WHEN ALEX ASKED ME TO MEET **UP WITH PETER LEDEBOER, I WAS ESPECIALLY INTERESTED BECAUSE OF** THE ICONIC PLACE THAT BIG O, THE POSTER COMPANY THAT HE FOUNDED IN THE 1960'S, HAD HELD IN MY YOUTH, AND BECAUSE OF HIS ASSOCIATION WITH **OZ, THE ESSENTIAL COUNTERCULTURAL** MAGAZINE, OF WHICH HE WAS A FOUNDER, PUBLISHER AND **DISTRIBUTOR. THE BIG O PUBLISHED PSYCHEDELIC, SCI-FI, AND FANTASY** POSTERS FROM 1967 UNTIL 1980 - A PERIOD IN WHICH THE POSTER PLAYED **A DEFINITIVE ROLE: A DEMOCRATIC ART FORM, A CELEBRATION OF YOUTH CULTURE AND A VEHICLE FOR ANTI-ESTABLISHMENT AGITPROP. BIG O** POSTERS WERE INTIMATELY BOUND UP WITH THE MUSIC AND SUBCULTURES OF THE TIME, INDEED, ALONGSIDE **ORIGINALLY COMMISSIONED PIECES,** SUCH AS MARTIN SHARP'S FAMOUS **PSYCHEDELIC BOB DYLAN, 'MR** TAMBOURINE MAN', MANY OF THE **IMAGES HAD BEEN USED AS ARTWORK** FOR ALBUM COVERS, NOTABLY ROGER **DEAN'S FANTASTICAL DESIGNS FOR OSIBISA AND YES, MATI KLARWEIN'S EXUBERANTLY PSYCHEDELIC COVER FOR** SANTANA'S ABRAXAS AND WORK BY H.R. GIGER, WHO AS WELL AS DESIGNING THE **COVER FOR EMERSON, LAKE & PALMER'S BRAIN SALAD SURGERY, CREATED THE** 'BIOMECHANICAL' AESTHETIC FOR THE ALIEN FILMS.

Peter's account of how Big O came into existence is absolutely in tune with its times. In 1967 he had been asked to publish a poster to promote a public rally for the legalisation of marijuana in London's Hyde Park. Martin Sharp, who had helped to shape the distinctive graphic style of Oz from its earliest manifestations in Australia, was commissioned to design the artwork for the poster. Legalise Cannabis: (the front cover of this issue) The Putting Together of the Heads had the characteristic psychedelic visual impact that Sharp had developed for Oz. A fly-poster was commissioned to distribute the posters across London but very few made it onto the street. It transpired that the fly-poster, recognising the desirability of the poster as a work of art, had sold the lot to an American distributor. This dodgy deal revealed to Peter the commercial potential of pop culture posters and led to the setting up of Big O company, with a reprinting of Legalise Cannabis becoming their first

edition, named BO1 and sold by mail order through the back pages of Oz. The company caught the mood of the moment and Peter spent the next decade commissioning artists and flying around the world on Big O business. Through the 70's they added photography to their portfolio – Peter describes buying colour film for an impoverished photographer so that he could photograph Bruce Springsteen for an edition.

Then in 1980 it all imploded – a sorry, but not untypical tale of countercultural entrepreneurialism, a crooked American accountant and the embezzlement of company funds. Peter made the decision to wind things up. Perhaps the poster had had its day by then. The pop video was replacing the poster and the album cover as the visual adjunct to the music. Nevertheless, he continues to publish many of the images that Big O made famous as cards.

The story is telling of both Peter's genius for creative business and the rather informal, even haphazard, approach that has characterised his career. As he puts it, nobody had a plan and nobody went to college to learn how to do it – everything unfolded as it fell. The result may have been reckless and chaotic, and ultimately financially calamitous for Peter but it burned with a kind of brilliance that had nothing to do with focus groups and targeted marketing.

As a teenager in the 70's I viewed the previous generation of hippies with a certain amount of cynicism, but I was also somewhat beguiled by the spirit of revolution that was attached to 1968 and all that. Oz epitomised that spirit of anti-establishment dissent. In 1970, following the publication of an edition of Oz that had been edited by fifth and sixth form school kids, the editors of Oz had been the subject of an infamous obscenity trial. They were found guilty and were sentenced to 15 months in prison, which was subsequently overturned on appeal. At the time, this was a cause celebre in which cultural shifts and intergenerational conflicts that had been on-going since the war were being acted out. The Schoolkids edition of Oz had been shared around at school, but I was too voung to be more than dimly aware of its significance. However, a couple of years later I acquired a battered second-hand copy of a book by Richard Neville, one of the editors of Oz, called Playpower, which I still have, rather more battered, on my bookshelf. The book was a kind of hybrid. As well as tracing the evolution of the 60's underground, touching on politics, sex and sexuality, drugs and music, it was an advice manual on how to get free stuff and on what to do if you got busted - all in the name of sticking it to the establishment. But it also articulated a politics of play: play as a political strategy that had been evident in the Chicago protests in 1968, when a pig was

nominated for president by the Youth International Party and persists in non-violent actions such as those carried out by the Clown Army in the Occupy movement; and play as part of a utopian vision that was a broader philosophical response to late capitalist work practices. The book had a lasting impact on me that was later modified and developed by reading Marx's theory of alienated labour and, more particularly, William Morris.

Neville later wrote a corollary to Playpower in which he reflected on the unintended consequences of some of the ideas that he had enthusiastically espoused - that drug culture had had some squalid and socially damaging effects, that 'free love' had been essentially misogynistic in practice and that far from dropping out, social change would come about through active engagement.

Incidentally, Big O produced a poster based on the original cover of the book.

Peter's own stories of being at the heart of the 'swinging' 60's are peppered with cultural references and key figures from the period, but they really describe a lot of hard work and creative drive. He describes himself as 'Mr Normal'. By the time that he was working on Oz and setting up Big O he was married with children - he had no time for wild parties. When they were going on, he quotes the famous News of the World line, that "our reporter made his excuses and left". In person, Peter is agreeable, informed and sharp. He has the charismatic presence of a veteran of the underground, and a fund of good stories, but he is clear eyed about the period - he sums it up neatly by describing Neville bringing his girlfriend to the office and sending her off to make the tea. He strikes me as not being one to look backwards. Nevertheless, he retains a rebellious spirit and a utopian outlook. His politics are resolutely of the left and when he moved down to live in the Stroud Valleys it was to make a better environment for his family and with a vision of making a creative community around his work and the artists that he had promoted through his publishing activities.

Of course, I had to ask this legendary publisher what he thought of Good On Paper... "Brilliant! – I have collected every edition since it began."





BRIAN ENO ONCE SAID "HONOUR THY ERROR AS A HIDDEN INTENTION." IT'S A MANTRA THAT ED UPTON LIVES BY AND IT HAS SERVED HIM WELL.

As Ed DMX he has sustained a thirty year career which has involved making electro pop, playing with Aphex Twin, DJing the warehouses and festivals of Europe and producing almost 2000 tracks...despite being resolutely underground he has an enviable reputation as one of this country's key electronic innovators.

His latest record, Party Life, is far removed from the sometimes difficult glitchy electronica of his peers such as Aphex or Luke Vibert. It's essentially a pop album recalling in particular the 1980s. At a time when Stranger Things has propelled Kate Bush back into the charts it feels suitably timely. Those who know Ed's music will know that this is no aberration. He has often played to an electro-pop sensibility and is quite happy to admit his love for the genre. Indeed, some of the tracks on the album are almost 20 years old while others were recorded much more recently.

I asked Ed about his writing process and it is here that the Eno mantra becomes apparent. "I simply start messing about and wait for inspiration" he tells me "it often starts as rubbish but then it starts working and I'm increasingly unconscious that I'm working on it." Using ancient synths and a stand-alone groove box called Maschine+ he creates loops and samples records until he finds something that excites him. He will often change his methods and starting points simply to keep his ideas fresh.

He admits that he doesn't listen to much music these days and, when he does, it tends to be reggae or jazz, not the cool techno and electro producers he is often compared to. Inevitably other music does influence him but this is often as a conceptual starting point rather than a direct source. "Imagine a track where Sisters of Mercy jam with Prince" for example (search DMX Krew Dark Funk on Youtube for this!) or "Doppler Effect versus Fela Kuti".

Ed and his family have lived in Stroud for about 5 years now, like many others, drawn to a liberal countryside haven mercifully "free of UKIP and foxhunters". It's a far cry from his days in London when he held down a day job mastering (essentially tweaking the sound of songs to ensure they have maximum impact when heard on a particular format) and cutting vinyl – teaching himself by

watching other engineers master his releases.

Musically too he has travelled. He is perhaps best known for his time with Rephlex Records which he still sees as an "amazing adventure and opportunity." It started with label boss Grant Wilson-Claridge phoning him after hearing one of his early releases and would culminate in major tours with labelmate Richard James (aka Aphex Twin) and DJing next to the Dead Sea. Perhaps unsurprisingly his music took a darker tone at this time, releasing tracks anonymously on the label to avoid being pigeonholed as the guy who makes synth pop records. Later however he would return to his synth pop roots as DMX Krew – by his own estimation, some of his very best work.

We discuss at some length a term often applied to his work 'retro-futurist'. By its very nature this is a paradoxical concept but Ed recognises that he both conveys the original futuristic intent of Detroit techno and the retro analogue synth boom of recent years. "It's so much more difficult for techno to sound like the music of the future now" he reflects "but listen to something on Nyege Nyege Tapes or DJ Black Low from Africa and there is still stuff that makes you go wow, I haven't heard that before!" It's clear that despite all this time there is still a curiosity and desire within him to listen and to create.

While studio work is clearly his primary focus, playing live gives Ed the opportunity to try out new material as well as providing an additional revenue stream. He spends many of his weekends travelling Europe to play in warehouse clubs from Prague to Berlin, Glasgow to Belgrade. Ironically, as he has got older he has increasingly played to younger crowds and once again has a packed schedule, which includes performing at the next Loose Joints at Studio 18 later this month. His first Stroud date in over 5 years.

Covid gave him the opportunity to create at home even more than ever but ironically it drained his motivation as well as curtailing his live work which he found very difficult. He provided a much sought mastering service during this time (including on our recent Sound Records Patched in compilation of Stroud electronica). He has continued to pursue this work and when we met he had at least another two projects on the go.

I wonder, how does he continue to motivate himself to create his own material after all this time? "I recognise that I've probably released far too much material and maybe I should have held back a bit in the early days" he reflects "but until I die, I want to use my time on earth making beautiful stuff without compromise, which in my case is music."

LET'S TALK ABOUT PHILIP



WHEN HELEN WOOD'S BROTHER PHILIP UNEXPECTEDLY TOOK HIS OWN LIFE IN 1985 THE SHOCK WAVES WERE HUGE, BUT THE FAMILY WEREN'T ABLE TO SPEAK ABOUT THEIR FEELINGS. HE WAS NOT MENTIONED FOR OVER 30 YEARS. IT WASN'T UNTIL 2017, AFTER HELEN'S MOTHER DIED, THAT HER FATHER TURNED TO HER AND SAID "LET'S TALK ABOUT PHILIP".

Thus she embarked on a journey of re-connection with her only sibling, with whom she had spent the formative and happy years of her childhood. The conversations with her dad started the ball rolling, and ultimately, she arrived at the decision to place her brother and herself at the centre of a theatre piece. "It's been extraordinary" says Helen "I wouldn't have imagined that in Summer 2022 I would be performing a play called 'Let's Talk About Philip' in Stroud and Edinburgh!"

Stroud-based Helen Wood is an energetic and motivated person, invariably on the lookout for the next creative adventure. In her working life as a teacher, actor and writer she has spent the last four decades engaged in the exploration of theatre-ineducation, storytelling, and comedy. Recently she has successfully performed at the Edinburgh Fringe, with her two very funny one-woman shows; 'The O.S Map Fan Club' and 'The National Trust Fan Club'. Both of these were big hearted, quirky plays. Helen has a warm and accessible style. She approaches her subject matter from a personal stance, which then develops into a general all-embracing look at her subject matter - through a light, discerning eye.

In Lockdown 2020 she enrolled on an online 'Writing for Theatre Performance' course with the Arvon Foundation. She discussed potential themes with theatre maker Tim Crouch, who was leading the course. He had no difficulty giving his answer "The play you should write is about your brother".

Helen felt intrigued but daunted. Could she write a serious play? She had touched on her brother's life in previous shows but was it possible to make him the epi-centre of her next one? As it turned out, she didn't have to do it on her own. Gregor Hunt, a Stroud based professional actor whom Helen had met at the Actor's Lab at the Cheltenham Everyman, was wanting to develop his theatre writing, and with the decision to make the show a two-hander, Helen not only found a co-writer, but a co-actor, Gregor was enthusiastic: "I was immediately drawn into the extraordinary story of her brother, and of Helen's journey to rediscover him. Straight away I had ideas of what the piece could look like, and from a scene Helen had already written I could see we were of the same mind". He felt privileged to have been invited into such a deeply personal exploration. "I don't mind saying that over the months of researching and writing we have shared some profoundly emotional moments".

The team grew when Helen's Edinburgh producer introduced her to the theatre director, Derek Bond, who had recently moved to Stroud. He came to a rehearsed reading of a first draft of the play.

"I was inspired by what they were doing and interested to join them in developing and directing the play. I was also wary - a friend of mine died by suicide many years ago, and it is still a very emotive subject for me. But speaking to Helen and Gregor about their ideas for the production, and their experiences, reassured me. We all agreed that the production had to feel hopeful, and optimistic".

Gregor respects Helen's bravery in sharing so much of her personal family history, but also observes that there is something universal about the story. "Sadly many families have been affected by suicide, and indeed mental illness. Most families have something that they find difficult to talk about. I admire Helen enormously for sharing Philip's story, in the hope that it will help other people to talk". He adds "Although it is a serious and deep piece, we've managed to have some fun too, and I hope that some of that humour has been injected into the play".

Well, I have read the script and I definitely think it has. After months of work on the script, the show will go into rehearsal in July and (prior to Edinburgh) will be performed at the Cotswold Playhouse, later this month. Helen and Gregor look forward to sharing the extraordinary true story of the years of silence about Philip, and the surprising joy and relief she has discovered in simply being able to think and talk about her brother. To 'spend time with him'. I suspect that audiences too are going to enjoy spending an evening with Helen, Gregor and Philip.

MANDY ROBOTHAM MEETS STROUD ARTIST AND PUBLIC-SPEAKER TURNED WRITER, ANGELA FINDLAY, ON THE DIFFICULTIES OF HER FAMILY'S COMPLEX PAST.

It's the type of family history that most people would be at pains to keep under wraps rather than advertise in print - your grandfather as an active and highranking officer in Hitler's German army, decorated and respected by his superiors. But Stroud artist Angela Findlay has made the subject - and her family - an entirely open book, by writing honestly and from the heart of her grandfather's past and the rippling effect on her own, sometimes troubled life, 'In My Grandfather's Shadow' - published this month by Penguin Transworld - is part-memoir, part-historical tract, but ultimately a candid disclosure into how trauma, emotion and shame can radiate through families, even when the catalyst is long dead. "This is not a book about defending Germans, and I am not trying to excuse anyone," Angela says from her home in Stroud. "It's purely a case of trying to understand. Because it's not the truth that hurts us - not knowing is far worse '

General Karl Von Graffen was born in 1893, into a noble German family, destined for a life of service, having been sent to military school at the tender age of ten. Awarded the Iron Cross in the First World War, he became an army expert on ballistics in the years following, narrowly missing out on competing at the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin. By the time Hitler invaded Poland and the world was plunged into a second conflict, Karl was married with four children, including Angela's mother, Jutta. His official portrait shows a handsome officer, instilled with the German virtues of duty, honour and obedience towards his country, though he was never a member of the Nazi party.

By May 1945, Von Graffen was a decorated General, having fought across Russia and Italy, yet forced to surrender his troops to the Americans on Italian soil. One of the photographs which pepper Angela's book is of her grandfather surrendering in the field, sharing a cigarette like gentlemen with those who would soon make him a prisoner of war. Once he was released and returned to Germany, Karl Von Graffen never recovered his former vitality, sitting and endlessly smoking until his death. By the early sixties, however, Angela's mother had met and married a British naval officer, moving to settle in England. "My grandfather died a week after I was born," explains Angela, whose varied, global career includes painting, public speaking and teaching art in prisons. She knew her grandfather principally from the photograph on her mother's writing desk, in full army uniform. Watching 'The Sound of Music' as a child, she gathered that Nazis were "baddies", but it was clear from her own family that not all Germans were Nazis. "Even though I never knew my grandfather in the flesh, from quite an early age I had this sense that as he left the world and I entered it, he passed a baton to me."

It was a legacy that proved difficult to co-exist with; as an Anglo-German, Angela found it impossible to settle in either Britain or Germany. By her own admission, she was often reckless on her travels, eventually discovering a passion in teaching art to prison inmates across the world. Still, there was always something nagging at her, alongside the challenging relationship with her mother, Jutta something that Angela describes as "a big knotted ball, mangled and forged together."

The book is the result of Angela's determination to come to terms with her German roots, and to understand Jutta's ordeal of being plucked from her bed as a young girl in the middle of the night, on the run from avenging Russian troops sweeping into Berlin at the war's end. In the book, Angela explores the psychology behind the distress her mother must have felt, of inheriting the impact of past crimes, traumas (which we now know as PTSD) and emotions that can go on to profoundly affect later generations. "I felt that my mother's childhood stories were deposited in my memory, like a cuckoo's egg in a host bird's nest."

The solution, she discovered eventually, was not to shy away from it, but to bring this trauma and so-called 'shame' into the light. So began a ten year investigation, researching both Germany's past and her grandfather's early life, poring over her grandmother's wartime letters as he fought on the Eastern Front, and undertaking a pilgrimage across Russia with her own mother, where they re-traced the footsteps of Karl's war. For both, it was raw and sometimes painful, but also healing. "It's discovering how to love a family member who has been involved in horrible things, and not to ignore them, because that can cause problems for others way down the line."

A story of war, trauma and the legacy of silence

IN MY GRANDFATHER'S SHADOW

ANGELA FINDLAY

Writing the book became a labour of love, but at times more challenging than Angela could envisage. "I'm a fairly sociable person," she explains, "but there were days on end when I felt locked in a solitary tunnel." Now the book is complete, the connection between Angela and her mother is close, "because we both appreciate it's a work of love, not of blaming and shaming. A lesson, if you like, in how to love the unlovable."

The family aside, how does Angela feel about her heritage being out there on the shelves, a part of her life that maybe even friends might not know about? "I was actually more nervous before I told the whole story on a Ted talk," she reveals. "Now, I'm quite excited for the book to be published and hear people's reactions."

"It's something I want to talk about," she adds with enthusiasm. "Equally, it's an issue that can never be resolved because there are still victims, dead and living. But, yes, I do feel liberated, as if I have closed a door."

EXHIBITION SPACE:

ART IN BROWNSHILL

Preparations are underway for a major art exhibition in the village of Brownshill. For a small community, Brownshill has an extraordinary array of artistic talent, including sculptors, ceramicists, artists, printmakers, photographers and authors, and the majority of those taking part live within the village.

The exhibition will include works by renowned sculptors Roy Exley and Neil Gow, printmaker Beth Jenkins and blown glass artist Nigel Calvert alongside works by Pete Hoida (artist), Emma Hubble (furniture maker), Jean French (jewellery maker), Owen James (artist), Liza Bewick (ceramicist), Dave Swinburne (photographer), Joanne Drew (textile artist), Sarah Edghill (author), Alkis Alkiviades (photographer/writer), Jill Harwood (artist), Ken Brown (artist), Nicky Swettenham (mosaics) and Chris James (artist), all held in the spectacular setting of St Mary of the Angels Church, an unusual Arts and Crafts style deconsecrated church which is now owned by the charity Friends of Friendless Churches.

At the turn of the last century, Brownshill was home to an order of nuns and has a monastery which was a centre for post-traumatic stress disorder after WW1. In the 1940s the village had three pubs, three shops, a post office and a milk parlour. Nowadays there are no facilities in the village, save for the church which was designed by WD Caroe and features stained glass by Douglas Strachan. It is in a fabulous setting on the edge of the village, overlooking the Golden Valley, and acts as a hub for the local community, with residents using it for pop up bars, parties and music events. An ideal venue for an art exhibition in this vibrant little community, artists, photographers, printmakers and musicians.

The exhibition aims to celebrate the wealth of the talent in the village (and a little beyond!) and to reference the arts and crafts tradition that the church was built in. It will run from 16th-24th July, with a private view on Friday 15th, where a Pop up Bar will be run by local residents.

THE LAURIE LEE PRIZE FOR WRITING

Open to unpublished Gloucestershire writers across a range of genres, the Laurie Lee Prize for Writing has been created to acknowledge and honour the work of Stroud's most famous son, Laurie Lee (1914-1997).

Laurie Lee was born in Stroud in 1914, and was educated at Slad village school and Stroud Central School. At the age of 19 he walked to London and then travelled on foot through Spain, as described in his book 'As I Walked Out One Midsummer Morning'. In 1950 he married Katherine Polge and they had one daughter, Jessy.

His bestselling Cider with Rosie (1959) has sold over six million copies worldwide, and was followed by two other volumes of autobiography: As I Walked Out One Midsummer Morning (1969) and A Moment of War (1991). Laurie Lee also published four collections of poems, The Sun My Monument (1944), The Bloom of Candles: Verse from a Poet's Year (1947), My Many-coated Man (1955) and Pocket Poems (1960), as well as A Rose for Winter (1955), The Firstborn (1964), I Can't Stay Long (1975), and Two Women (1983). Village Christmas, an anthology of uncollected essays, was published posthumously. Laurie Lee died in May 1997 and is buried in Slad village graveyard.


The new prize was the idea of bestselling Stroud writer, Katie Fforde, and has been established under the umbrella of Stroud Book Festival with the blessing of Laurie Lee's family, and his literary estate.

Two annual £1000 prizes will be awarded, one of which will go to a writer aged under 25. Announced in October 2022, the winners will be invited to read their winning entries at a public Laurie Lee Prize event at Stroud Book Festival in November 2022.

Submitted writing – whether fiction, non-fiction or poetry – must be on a nature or conservation theme. The Prize is open to writers currently resident in Gloucestershire, and to those who were born in the county.

The 2022 judges are Katie Fforde (chair), Jessy Lee (Laurie Lee's daughter), Norah Perkins (Laurie Lee's literary agent), and Gloucestershire writers, Jamila Gavin, Adam Horovitz, and Jane Bailey. "I'm very grateful to Katie Fforde and Stroud Book Festival for progressing such an inspiring idea," comments Jessy Lee, "My father would have been very pleased to see local writers encouraged to put forward their work. It's always heartwarming to keep Laurie's name firmly alive – especially in the valleys of Stroud".

The Laurie Lee Prize for Writing is now open for entries until Monday 1st August. Visit **stroudbookfestival.org.uk** for full details of eligibility criteria and how to enter. The seventh annual Stroud Book Festival will take place from 2-6 November this year in venues across Stroud, including the Sub Rooms, Lansdown Hall, Stroud Library and the Museum in the Park.






