep your head constantly bopping. Our New EP 'BACK TO EARTH' is a real mix of our different influences though, I'm still trying to work out how to describe it.

DO YOU THINK THERE IS MUCH OF A MUSIC SCENE IN STROUD FOR YOUNGER AUDIENCES?

There's definitely a solid music scene in Stroud. For young people? I think there's a lot of potential. It's great to see people of a similar age playing venues such as the Sub Rooms. The Stroud Song Contest gave us a great opportunity to get our music out there in the community. I think there could be some improvements to attract younger audiences, but Stroud as a place seems to invite all genres of music,

which we think is very special. We owe a lot to the Prince Albert as well. They've been very supportive of us, even allowing us to shoot a music video for our single 'SMOKEY JAZZ ROOM' in the pub.

HOW HAVE YOU MANAGED TO STAY CREATIVE DURING THE VARIOUS LOCKDOWNS OVER THE LAST YEAR AND A HALF?

I'm not sure if we'd have our projects without the lockdowns to be honest. In a huge sense it has been a very uninspiring time. However, without the distractions of everyday life, we've both been able to get stuck into producing music. Our debut EP was mainly produced over the Summer of 2020 – hence the title 'Summerdemic.' With 'BACK TO EARTH', we started working on the project at the end of last year. With nothing happening and no one to break our hearts, we felt we had to look a little more within ourselves to bring the tracks to life. I can safely say I've channelled every weird thought, feeling and frustration I've had over the last year into the EP.

WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO OTHER YOUNG MUSICIANS?

Don't be afraid to put your music out there! It's a great feeling seeing your mates enjoy a track you've put everything into. No one will scrutinise your song as much as you, every listener will have their own independent relationship to your music. It's easy to go through love and hate stages with songs you've worked on for ages. Just try and craft the best track you can with the means you have.

WHAT IS THE BEST ADVICE YOU HAVE BEEN GIVEN?

Whatever you do make sure you're authentic. If you're not being you, people will see through you. You are what makes your music original, so don't be afraid to put yourself out there. Just make sure your subject matter is real to you. If you're a rapper you don't have to play up to the bravado, just make sure you convey your own experiences in your verses. If you can deliver authentic lyrics, you're already in a good position.

FINALLY....WHAT'S NEXT?

We've just released our second EP 'BACK TO EARTH' – We couldn't be prouder of it. We've also got our music video for 'SMOKEY JAZZ ROOM' coming soon, thanks again to The Prince Albert. I reckon we're feeling single season. We've put a lot of energy into our two EPs so far so it'll be fun getting back into the swing of it with a few independent tracks. Can safely say we're excited for the future and hope we'll see you there.
